

CLARA BOW TO MARRY MUSIC COMEDY ACTOR

Actress Admits Engagement; Marriage Will Be Held Soon.

LOS ANGELES, July 12, (AP)—Clara Bow, oft referred to as the "It" girl of the screen, is engaged to be married.

The announcement came last night from Harry Richman, musical comedy actor and night club owner of New York, who is the bridegroom-to-be. The marriage will probably take place within a month, pending completion of pictures Miss Bow and Richman are now participating in at separate studios.

Many times reported engaged, the announcement was the first one to which the actress made a confirmation. "As soon as we complete our respective pictures," said Miss Bow, who is ill at her Beverly Hills home, "we are going to get married."

"No definite plans have been made for the wedding, and we will not be sure of them until we know when we can set a date."

The actress' physician said she was recovering from an illness due to food poisoning.

The romance, which took root when Miss Bow was on a vacation in New York several months ago, was renewed when Richman arrived in Hollywood to take part in his first talkie.

Richman began his career at a cafe near Los Angeles, later going to New York where he first met with success. He was married to Yvonne Stevenson in 1918 at Santa Ana, Cal., and divorced in 1922. Miss Bow has never been married.

SEATTLE STAR WINS TOURNEY

PORTLAND, Ore., July 12, (AP)—Mel Dragna, Seattle star and former University of Washington varsity player, was the new Pacific northwest sectional tennis champion today after he defeated Ross Hocking, Victoria, B. C., yesterday in straight sets, 6-1, 6-4, 6-4.

Dragna's victory ended the sectional feature of the thirty-first annual Oregon state tennis meet, which officially ends Saturday. Doubles, junior and boy's titles of the northwest were settled earlier in the day.

By winning the title, Dragna took possession of much silverware and was given the right to enter any northwest or California tournament. He had not decided today where he will play next.

CRIMINAL SAYS HE SLEW WIFE

LAKEPORT, Cal., July 12, (AP)—Facing life imprisonment under the habitual criminal law, Edward Bishop, "three-time loser," in jail here on a charge of passing bad checks "confessed" to Sheriff L. O. McKelley, last night that he killed his wife in San Diego four years ago and had kept silent until his conscience forced him to disclose the crime.

Although authorities immediately ban an investigation Sheriff McKelley declared he placed little credence in the story.

AT THE LIBERTY

Do motion picture stars share the desire of the American people

for happy endings in film productions? In more than 90 per cent of the cases they do, according to Gilda Gray, famous dancing queen and new motion picture star who acts her first starring role in "The Devil Dancer" now at the Liberty theater. "Picture stars," says Miss Gray, "are ordinary human beings like the very fans they play to. These fans love happiness and not sadness. I don't think they can ever be educated or persuaded to really come to like pictures with unhappy endings. I, for one, do not mind the injection of tragedy in a production because, after all, real life does have tragedy, too. But for my part I want to see everything end happily. The reason for this is simple enough. The Americans are anything but gloomy in their lives and their thoughts."

paid-up members of the industry here made a flat refusal of the demand, insisting that open shop would continue.

Rumors, the source of which could not be located, were current yesterday that the Equity association planned a preliminary strike by setting today as the last time in which members can appear as extras with non-talking picture production work. Producers maintained that the proposed walkout would include insufficient members to cause embarrassment.

Equity officials refused to comment on the reports.

JUST A NICE JAUNT

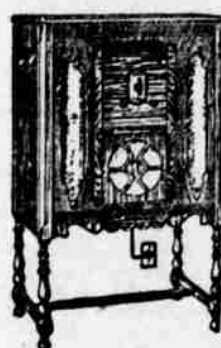

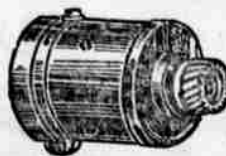
