INSPECTION OF LIGHTS NEXT MONDAY

Officer Hartin of Lakeview is also expected to arrive the first of the week to aid in the work and possibly a state traffic officer from Medford will be present.

The last inspection was held the first of June and out of the 175 cars that were inspected

more than 44 per cent were found to have defective headlights or large spot lights that did not come under the state traffic rules governing such things. It is expected that the percentage will be much smaller this month because of the warning signs that have already been passed out, stated Foster.
