ALTURAS, Calif., July 15.—Modoc county is noted for its stock interests, more cattle, sheep and hogs being raised here than in many other sections of the west.

The income from sheep alone with the sales of mutton, lambs and wool has been estimated to total around \$2,000,000. Cattle bring in about one million dollars while hogs net the owners in the neighborhood of \$50,000 annually.

AT THE PINE TREE
A beautiful dark-haired girl and a motley assortment of underworld denizens, abetted by more spooky sounds than were ever presented before on the talking screen, were seen and heard at the Pine Tree theater last night when "The Hole in the Wall" opened.
