## AT THE PELICAN

Critics have been in their praise of the simplicity and beauty - without - benefit-of-jazz in the first Eddie Dowling all-talking and singing picture, "The Rainbow Man," at the Pelican theatre.

"The Rainbow Man" is believed to be one of the first musical sound-films to break into fame without the aid of "hey-b" or "vo-deo-do."

The sponsors of the picture dared to make the venture despite the tremendous traditional urge for musical whoop-de-do and saxaphonic fanfare. And they won.

Dowling's picture has a moving, human plot. The hero is a small-time actor and he continues to be one throughout the film. He doesn't suddenly strike shale oil and millions in the musical comedy manner, nor does he fight a duel with thirty villains to win the girl.

The songs are lovely melodies, easily remembered, but not of the "hot" or "blues" variety.

Douglas Fairbanks as the valiant D'Artagnan will open the story of "The Iron Mask," at the Pine Tree theatre now, by stepping from a huge tapestry representing The Three Musketeers and speak the prelude to this story of the undying love and valor of the brave guardsmen in whose hands rested the safety of a kingdom. This spoken prelude will vividly and dramatically present the theme of the story as well as introduce an entirely new and perhaps revolutionary method in sound films. The complete film will be presented with sound and orchestral synchronization as well as the spoken interludes in which the various important characters voice their intents and motives.

With a new twist to the eternal triangle, "The Law and the Man," Rayart's new drama from the Octavus Roy Cohen story, "False Fires," has come to the Liberty for a run of two days.

The plot centers about the political situation in a community which is ruled by one Dan Creedon, who is in love with Margaret Grayson, a woman attorney, though she in turn has only a warm friendship for Dan, and has announced her engagement to Ernest Vane, a young architect, member of an aristocratic but poverty-stricken family and with a personality which is rather warped in many respects. Dan, who lets nothing stand in the way of his desires, sets out to prove to Margaret in his own fashion that she was meant for him. He makes her district attorney, then through political intrigue he dis honors the name of Vane, who is accused of forgery. Then Margaret has to decide between love and duty, for as district attorney she has to prosecute her fiancé or betray the trust placed in her by the townspeople.
