## TENNIS PLAY FINDS MANY OUT OF CUP

### Challenge Round for Davis Cup Friday

PARIS, July 23. (AP)—With the lineups of the rival teams settled, the American and French tennis players settled down today to complete their training and strategy for the Davis cup challenge round, starting this Friday.

Two daily periods for use of the courts at Roland Garros stadium have been set aside for the Americans, Big Bill Tilden, George Lott, Wilmer Allison and John Van Ryn. Their daily sessions are at 10 a. m., to noon, and 3 to 5 p. m.

The draw for the singles will be held Thursday morning at 11:30 Lott and Tilden are the American choices while Henri Cochet and Jean Borotra will play for the French. The draw will be without ceremony, only the two captains, M. Pierre Gollon and Pils Ruhr Dixon, participating.

## SHARPE'S PROMOTION IS TOLD

Edward H. Sharpe assistant manager of development and colonization of Southern Pacific has resigned to assume direction of public relations for the Aviation Corporation, it was learned today. Sharpe has been with the Southern Pacific and affiliated companies in San Bernardino, Los Angeles and San Francisco for 17 years. He has been prominently identified with that company throughout the west as its point of contact with newspapers and civic and agricultural associations. The Aviation corporation owns a controlling interest in five air transport companies. These companies operate between 54 principal cities in 19 eastern and middle western states, one of them the Universal Aviation corporation operates an air mail-passenger service between New York and California. The Aviation corporation likewise controls the Fairchild Aviation corporation which manufactures air planes and parts and has subsidiary companies manufacturing aerial photographic equipment for making aerial surveys. The corporation has a substantial interest in and management control of Roosevelt Field, Inc., it has a number of aviation schools for the training of pilots. The Aviation corporation's companies operate air mail contracts for approximately 4,613 miles and have a passenger mileage of 7,639 with a combined airways mileage of 9,222. Mr. Sharpe's headquarters will be in New York City.

