**Modern Way To Cook Vegetables**

Save the Vital Elements and Improve the Flavor.

Try this Carrot Loaf recommended by one of the experts. Scrape enough carrots to make a pint of pulp. Boil in slightly sweetened water until tender. Then mash. To the pint of pulp, add 3 well-beaten eggs, ¼ teaspoon of salt, ¼ teaspoon of pepper, 2 teaspoons of sugar and ¼ cup of cream. Pour into a well-buttered mold. Stand this in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven until firm. Turn out on hot platter and surround with peas and serve with white sauce.

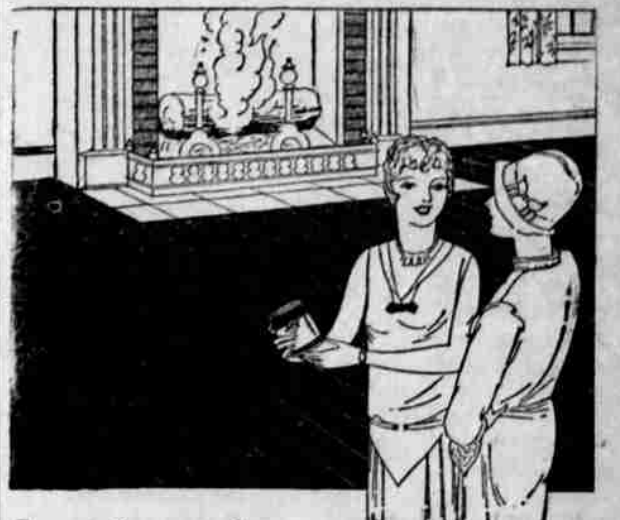
**At Shaw Bertram—**
