

# POWERS STRIVE TO CHECK WAR

## Thoughts We've Been Thinking

Growers Held Responsible for Disorderly Course of Wool Marketing. Owen B. Young Looks Like the Next Nominee of the Democratic Party.

WOOL growers this year experienced the lack of organization and most of them know it. Speaking of the low price of wool and why it existed, the National Wool Grower, in its July issue, stated "there is no room for debate as to the growers being responsible for the unreasonable and disorderly course of affairs that has so far been evident in the selling of 1929 wools. Insistence of so many individuals upon making sales at any sort of price to be had has permitted the highly organized dealer to have his own way."

IT is the same old story that has often been told; any producer who is not organized falls prey to the dealers who are organized. The wool men of the west have suffered a tremendous loss this year because they were not organized and those who bought their wool were thoroughly organized.

AND while we are discussing the wool and sheep business it is of exceptional interest to note that range ewes are being shipped to New York state. Recently Mr. Charles H. Bragg, of Holly, New York, made his eighth annual shipment of breeder ewes to his native state. This year's shipment included about 8,000 head which were purchased in Idaho and in Utah. The shipment consisted mainly of white faced yearling ewes with a few Hampshire cross breeds included. These ewes are distributed by Mr. Bragg from his farm in Buffalo, New York, and will go to various sections in the states of New York and Maryland. They are used principally for breeding hot house lambs which are bought in December and January and marketed when around six weeks old.

IF OWEN B. Young keeps up his battling average in national affairs he is bound to be the nominee of the democratic party in the next national convention. Last year they nominated Al Smith, governor of New York state, and it looks very much now like they would nominate Mr. Young as their next "Standard Bearer" for the party of Thomas Jefferson.

## SHIP SETS NEW MARK FOR SPEED

Breaks Record Attained by Mauretania, Says Report.

## BIG VESSEL MAKES 705 MILES SUNDAY

Plane Catapulted From Deck of Germany's Fastest Boat Brings Word of Rapid Speed Made by Teuton Vessel in Trip Across Ocean.

NEW YORK, July 22. (A. P.)—The new German liner Bremen reached Ambrose Light at the entrance to New York harbor at 3:02 p. m. this afternoon, easily breaking the speed record for ocean crossings held by the Mauretania.

NEW YORK, July 22. (AP)—The seaplane New York, carrying a cargo of express mail, landed in the bay at 1:35 p. m. today from the liner Bremen, where it had been catapulted from the deck.

The Bremen, newest and fastest greyhound, was near the end of the speediest trans-Atlantic voyage.

Messages from the ship to the offices of the North German Lloyd line, indicated a Sunday's run of 705 miles, one mile more than the world's record she had established on Saturday. Her speed at one time was 35.25 knots an hour. The day's run showed an average speed of 25.2 knots.

Captain Leopold Zeisemann said in a radio message that he expected to pass Ambrose Light at the entrance to New York harbor, at 3:30 p. m. today. This would enable the ship to dock at 5:30 p. m., four days, 18 hours and 18 minutes after she left Cherbourg. The present record, held by the Mauretania, a five days, two hours 34 minutes.

Since the voyage of Columbus, which statisticians say would have consumed 49 days had he followed the path of present day liners, the time for the trans-Atlantic passage has been reduced.

## G. N. RECEIVES BOARD SUPPORT

SAN FRANCISCO, July 22. (AP)—The San Francisco board of supervisors today unanimously voted to intervene with the interstate commerce commission in behalf of the project of the Great Northern railway to enter California from the north and connect with the Western Pacific.

The proposed connection, opposed by the Southern Pacific railroad, would run from the Great Northern's southern terminus at Klamath Falls, to a point on the Western Pacific line in Plumas county, Cal., a distance of about 200 miles. The proposed construction would cost from \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000.

