SCOUTS LEAVE FOR LAKE CAMP

Summer Encampment Officially Opens at Base of Mount Pitt.

Fifty Boy Scouts left the court house at 10 o'clock this morning to attend the annual summer camp at Lake O' the Woods, under the supervision of Scout Executive O. E. Hoover.

The camp this year is to extend over a four weeks' period and a truck will leave the court house at 10 o'clock each Sunday morning to transport boys who wish to spend the week enjoying the scout vacation. The boys can stay for the whole four weeks if they wish, or can stay for only one week or as long as they desire. Some of them were taken up in private cars or by parents, but most of the boys left Sunday morning in the large truck which is being donated by the California Oregon Power company.

Emphasize Health

The program at the camp this year will emphasize scout advancement, good health, fellowship and practical hiking and training in water safety. Ample opportunity will be given for all boys to pass their requirement tests. In addition to the second and first class tests, special attention will be given to merit badges.

The new camp ground is better located than the one used last year and is free from campers so that the scouts can enjoy the entire camp themselves. Parents are invited to visit the boys on Sunday, which has been designated as visitors' day. Visitors should drive to the Lake O' the Woods store, where the forest service boat will take them to the camp and return them to their cars again later in the day.

New Mess House

The construction of a new mess house will be completed today with the arrival of the boys. Its dimensions are 32 feet long and 20 feet wide, much larger than the former one. Mr. Stewart, who cooked for the boys last year, will again have charge of the cookhouse. Wednesday the new headquarters cabins will be completed.

The executives will be housed in the new quarters and a store is to be established for the convenience of the scouts. The trading post will sell to each scout not to exceed 15 cents worth a day of candy, gum or ice cream. Each boy arriving in camp will deposit his money at the trading post and will be charged with his daily expenditures. Certain non-restricted articles can also be purchased here.

Will Take Hikes

Any registered troop scout or visiting scout or lone scout of the Klamath Area circle, and any scout official is invited to attend the camp. A list of all requirements has been given to each prospective visitor.

The last five days of the camp the older scouts will enjoy an extended hike which will take them up to Sky lakes. These boys will sleep and eat out in the open.

Next Friday two sections of the scouts will leave for Fry lake. On the following morning one division will climb Mt. Pitt, led by Tom Cunningham, eagle scout, and the other under the direction of Scout Executive Hoover will go to Four Mile lake.

Boys wishing to go to the camp after this week are requested to see Dr. Adams for a physical examination before entrance. Each boy should have a slip from Dr. Adams before entering the camp. A hospital and all medical and first aid supplies will be established at the camp in the headquarters cabin.
