Phil Metcham Inquires—

"Ever hear how a band of 12 Molalla Indians were murdered by a war party of Klamaths near the Higdon ranch, on the upper reaches of the west fork of the Willamette river?" Inquired Phil Metcham. "George H. Kelly of Westfir, who is saturated with early-day history, showed me the place where the wholesale killing occurred last Friday. It appears that a Molalla stole a girl belonging to the Klamath tribe and abused her. The girl escaped and returned to her people, telling her story. A war party was organized and started for the Molalla country. The Klamaths found a dozen Molallas on a hunting expedition at a little unnamed lake on the Higdon place and killed every one and left the bodies where they fell. White settlers found them later and buried them on the spot. The Klamaths returned home, having exacted a terrible retribution. The Molallas were not natives of the river hearing their name, but roamed over a considerable portion of the Willamette valley and had frequent encounters with the Klamaths."

FAMOUS PLANE TO TRY FLIGHT ACROSS OCEAN

NEW YORK, July 16. (UP)—The "Southern Cross," first airplane to span the Pacific, will leave London within the next few days on an attempt to fly the Atlantic, it was announced today.

Capt. Charles Kingsford-Smith and C. T. P. Uim, its pilots, said that the recent failure of several other east-to-west attempts had not discouraged them and that, with a little overhauling of their craft, they expected to start for New York as soon as possible.