## "Old Peppersass" Makes Final Trip up Mountain; One Man Hurlled to Death

MT. WASHINGTON, N. H., July 22. (AP)—Stories of hardship and heroism were recounted today as several hundred persons, including governors of seven states who assembled here Saturday to witness the final run of "Old Peppersass" up the mountain, scattered to their homes, sobered by the tragedy which claimed the life of a photographer and brought destruction to the celebrated locomotive. Daniel P. Rositter, Arlington, Mass., who was hurled off the engine as it sped down the steep cog railway after a triumphant trip to the summit, was killed. The injured included Edward C. Frost, who was at the throttle when "Old Peppersass" first climbed the mountain back in 1869, and who was operating it for the last time, his 16-year-old son, Caleb, Winston H. Pote, Swampscott, Mass., photographer, and W. L. Newsham, Concord, fireman.

They all leaped from the locomotive as it careened dizzily down the steep trestle known (Continued on Page Eight)

## NO TRACE FOUND OF 3 WOMEN

SAN FRANCISCO, July 22. (A. P.)—Three elderly California women missing in several rugged sections of the state, were still the objects of fruitless searches today.

Authorities and private trackers engaged for over a week in hunting for Miss Edith Irene Wolfskill, missing from her Solano county ranch, were about to give up the search.

Medocino county officials kept up a hunt for Mrs. E. N. Rowe, 77, who dropped from sight Thursday noon while picking berries near her ranch south of Fort Bragg.

Another search was instituted by Tulare county officials for Mrs. S. E. Knight, 71. She walked away from the home of her son near Visalia and has not been seen since. Sheriff's deputies said the woman was probably wandering in the woods near the dwelling.

A systematic search of the ranch near Fairfield and surrounding country for Miss Wolfskill has failed to reveal a trace of the woman. Miss Betty Ritchard, of Los Angeles, former nurse of the eccentric heiress, told authorities she is convinced (Continued on Page Eight)

## 'YOUNG' HARRY WILLS JAILED

SEATTLE, July 22. (AP)—Charged with threatening to kill his wife, Gladys, Clarence T. Smith, 22, negro boxer who fights under the name of "Young Harry Wills," was in the city jail today.

The boxer had taken his wife for a ride Friday night, Mrs. Smith told police, stopping at a secluded spot where he announced his plans for killing her. Mrs. Smith said her husband told her he would either beat her to death or give her a start and then shoot her.

He decided on the latter course, the woman said. At his command she stepped away several paces, turned her back, covered her ears with her hands and waited. Smith fired a shot, she continued, but it was wild. Silently the couple then got into the car and drove home.

Saturday, she thought over the matter and decided her husband's attitude had been wrong.

### CALLS TO VISIT

LAREDO, Texas, July 22. (AP)—General Plutarco Calles, former president of Mexico, crossed into the United States here at 9 o'clock this morning and after inspecting a company of soldiers from Fort McIntosh and receiving a salute of 21 guns, boarded a train for New York.

### NO ACTION

Prisoners Burn Tool Shop During Fight.

## PRISON OFFICERS USE MACHINE GUNS

Soldiers Leave for Prison to Aid Officers in Handling of 1,500 Convicts. Officers Silent as to Cause of Outbreak.

PLATTSBURG, N. Y., July 22. (AP)—More than 1,500 convicts at Clinton prison, Dannemora, revolted today, injured two guards, burned the carpenter shop and made an unsuccessful attempt to rush the prison wall.

The 124 prison officials manned the walls, armed with rifles and machine guns, and kept the prisoners at bay.

All details of the outbreak were withheld by prison officials, but it was learned that every available state trooper at the Malone barracks was on the way to Dannemora, and Colonel Madden, commandant at Plattsburg barracks, had wired the war department at Washington for permission to send a detachment of United States soldiers to the prison at the request of Warden Harry M. Kaiser.

Receiving permission from Washington, Colonel Madden dispatched a motor truck loaded with soldiers armed with rifles and bayonets to Dannemora to aid in quelling the riot.

## FIRE DESTROYS OWENS RANCH

Fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the \$5,000 ranch home of Jim Owens late Sunday afternoon.

The ranch home, located between Bly and Lakeview, was one of the finest in that district. It is understood the loss was partially covered by insurance.

Owens, the owner, is a prominent sheepman.

