T. B. TESTS OF DAIRY CATTLE START MONDAY

All Owners Asked to Request Tests Before Next Wednesday.

Tubercular tests of dairy cattle in Klamath will be started next Monday by Dr. F. H. Thompson, Eugene, federal veterinary inspector. It was announced today by County Agent C. A. Henderson.

All owners of dairy cattle who desire to have their livestock

tested are requested to get in touch with the county agent's office immediately. Dairymen who fail to send notice before next Wednesday lose their chance of securing the tuberculin tests. The tests will be conducted the same as in previous years. No charge will be made.

PRODUCTION FORECASTS MADE BY GOVERNMENT

WASHINGTON, July 11, (A P)—Production forecasts of this year's crops, issued today by the department of agriculture on July 1 conditions, placed corn at 2,662,630,000 bushels; winter wheat at 882,492,000; Durum wheat 55,378,000; other spring wheat 193,099,000 and all wheat 833,869,000 bushels.

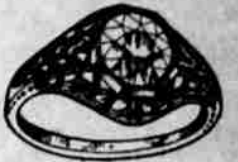
