A final clean up was made on the wool of Lake county this week and when the remaining clips except for a very few small ones, went into the hands of the buyers.

D. D. Bush, representative of Draper and Co. of Boston purchased about 34,000 pounds which included the clips of K. O. Sutck, Silver Lake, Earl Small, Silver Lake and Ivan Cain. These went for prices ranging from 21 1/2 to 24c.

About 30,000 pounds were purchased by Ernest Clark agent for Walter M. Marston of Boston. The owners were Flynn and O'Connor Bros., John O'Leary and Sherlock and Sons. The price was 25c.

The purchase of these last large clips leaves very little wool left in the county.—Lakeview Tribune.