## EARL EDWARDS BEING SOUGHT

A wire was received this morning by Keith Ambrose, chief of police, to aid in the search for Luther Earl Edwards who is reported to be in Klamath Falls or vicinity.

The wire stated that Mr. Edwards' brother, Grant, had been drowned Sunday afternoon and was sent from Clatskanie, Oregon. Anyone knowing the whereabouts of Mr. Edwards is asked to get in touch with Chief Ambrose at the city hall or wire W. A. Edwards at Clatskanie.

SALINAS, Calif., July 22. (A. P.)—Rough riding cowboys, many of them wearing the crowns of world champions, scattered to their homes throughout the West today, with more than \$6,000 in grand prizes won at the eighteenth annual rodeo, which came to a close here yesterday. The great round-up of ranch talent, one of the last colorful remnants of the West that was, was declared by officials to have exceeded in its record-breaking capacity any of the previous shows staged here. All marks for attendance were lowered during the five days of the rodeo.

## WATER IN GAS ENDS LONG HOP

EDMONTON, Alberta, July 22. (AP)—Captain Rosa G. Hoyt's attempted flight from New York to Nome, Alaska, and return has ended in a crash near Valmont, B. C. He was on his way here from White Horse, Yukon, on the third leg of his homeward trip yesterday.

The United States army flier escaped injury, but his Curtiss Hawk pursuit plane was wrecked. Hoyt had been expected to arrive back at Mitchell field, New York, today if he maintained his pace. He had battled wind and rain since Thursday, with practically no sleep, and had covered nearly 6,000 miles. He left Mitchell field at 2:38 p. m. New York time, Thursday.

Bad weather in Alberta forced him down. He lost 12 hours on the northward flight, and tried to make up lost time. A message sent from Fairbanks, Alaska, told of a "tough trip to Nome and return, with rain and low clouds the entire distance."

From Fairbanks Captain Hoyt flew back to White Horse, a distance of 500 miles. He hopped off again at 11 a. m. yesterday. (Continued on Page Eight)

Efforts to dig out the entombed men were fruitless, owing to the volume of debris. It was believed a subterranean river runs through the mine, which is one of the oldest mines in the Malay country.

## PEACE PACT ARGUMENT PREVAILING

Word Received That Both Russian and China Will Cease Hostilities.

## REPORTS RECEIVED OF SEVERE BATTLES

World Powers Stand on Sideline and Observe Development in China-Russia Conflict; Hope That Something Can Be Done to Stop Big War.

WASHINGTON, July 22. (AP)—Secretary Stimson was advised today by Ambassador Claudel of France that he had been informed the Soviet if possible would abide by the Kellogg pact for the renunciation of war. This word was brought to the state department a few hours after Chinese Minister Wu had informed Secretary Stimson that it was the intention of his government to abide by the pact.

NANKING, China, July 22. (A. P.)—Foreign Minister C. T. Wang of the nationalist government tonight stated that "China will appeal to the League of Nations in connection with the Russian crisis if the soviet violates the spirit of the Kellogg pact."

SHANGHAI, July 22. (AP)—Japanese press dispatches from Nanking late today said the nationalist government had decided to appeal to the League of Nations for settlement of its controversy with soviet Russia growing out of its seizure of the Chinese Eastern railway in Manchuria.

The appeal is to be made in the event Russia takes a positive action in connection with the Chinese Eastern railway," the dispatch said.

TOKIO, July 22. (AP)—Rengo dispatches today from Harbin said Chinese officials alleged soviet troops were in the city. (Continued on Page Eight)

## THOUSANDS DIE IN EARTHQUAKE

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 22. (AP)—Latest reports from northern Antolia state that recent earthquakes and landslides have caused the deaths of one thousand persons. Ten thousand are homeless and without food.

As reports of the disaster continued the Turkish Red Crescent society began rushing aid to the assistance of the victims while the Constantinople Press is appealing for the help of the international Red Cross.

Shocks and landslides, the latter caused by torrential rains were reported to be increasing the havoc in northern Antolia where recent inundations devastated the towns of Surmene and Rizer.
