BARTON REID FRULAN

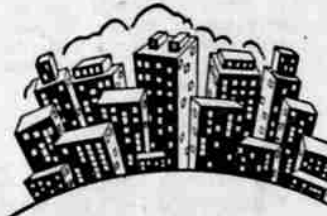
