Animal Life At Crater Lake—

Animal life in Crater Lake National park is plentiful this year. The bears returned early and are in good condition. Deer are reported daily along the rim road. Possibly the most interesting report received from visitors and rangers is that of a small group of elk, seen along the rim road on the east side of the lake. These elk are part of a herd placed on the Klamath Indian reservation several years ago. The herd has increased to over two hundred head, and now that they have been reported within the park boundaries we may expect this feature to be added to the many others which the tourists may enjoy.

Field Parties At Lake—

Field parties of geology students from prominent eastern universities visit Crater Lake annually, and because of the marvelous opportunities to study the various phases of volcanism they often extend their stay beyond schedule. POPE RETIRES AFTER 60 YEARS

day of St. James the Apostle.

The Pope, accompanied by his entourage, left his private apartments at 8 o'clock and went in the Sedia Gestatoria to the altar of the sacrament and then to the altar of confession where he said mass.

After the mass the Pontiff left St. Peter's in the Sedia while the seminary students enthusiastically applauded.

Workmen this morning put the last touches on 25 drinking fountains constructed by the municipality within St. Peter's square for the convenience of the vast throngs forced to stand in the blinding sun for many hours this afternoon awaiting for this evening's historic emergency of the "prisoner of the Vatican."

Fifteen thousand Italian soldiers, several thousand black shirts and city police took assigned places in the plaza as the day advanced, lined some places eight deep, observing the utmost precaution against violent outbreaks of enthusiasm which endangered the religious procession from the Vatican to St. Peter's.

Marking the end of 60 years, self-imposed imprisonment for rulers of the church, Pope Pius planned to leave the Vatican bearing the sacred host at 7 p. m. (1 p. m. E. S. T.), proceeding near the end of the long procession to an improvised altar on the steps before the cathedral.

The procession as nearly as possible will be a reproduction of the corpus christi procession which the Pontiff partook in prior to the fall of the temporal power. A color guard of the Pontifical gendarmes will open the procession in full uniform, followed by the colors of the Papal guard with an escort, heralds with trumpets and pealing church bells over all Rome will proclaim its advent.

Every effort was made to maintain a holy and solemn aspect to today's ceremony. Squads of Italian airplanes will patrol the Vatican city to prevent other craft flying above while it is taking place. Crowds were requested specially to abstain from

cheering, and rigid orders against cameramen were invoked. It was believed despite these some pictures would be obtained.

At 7:30 p. m. his holiness, kneeling on a raised platform, and absorbed in adoration of the sacred host held high before him in the ostensorium, was well around the square in the wake of the procession.

All the famous chiming of Rome's 400 churches broke out and rang continuously from 7:10 p. m., while the pope was passing around the circumference.

The pontiff's emergence from St. Peter's was marked by a few minutes of silence immediately preceding his appearance. The procession was stopped for several minutes then, in order to permit a great crush of people to pass through the lines of troops from the piazza to St. Peter's square.

hole in the desert waste lands region, which was six miles distant, apparently was not found. It was estimated by the youths that the family had been dead for more than two days.

C. L. Gillett, sheriff of Imperial county, sent deputies to the scene of the tragedy immediately after the reports were received here. They returned early today to substantiate the story of the Mexican youths.

The father was found near the automobile, which he appar-

ently had attempted to repair. Tracks in the wasteland led the searchers to the others. The mother and three children were found huddled together. A short distance away was found the bodies of two small boys.

The deputies reported the bodies to be in a bad state of decomposition. An inquest was expected to be held some time today.
