Funeral Rites for Sinnott to Be Held Friday

THE DALLES, Ore., July 25. (AP)—Funeral services for Nicholas J. Sinnott, for many years representative in congress from the Second Oregon District (eastern Oregon), and recently appointed justice of the United States court of claims, will be held here Friday in St. Peter's Catholic church. Public services will be held at 9 a. m. in the city auditorium, to be followed by religious rites at 10 a. m. in the church. State officials and other prominently identified with the state will attend the services.

Robert R. Butler, Representative Sinnott's successor in congress, will deliver the eulogy at the auditorium service. Requiem mass will be celebrated in the church at 10 o'clock and interment will be in the Catholic cemetery here.

Honorary pallbearers at the funeral will be Senators McNary and Hawley, Governor Patterson, E. B. Wood and J. P. O'Brien of Portland; E. C. Pease, P. J. Stadelman, George C. Blakeley, J. A. PATROLMEN SURPRISE RUM GANG

EL PASO, Texas, July 25. (AP)—Four border patrolmen surprised a band of 20 rum runners at the Rio Grande last night and in a pitched battle killed two of them and wounded another.

Five of the band were captured and three motor cars, two trucks and more than 150 gallons of whiskey were confiscated.

Descending upon the rum runners in motor cars the patrolmen mounted a fence near the Rio Grande banks. The rum runners opened the battle and before it ended, two were killed and another wounded seriously. It was reported that several hundred rounds of ammunition were fired.

None of the patrolmen was injured. H. C. Horseley, chief of the border patrol, said that one of the men captured, a negro truck driver, confessed his part in the band's activities and implicated several others, including the man said to be the ring leader.

The 'Wet Press' Menacing Hand In Prohibition

ALBANY, Ore., July 25. (AP)—Declaring "wet newspapers" are emphasizing killings by dry agents and "belittling killing of dry agents by law violators," Dr. H. E. Close, superintendent of the Oregon Anti-Saloon league, yesterday appealed to ministers to set their congregations right on the matter of prohibition enforcement with a view to overcoming the "propaganda of the wet press," and to building up popular opinion that will demand law enforcement. Dr. Close addressed the 39th session of the Presbyterian synod of Oregon, meeting here.

Influence of the news stories telling of the deaths resulting from prohibition enforcement is weakening the confidence of Christian people in the prohibition enforcement, Dr. Close declared. He pleaded with ministers to educate and train young people under their charge "to understand the prohibition issue to the end that they will meet it in the right way."
