

Fighters in Great Shape for Elks "Super" Card Tonight

CLINE SET FOR BATTLE; WHITE IS CONFIDENT

Supporting Card of Four Six-Round Bouts Exceptionally Good; Styled as "All Main Event Card;" Fights are Open to Entire Public.

In the "pink" for their respective battles, the fighters who will appear in the super fight card at the Pelican theatre tonight, were ready for the bell today.

From the main event on down to the first ring squabble, the pugilists are in wonderful condition. Road work, sparring, and rigorous gymnasium work-outs have put them in good shape for their battles.

Johnny Cline is perhaps the most "hopped" up fighter that has ever been seen in a Klamath ring. The cauliflower-eared veteran is bound and determined to put up the best fight in his career against K. O. White in the ten-round main event. Cline will weigh 160 pounds and White 165 pounds.

The remarks of each main event were terse and to the point.

"I'm going to put up the best fight of my career," said Cline who hails from San Francisco, "I'll establish myself again as the most popular boy in a Klamath ring. White, they say, is tough and has never been knocked out; neither have I and I've fought over 500 fights. When I get the kyo I'm through and will start digging ditches."

White was even briefer in his comment. The Chicago battler merely said he planned to be the first to hang a knock-out on Cline.

"Those iron chinned boys just has to crack some time, and ah've got a wee, wee hunch that tonight's the time Cline cracks," he said.

Both fighters fight the same style, a charging offensive with both hands swinging; both can absorb terrific punishment and both have long and enviable records in the ring. White will have a small weight advantage and the added advantage of youth; Cline perhaps knows more tricks of the trade and has had vastly more experience.

It should be a gruelling battle. Insofar as the semi-windup is concerned, that appears to be a made-to-order scrap. "Buzz Saw" Burnell, weight 153, Bob Jubb, weight 151, will throw gloves at each other for six rounds—that is, it is a scheduled 6-round bout, but quite likely a kyo punch from one or the other will end the fight abruptly. If tonight's card was not a "super" affair, Burnell and Jubb would probably be listed as main events.

Another bout of main event standard will be the clash between Ray Huffman, one of the flashiest welters on the coast, and the cagey veteran Chuck Borden of Eugene. Huffman will weigh 151 and Borden 148. Huffman needs no introduction. He has fought two main events in Klamath and is a head line attraction anywhere. Borden is a real fighter. For example he administered the only defeat Jack Kentworth ever received and Kentworth on the other hand has beaten Huffman.

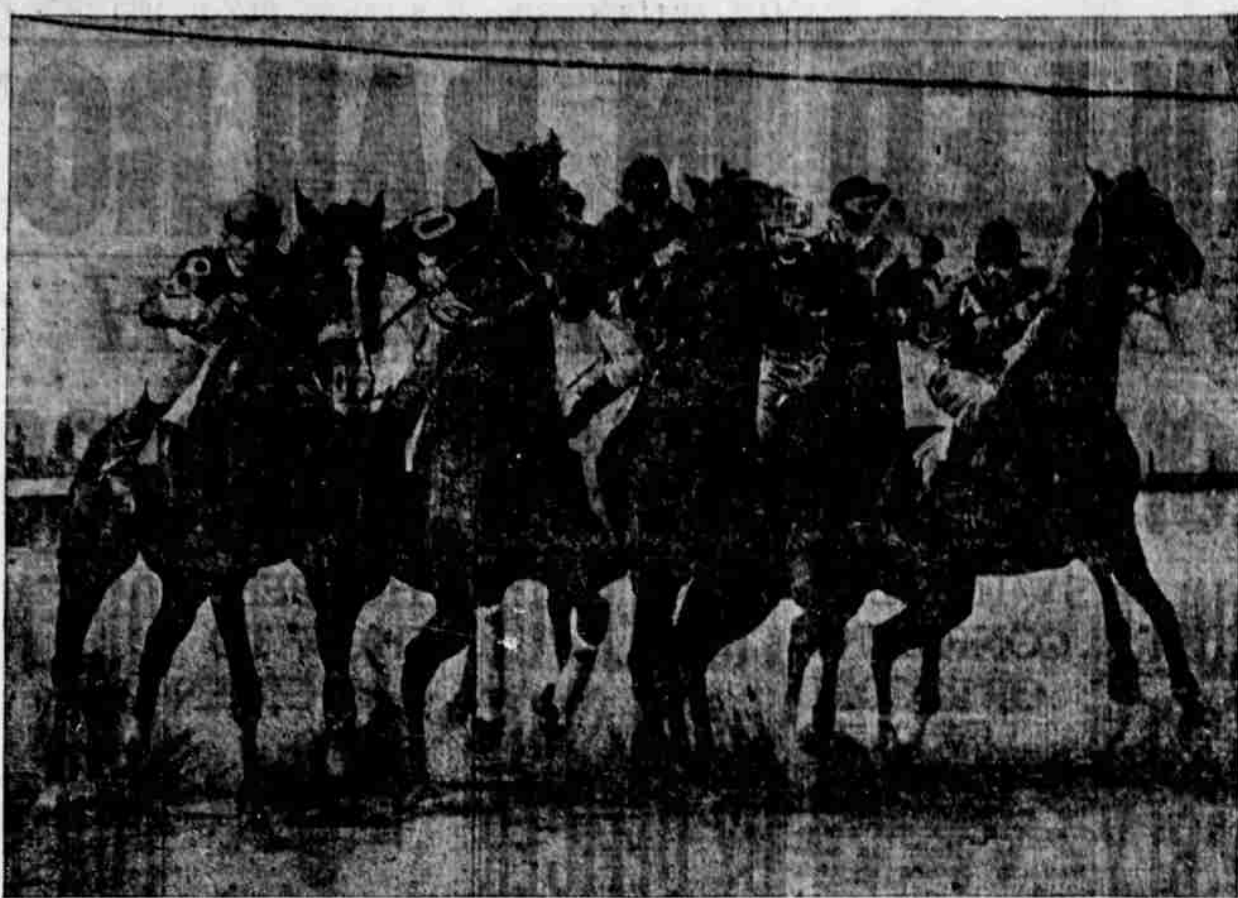
Huffman fought two great draws here with Frankie Warneke—in fact the first fight he had a slight shade, but too slight to call it.

