TITLE HOLDER RETAINS CROWN IN HARD MATCH

Gus Sonnenberg Butts His Way to Victory Over Lewis.

BOSTON, July 10. (AP)—Gus Sonnenberg took in another notch today in the Diamond champion's belt, after turning back the challenge of Ed "Strangler" Lewis, from whom he wrested the championship six months ago. Twenty five thousand customers crowded Fenway park and paid \$90,000 to see the second encounter last night. The former Dartmouth football player suffered the first fall of his eighteen month's mat career last night but came back with the famous flying tackle he borrowed from the gridiron to flatten Lewis twice in 22 minutes.

Lewis successfully avoided Sonnenberg's butting charges at the start. With 17 minutes gone he jumped aside from one of the champion's charges so neatly that Sonnenberg nosedivided to the mat. The "Strangler" jumped on him and obtained a breast lock for the first fall.

Sonnenberg came back fighting mad but almost lost the match several times when Lewis clamped a headlock on him. Finally, however, he butted successfully to take the second fall in 19 minutes. The deciding fall came three minutes later after Lewis had knocked Sonnenberg out of the ring.

After the match two Chicago sports promoters, Joe Coffey and "Doc" Krone announced that Sonnenberg would defend his title at Chicago in September against an opponent to be selected by the Illinois Athletic Commission.

Chicago, July 10. (AP)—Charges that boxers have been forced to give from 10 to 20 percent of their purses in order to get places on cards are to be investigated, and promoters and match-makers have been ordered to appear before the Illinois Athletic Commission next Tuesday.

A terrific left hook to the jaw staggered Morgan in the third, and from that time on Hess held the edge in the argument.

When I asked the late Mike Finn, my manager, for \$50 of that money, he wrote me a letter bawling the daylights out of me and saying that he guessed the big town had made me "money mad."
