

YOUNG DOUBLES TEAM OF U. S. IS VICTORIOUS

Van Ryn and Allison Score Impressive Win at Berlin Today.

BERLIN, July 20, (AP)—America's dashing young doubles team made its third victory in a row for the United States against Germany here today, capturing the clinching match from the German pair of Daniel Frenn and Hans Moldenhauer, 9-11, 6-2, 6-4, 6-3 and thus giving America the first right to meet France in the Davis cup challenger round.

Johnny Van Ryn and Wilmer Allison, fulfilling the hopes of their countrymen, smashed through Germany's finest pair in impressive fashion after a slow start, which lost them the opening set.

Gaining strength and confidence with every stroke, they swept the Germans off their feet in the last three sets to win as Bill Tilden and Frank Hunter had done in the opening singles of the after zone final of the day before.

Regardless of the outcome of the remaining singles matches tomorrow, the United States now will be the challenging nation against the French in the contest for the cup next week-end in Paris.

This will be the fifth straight time that France and the United States have met in the challenge round.

SEALS ADVANCE ANOTHER NOTCH

Ten Homers Smacked Out in Coast League Yesterday.

The Seals made it four straight over the Sacramento Senators, winning by a score of 8 to 1 in the Bay city. Malls did the pitching and kept the Seals well out of trouble. Gus Suhr, coast league homerun king, hit a double, a homerun and won a pass in three times at bat with Vin on the mound.

Herman Pillette, handy hurler of the Mission Reds, pitched his mates to a victory over the Seattle Indians, 5 to 1, in the northern city.

Jim Edwards, lanky Oakland pitcher, succumbed to a batting attack by the Angels which carried that team to a 7-to-3 triumph in the southern city. Walter Berger led the drive with a double and three singles and scoring four runs in four trips to the plate.

Hollywood and Portland again split even in their double-header on the latter's field, but Portland was fortunate enough to win the first encounter, the only one to figure in the standing. The score in the first was 11 to 4. In the second it was 8 to 2.

WILL UHLE'S FATE BE THAT OF CADORE OR OESCHGER??

Endurance flyers stay out more than 200 hours in a plane and after a bath, shave and a 36-hour snooze are their old selves again. Endurance pitchers stay out in the box for 20 or more innings in one afternoon and it's a question whether they are still good pitchers or ready for baseball's bone heap.

A few weeks ago George Uhle of the Detroit Tigers pitched a 21-inning game against the Chicago White Sox. It was a nice warm afternoon and as Uhle was breezing along with such consummate ease, Manager Harris decided to let the big fellow blow himself to a nice extra inning victory.

Now the baseball public is debating whether Bucky kicked one and ruined the Lakewood Bull's arm forever or if Uhle will shortly snap out of the slump that overtook him right after the iron man exhibition.

Trouble Finishing

Uhle, whom Detroit secured from Cleveland during the winter in a trade, had started off to be the league's greatest pitcher. He rolled up a string of nine consecutive wins, including the long-winded one over the Sox. Since then he has had trouble finishing a game losing five out of his next seven starts.

The question of Uhle and his 21-inning game brings to mind the longest game in the baseball records and the fate of the opposing pitchers who engaged in it. On May 1, 1920, Leon Cadore of the Brooklyn Robins and Joe Oeschger of the Boston Braves hooked up in a hurling duel that went to a 26-inning tie. The score was one and one when darkness interrupted further punishment—both to fans and players.

Oeschger Carried On

Cadore never was the same pitcher after that, but Oeschger went on to quite a few more years of big league stardom. The slim Brooklyn moundsman left something in that game he never recovered, although he essayed many a comeback.

Oeschger, on the other hand, remained one of the league's best pitchers. He was secured by the Giants shortly after and turned in many more extra inning wins for John McGraw before he was through.

Back in 1906 the Philadelphia Athletics and the Boston Americans staged a 24-inning endurance contest. Jack Combs went all the way for the Athletics, while Joe Harris not the famous "Moon" withstood the grind for Boston. Harris finally weakened and the Athletics won 4 to 1.

That game saw the last great effort of Harris, but it proved only a workout for Combs, who carried on to be the nucleus of Connie Mack's great hurling staff of a few years later.

NOVICE BEATS M. ROSENBLUM

Fred Lenhart Decisively Outpoints New York Fighter Last Night.

(SPOKANE, Wash., July 20, AP)—Fred Lenhart of Elk, Wash., until last night just a young light-heavy with an erratically powerful right hook, today was on the threshold of the upper division and looking for a chance to get in.

In a 10-round bout with Maxie Rosenbloom of New York at Alan arena last night, Lenhart decisively outpointed the conqueror of Leo Lomski with an exhibition of boxing that was a mild sensation to the 4,000 fans who crowded the arena.

In at least three of the 10 rounds Lenhart had Rosenbloom into the ropes and in the last two forced him to the limit to stay on his feet. Choosing to box instead of trying for a knockout, Lenhart stood toe to toe with the New Yorker and piled up enough points to win five of the rounds decisively, while two went to Rosenbloom and three were even.

