

SOVIET TROOPS ARE ON MOVE

Nanking tonight said Governor Chang Hsueh-Liang of Manchuria had telegraphed Nanking for instructions in view of the fact that "soviet troops since morning had apparently commenced a positive movement placing Manchuria in great danger."

Manchuria had previously been reported from Osaka, Japan, sources as "captured" by Russian troops, but some confusion existed in the report, and the day failed to bring confirmation of it. The Nanking dispatches to Manila did not mention the hour at which Governor Chang's messages was sent.

MOSCOW, July 19. (AP)—The acting head of the soviet government told American newspapermen that soviet Russia had no intention of declaring war on China over the Manchurian situation.

NEW YORK, July 19. (AP)—A crowd of several hundred persons, many of the massed to demonstrate sympathizers today staged a demonstration in front of the Chinese consulate in Astor place which police reserves were required to disperse.

WASHINGTON, July 19. (AP)—A statement condemning Russia for recognition of the binding force of the Kellogg pact in the present controversy with China and reiterating hope and belief that the difficulty between the two nations would be adjusted

WASHINGTON, July 19. (AP) Secretary Stimson has called to the attention of both the soviet and Chinese governments the fact that they are signatories of the Kellogg anti-war treaty in connection with reported threats of war between the two countries.

The murder of Lockhart happened during a drunken brawl near Southern Pacific railroad camp, 14 miles north of Canby on Sunday morning.

Three bullet wounds were found in the dead man's body at the post mortem examination conducted by Dr. A. F. Gligson and Dr. McKenney of Alturas, Cal.

A .45 caliber bullet was removed from the victim's neck where it had lodged after passing through the front of his face, breaking the jaw. The bullet and a .38 caliber revolver, said to be the one used by Lockhart in the fight are held by John Sharp, sheriff.

The shooting affray occurred during the break-up of a gambling game.

Marguerite Lockhart, 23, Mexican, wife of Lockhart, identified Villarino at the city jail this morning as one of the men who killed her husband, according to Keith Ambrose.

She accompanied Sheriff John Sharp here to aid in the search of Villarino.