It should be a real battle. The outcome of the next bout on the program is the cause of some speculation. Jack Kentworth, slashing Portland fighter, trades blows with Gentleman Jim Jacobs, a tall Eugene fighter. Kentworth is a leaping, plunging, hard-hitting slugger while Jacobs lies back and picks them off with hard rights and lefts. Kentworth's record is fine; he fought a draw with Frankie Warneke, kayed Red Hayes in the second, won two decisions from Pat Dundee, won a decision over Ray Huffman, knocked out Buzz Kirk, the Pendleton

Two flashy bantams will open the card. They are Johnny Snell, rosy checked Portland lad, who is as fast as greased lightning, who will cross gloves with a tough boy in the person of Lloyd Farmer. Snell weight 118 pounds and Farmer 119. They should put up a real scrap.

All-in-all the entire card, from top to bottom, looks like a "natural"; there are too many fights of main event caliber for it to go wrong. If one happens to blow up, there are four more of almost equal merit to make the card a success.

The fights will be staged in the Pelican theatre. Either Jimmy Richardson of the Multnomah club of Portland or Mayor Tom Watters will officiate as referee. The card is open to the entire public and a packed house is indicated. The first fight begins at 8:30 p. m. sharp.

Noted Racing Promoter to Handle Meet

William P. Kynes, the man who promoted the race program at Reno and the man who will promote a 20-day racing program at Portland the last of this month, arrived yesterday on the Cascade from Reno, Nev., to manage the Elks three-day racing program which opens Friday.

More than 70 horses will be here to enter the races. A carload of the best stock from the Reno races will arrive Tuesday, consisting of 16 of the fastest horses which raced in the Nevada city. Following the meet here the horses will be taken to Portland.

Already 60 horses are working out daily on the track at the fairgrounds and the track is being worked each night to keep it in the best of shape for the race meet which will open Friday.

It is planned to hold five races each day. With the large number of horses here it will probably be necessary to run the horses in heats, it was learned. California Jockey club rules will govern all races here.

CUBS, PIRATES BATTLIN GOVER PREMIER PLACE

Giants Apparently Slipping Fast in National League Race.

With the National League race threatening momentarily to become a strictly private affair between the Pirates and the Cubs, John McGraw deployed his forces upon the Polo Grounds from this morning in an attempt to stem the corsair rush. The impending series may be called crucial for the Giants alone; to the jaunty Buccaneers it constitutes just four more ball games.

The Giants brushed up yesterday for their do-or-die effort by bowing courteously to the fallen Cardinals, who came to life and accepted the decision by 6 to 1. The Pirates got only an even break at Boston, but nevertheless

less remained ten notches ahead of the Giants in the important column dealing with games lost. The Cubs profited from the Pirate slip by smothering the Phillies, 16 to 3, and so gaining half a game on the leaders. The Pittsburgh margin now is just two games.

Burliegh Grimes lost his second game of the season when the Braves took the first game, 7 to 4, and Buccaneers coming back to take the second 13 to 5. Brooklyn crowned three Cincinnati pitchers for seventeen hits to win the final game of the series by 10 to 5.

The Athletics dropped another one to the Indians, who won by 5 to 2 behind Walter Miller's six-hit pitching. Young Bill Shores was the victor.

The Mackmen nevertheless remained eight games ahead of the Yankees, who controverted the loss off a four-run lead in the ninth and permit the Tigers to win by 9 to 8 in the tenth. Babe Ruth's twenty-second homer and some smart pitching by Waite Hoyt, up to the final crash, went into the discard.

Sammy Gray gained an even break for the Browns in their series against the Red Sox by pitching five-hit ball yesterday to win by 4 to 0.

The Senators won from the White Sox in the final game of the series at Chicago, by a score of 6 to 2.

Even the Heavy Ball Spins Some

In a recent article I spoke of the strange fact that some players throwing a ball with apparently identical speed and distance, throw a ball that is light as a feather when caught, while others "handcut" the receiving player's hands with a ball that is "heavy as lead."

Walter Dunning of Brooklyn, N. Y., claims he has the scientific solution. "You certainly know the pressure of air," he writes. "A ball without a spin to push its way through the air and to travel at a certain speed requires more force than a ball that is light as a feather when caught, while others "handcut" the receiving player's hands with a ball that is "heavy as lead."

"If any 'heavy' ball thrower would put a spin on the ball he would overcome this fault."

Fair enough, but it doesn't entirely answer my original query, because I have seen notoriously "heavy" ball throwers throw a ball that spins.
