AQUATIC STAR SWIMS IN LAKE

Waters of Crater "Liquid Ice," Says Lee Fourrier.

Lee Fourrier, holding the world endurance record for swimming, 57 hours, which she will attempt to break during the Elks convention next week, spent 30 minutes in the icy waters of Crater lake on Sunday. With a party of friends, motoring in Chevrolet cars furnished by the Locke Motor company, the party left here Sunday morning for the lodge. The trip from the lodge to the waters edge took the party 40 minutes. "I would call the waters of the lake 'liquid ice' Mrs. Fourrier said. However I intend to swim across the eight miles before leaving Klamath Falls."

Upon the advice of her trainer, Mrs. Fourrier did not remain in the cold water yesterday more than 30 minutes. Otto Kennrick of Hamburg, Germany, who held a record of 47 hours in the water in 1927 has offered a challenge to Mrs. Fourrier. He will be unable to make the challenge until after the Elks convention, however he hopes to be in the United States within the coming few months.

Phone System On Rail Cars To Be Started

The first inter-car telephone system on a railroad train is about to be added to the convenience of modern rail transportation, according to A. S. Rosenbaum, official of the Southern Pacific.

Developed and perfected by experimentation with special equipment, the innovation will make its appearance on the Cascade, Southern Pacific's fast train running between San Francisco and Portland.

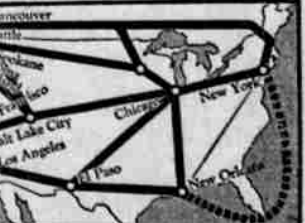
