CAN WOMAN DOMINATE MAN?

COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 6.—Two women stand out in striking contrast in the sensational murder of Miss Theora Hix, 20-year-old medical student, by Dr. James Howard Snook, 49-year-old professor at Ohio State university.

One is Mrs. Snook, who in her first public statement since the murder investigation revealed the intimate relations of her husband with Miss Hix clearly indicated she is the patient, loyal, submissive type of wife.

"The Howard Snook to whom I have been married seven years could not have done this thing," she said. "He always provided me with a good home."

"He is my husband. He is the father of my child."

"I will go to him as soon as I am permitted."

The "other woman" in the case is the exact opposite of Mrs. Snook, according to the confession obtained from Dr. Snook. The former veterinary instructor, although claiming he really loved his wife, says Miss Hix, who seemed to shun the company of students of her own age, was an interesting companion, but that she was dominating and aggressive.

"She was trying to run my affairs; telling me what to do and I didn't like that," was the way Dr. Snook put it. He asserts the direct cause of the murder was Miss Hix's insistence that he spend the week-end with her in their "love nest" in Columbus and his refusal to do so. He says her last words, before he brutally killed her, were:

"Damn you, I'll kill you, and your wife and baby!"

Theora Hix seems to have been strangely like another girl who figured in an equally notorious murder near here a few years ago—Frances Nesbitt, of Troy, O., who was killed by her young husband, Jake Nesbitt.

Frances Nesbitt and Theora Hix were neither of the conforming, submissive kind. They were determined, capable . . . ready to take life in their own firm young hands and bend it to suit their own wills if it started off on a path they didn't like.

After Frances Nesbitt, who was so much stronger than her husband that she finally went into a rage and killed her, was slain, a psychologist who studied the case quoted a famous paragraph from Freud to explain it:

"Normal nature demands one sex in the ascendancy. Tradition, history of society, have always given this role to the male. Today woman is in the ascendancy. We must prepare for an epoch of cataclysm while society becomes accustomed to what it regards as the abnormal reversal of the sex roles."

Both Theora Hix and Frances Nesbitt were college women. Both were just 25.

Neither was flashy nor loud. Each looked out with clear eyes from under high foreheads from which the hair was combed back tightly and straight. Each had oval features, straight noses, wide mouths and a quizzical, half-superior look in the eyes. Each knew what she wanted in life and was determined to get it.

Jake and Frances Nesbitt, for instance, were popular members of the young married set in Troy. They danced, played golf and went to parties at the country club. Frances boasted that she was no housekeeper. She didn't need to be. She had a job. Both she and her husband were salesmen for a household appliance concern, and she could hire all the household help she needed.

Then, unexpectedly, came the tragedy.

Finally after an extended investigation the story came out: how, day after day, Frances would taunt Jake with her report of her good day's work, would remind him that he wasn't as good a salesman as she was, would upbraid him because she was earning more money than he was. So that finally he flew into a rage and killed her.

life term in the Ohio penitentiary.

Theora Hix was determined to get what she wanted out of life. The bespectacled, middle-aged professor of veterinary medicine also played a part in her life. He prepared to abandon his part; and Theora Hix did not propose to let him.

Snook flew into a rage and asserted his dominance by pounding the girl to death and slashing her throat.

Yet Mrs. Snook—a resigned, patient ex-school teacher—did not fare much better.

She hadn't tried to mould life to suit her wishes. She tried to mould herself to suit life. In a well modulated voice, she told detectives that she and Snook never had any trouble.

Until her marriage seven years ago, she was an elementary school teacher. She is now 41 and at the time of their marriage Dr. Snook was 42. She is about five feet five inches tall and slightly plump. Her hair approaches the sandy type.

She told detectives of their little daughter, Mary Marple Snook, aged two. She said that during her married life she never suspected another woman was friendly with her husband.

Mrs. Snook made it a practice to retire early, while her husband generally took an evening stroll, frequently to visit Miss Hix. Often he said he wanted to get a 9 o'clock edition of a local paper. Her husband would come in about 10 o'clock with the paper. She would then come downstairs, prepare him a sandwich and would glance at the paper while he ate.

She liked housework and was an active member of the Methodist church.

Since Snook was past 40 when they were married, she said, he was somewhat fixed in his ways; but there had been no trouble, because she had studied his habits, and had adapted her own to conform with them. She wasn't like Theora Hix. She tried to make herself over, to be utterly submissive, so that life could be sweet to her.

But, like Theora, she failed.

Ignition and Tires Cause Most Trouble

Times and ignition systems cause motorists the most trouble, according to an analysis just completed of the 785,742 emergency service calls answered by emergency road service departments of the 1,071 clubs affiliated with the American Automobile association. The Oregon State Motor association. Three A club in this state, reports a similar trend in its rendering of statewide free emergency road service to members.

During 1928, A. A. A. clubs handled 226,236 requests for tire help, 122,051 summons because of faulty ignition, towed 95,060 cars and took gas to 32,267 stranded motorists. Among other important calls were:

Starter 22,481; battery 63,289; wrecks 28,274; carburetor 18,862; stuck in mud 17,282; miscellaneous 14, 140; gas line 14,139; frozen 3,928; brakes 3,142; lights 2,357 and glass 788.

Calls for tires and ignition represent 52.1 per cent of all emergency service requests, while the "big seven" combination, including tires, ignition, tow, starter, battery, out of gas and wrecks represent 90.5 per cent.

OPEN NEW FAST MAIL SERVICE

Information Received by Klamath County Chamber of Commerce.

A new fast schedule speeding up the air mail between Pacific coast cities became effective Monday, according to information sent the Klamath chamber of commerce from the Pacific Air Transport.

"The general public, particularly the business men, are such constant users of the air mail that I feel they will be glad to

be informed of any change which will further speed up their correspondence," Earl Reynolds, executive secretary of the chamber of commerce, said. "It will, no doubt, be with interest that the public learns Air Transport lines have recently been reduced by an average of 25 per cent."

The Pacific Air Transport fares are now little if any more than the price of the rail trip between any two points if pullman fare is included in the latter. Some of the reduced fares are given: Portland to Tacoma, \$12; Portland to Seattle, \$12; Portland to Medford, \$20; Portland to Oakland, \$40; Portland to Los Angeles, \$65; Medford to Tacoma, \$30; Medford to Seattle, \$30; Medford to Portland, \$20; Medford to Los Angeles, \$65.