Lenhart weighed in at 177, two pounds over the light-heavy limit, and Rosenbloom weighed in at 168 1/2.

In the semi-final Tommy Gardner of Walls Walla, Wash., won everyone of eight rounds from Herman Runyan of San Francisco, and satned a unanimous decision.

WALKER ISSUES HIS CLAIM FOR ANOTHER TITLE

PHILADELPHIA, July 20, (AP)—Jack Kearns, manager of Mickey Walker, world's middleweight champion, announced today that he would claim the light heavyweight title for Walker, in view of Tommy Loughran's statement that he would relinquish the 175-pound crown.

The middleweight titleholder is booked to meet Leo Lomski, Aberdeen, Wash., in a 10-round bout at the Municipal stadium here August 19.

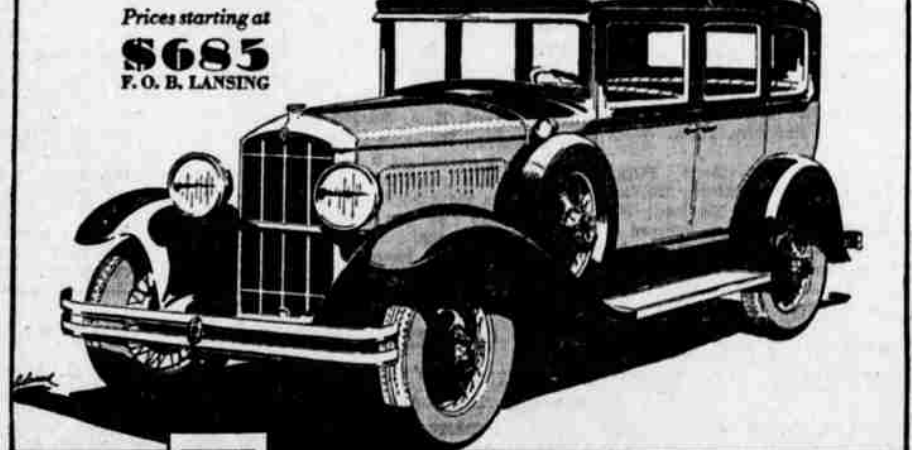
GAUDETTE AND WOLF DRAW IN 10 ROUND BOUT

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BABE RUTH OUT INDEFINITELY

Deny That Famous Player Will Remain Out of Game Forever.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 20, (AP)—Babe Ruth, homerun king and the idol of baseball, was out of the game indefinitely today. A pulled muscle sustained in the game with Detroit Wednesday retired the Bambino in a game with the Cleveland Indians yesterday and Miller Huggins, manager of the Yankees, said today that no one knew when the New York American league player would bat again.

Huggins scoffed, however, at the thought that the Babe is gone from baseball.

"It would be foolish for me to say anything like that," Huggins asserted. "Babe's muscles do not respond to treatment as readily now as when he was a few years younger, but it is too early to predict the end of his playing career."

Ruth injured his left leg in a game with the Detroit Tigers last Wednesday. He returned to the lineup here yesterday against the Indians, and no one knew but that his under-pinning was in perfect order when he went to bat. Willis Hudlin, Indian pitcher, gave him a free pass and the injury showed up when he moved to second on Lazzeri's single. He was retired but remained in the Yankee dugout for the remainder of the double-header.

Ruth, according to Huggins, will remain in Cleveland until the end of the series and then will return with the team to New York. He would make no statement.

PRO IS WINNER OF OPE N TITLE

Neil Christian Scores Brilliant Victory in Northwest Tourney.

(By FRANK G. GORRIE Associated Press Sports Writer SEATTLE, July 20, (AP)—A professional will wear the Pacific Northwest open golf crown during the next 12 months but the coveted title will continue to make its home in Portland.

The title was transferred from Dr. O. F. Willing, Portland amateur, to Neil Christian, Portland professional, yesterday when the brilliant Waverley club "Boss" ran away from the field

over a 72 hole route. Christian scored a remarkable 290—two under par—for the two days' play to win the tournament championship on the Ingleswood course. A spectacular 69 on his morning 18 holes put the Portlander out in front and he was never headed.

DIXON MAY BE MATCHED WITH D. SHADE SOON

OAKLAND, Calif., July 20, (AP)—An offer to box Young George Dixon, hard-punching negro middleweight of Portland was telegraphed today to Dave Shade, lantern-jawed Californian now sojourning in the east, by Promoter Louis Parente of the East Bay Athletic club. Dixon achieved prominence recently by stopping Jack Malone, St. Paul veteran, who has fought the leading middleweights of the country.

TILDEN BEATS GERMAN STAR

BERLIN, July 20, (AP)—Bill Tilden smashed his way to victory over Hans Moldenhauer of Germany in three straight sets today to give the United States the opening match in the Interzone Davis cup tennis final against the Germans.

Tilden won by scores of 6-1, 6-4, 6-4.

Big Bill carried too many guns for Moldenhauer. The German, eight years his junior, carried more speed of foot than Tilden, but the wizardry of the American's racket, dealing out a disconcerting mixture of cannon balls, stinging drives, volleys and drop shots, had him guessing all the way.