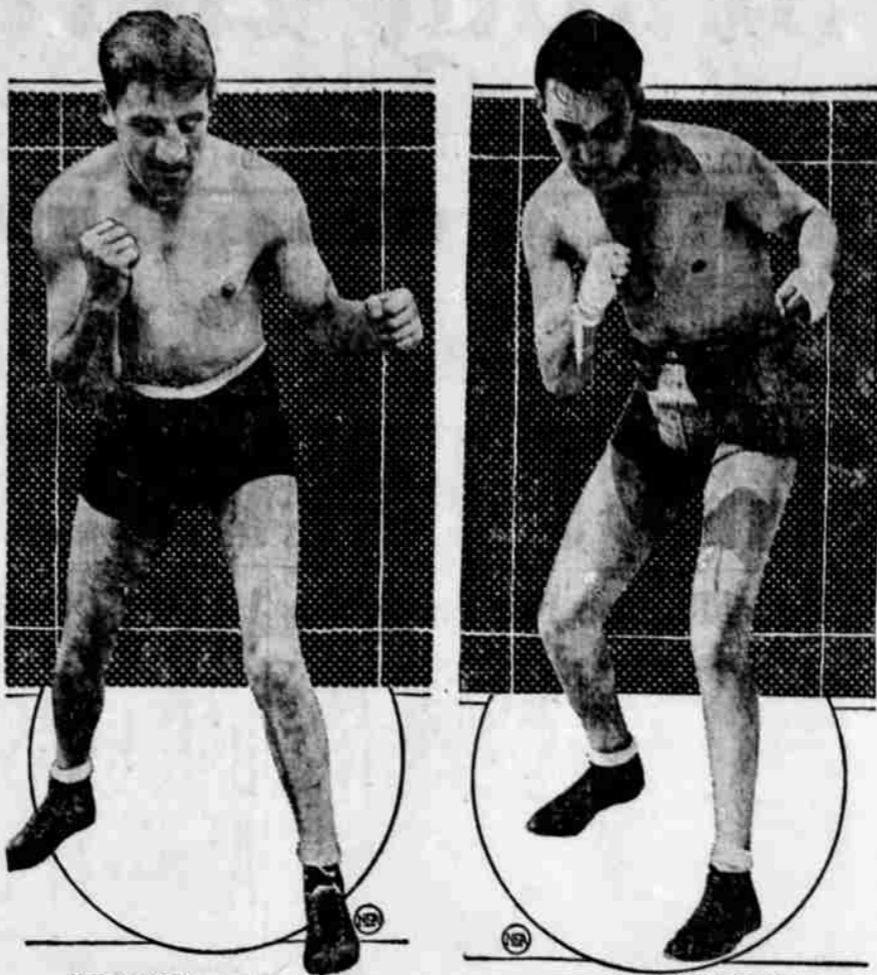

## CHAMPIONS IN BOTH CORNERS

DETROIT, July 22.—Joe Dundee of Baltimore, lantern-jawed world welterweight champion, has finally been lured from the security of over-weight matches to risk his crown against a contender at the division weight.

Dundee will meet Jackie Fields of Chicago, recognized welter champion in the twenty-six states of the national boxing association, in a fifteen-round title fight at the state fair grounds here July 25.

It is Dundee's first appearance in a title bout since he won the championship from Pete Latzo two years ago. It is Michigan's first fifteen-round championship fight under the revised state law, permitting full length battles where a title is involved.

### Both Champs

The battle is to be the opening bill in Floyd Fitzsimmons' new outdoor arena, the largest plant in the country dedicated solely to boxing, and it is the first bout between two champions in the same division, each with a definite claim to the title.

Fitzsimmons' new arena seats 22,000, and can be expanded to take care of 100,000, if Detroit should get a heavyweight championship shot. It is erected on

state property. Fitzsimmons holds a ten-year lease from the state, with the option of 44 years more. He has constructed a permanent outdoor fight plant, with every seat elevated back of the first ten rows of ringside.

Although Dundee has been making only overweight matches since he became champion, Helms Blaustein, one of his handlers, claims that in his last showing, when he stopped Billy Alger in eight rounds in Pittsburgh, in June, the champion showed the same wallop that wore down Pete Latzo, that kayoted Tommy Freeman in four rounds in Madison Square Garden, and that stopped Mickey Walker in eight rounds, the only time Walker has been stopped in a decade. Dundee cracked Alger with a right uppercut in the eighth round and the fight was over.

Fields Winning, Too

Fields has been active and uniformly successful since his two-round knockout of Sergeant Sammy Baker in Los Angeles last October. He has won ten knockouts and seven decisions in 17 fights, his final appearance before the title bout here being a one-round knockout of Farmer

Joe Cooper in Chicago, June 23. It took Fields only a minute and 44 seconds to flatten Cooper, who never had been knocked out.

Both fighters have established their training camps in Detroit. Fields working out at the state fairgrounds, near the big arena, and Dundee at Eastwood Park, a short distance away.

SEATTLE, July 23, (AP)—An automobile containing five persons plunged over a 200-foot embankment seven miles east of Renton, killing Mrs. W. E. Wick of Seattle. The others escaped with slight injuries.

## SEALS HOLDING FIRST PLACE IN SECOND HALF

### Los Angeles Angels Running Close Second

By The Associated Press Pacific Coast league clubs changed battle grounds today to resume the waning season's struggle for the few remaining 1929 honors, with the San Francisco Seals holding the lead for the second half, and the Los Angeles Angels a close second.

The Seals set a dizzying pace during the first two weeks of the new half, winning eighteen of their twenty-two games, thus displacing the Hollywood Stars in the leadership.

Hollywood went north leading the league, but took a terrific beating at the hands of the reorganized Portland Ducks, losing six out of seven games that counted in the series, and winding up in fourth place.

This week the Seals play the Oaks at Recreation Park, the Mission Reds play at Portland, Hollywood plays at Seattle, and the badly bent Sacramento team faces the Angels in the southern city.

TO COMPETE FOR TITLE NEW YORK, July 23. (AP)—Jess Swester, formerly American and British amateur golf champion, is to compete for the national amateur title in the tournament at Pebble Beach, Cal., Sept. 2-7. He has filed his entry along with 20 Americans and five British golfers. The list closes tonight.

