PORTLAND, Ore., July 12. (U. P.)—Be careful of small abra-

Dr. Eller. Common among them are black moles, skin irritation caused by handling arsenic or taking it internally, venereal diseases, and others. "Black moles are always dangerous," the doctor told his audience, "especially if they are located where they are subject to irritation. They are usually deep rooted, the part that appears on the surface being only a fraction of the mole imbedded in the tissues. If such moles show the slightest sign of activity they should be removed thoroughly, and all at one time." Cancer has a great aid, that is a scourge of the human race, Dr. George Stevenson, also of New York, declared in an address before the section. That aid is fear.

"Fear of disease, especially cancer, causes many persons to magnify unimportant symptoms, and drives them to the doctor," Dr. Stevenson declares. "Among other greatly feared diseases are gallstones, ulcers of the stomach, paralysis, tuberculosis and heart trouble."

D. A. R. PLACES YAINAX MARKER

More historical markers being placed by Eulalona chapter. Daughters of the American Revolution were established yesterday at Yainax Agency and at the spot where the treaty was

signed with the Plutes.

Captain O. C. Applegate, accompanied by his daughter, Mrs. Rachel Applegate Solomon, regent of Eulalona chapter and Mrs. Wilbur Jones, active worker in the local chapter made the trip, covering more than 140 miles over rough roads.

The first marker was established at Yainax where the sub-

station was established in 1869.

Mrs. B. D. Wallace, field matron at the Agency assisted in placing the marker.

The second marker was placed on the spot where the treaty was signed with the Snakes, known as the Plute tribe in August, 1865.

Paunina was the chief of this tribe.

Other temporary markers will be placed by the local chapter within the near future. As rapidly as funds are available, permanent markers will be established.