SUE CARROLL ENGAGED HOLLYWOOD, Calif., July 23. (AP)—Sue Carroll, motion picture actress, today displayed square cut diamond on her engagement finger, and admitted her engagement to Nick Stuart, film star. No plans have been made for the wedding.

## Beacon Lights Installed for Night Flying

Construction work on the installation of power lines to sites for beacon lights for air mail night flying, between Delta, California and Drain, Oregon, will start today according to an announcement made this afternoon from the local California Oregon Power company.

The work will take about six weeks, and for the most part will be in mountainous country. The government will install electric beacons on the summit of the Siskiyou instead of gas beacons as originally planned. The Richfield Oil company has installed a beacon there and the government beacons will be supplied from a power line installed and paid for by the oil company.

The sites of beacons in California are: Delta, La Moine, Flume Creek, Dunsmuir, Shasta (Hick Butte) Weed air port (Edgewood), Gaselle, Yreka, Black Mountain and Horubrook.

Lights to be installed in Oregon will be placed at different air ports and stations and will include the Siskiyou summit Stehman, Barron ranch, Butte Valley, Gold Hill, Grants Pass, Sexton mountain, Grave Creek, Wolf Creek, Stage Coach Pass, Cow Creek, Canyon Mountain, Missouri Bottom, Weaver Hill (Myrtle Creek) Roberts Mountain, Mt. Nebo at Roseburg, Wilbut, Sutherland, Rice Hill, Yonocolla and Drain.

On the opening night ladies will be admitted free.

On the opening night ladies will be admitted free.

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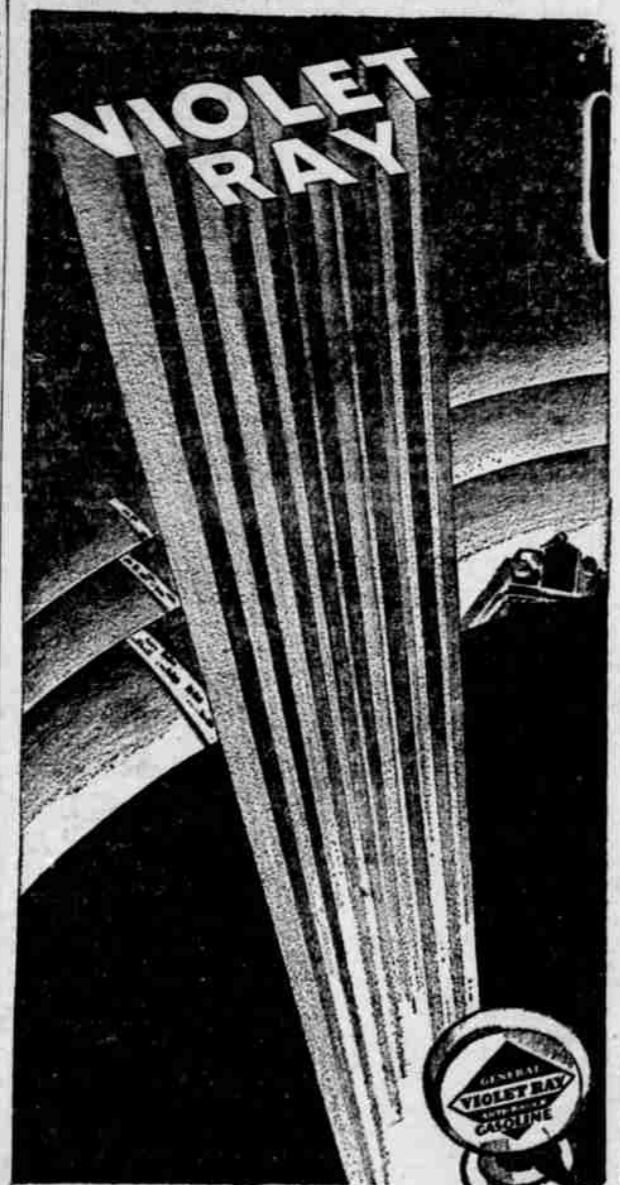
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
