LAKE O' WOODS HAS AIRPORT

Medford Fliers Land; Will Have Labor Day Fete at Resort.

Supervisor Hugh B. Rankin of the Crater national forest made the announcement recently that, due to the warm weather and increasing vacation trips each year, that lots at Lake O' Woods were selling more rapidly than ever before.

There are 88 lots now leased or reserved at the lake. Of this number 25 have been leased since the opening of the 1929 summer season. The lots are leased by special use permits which automatically become effective each year unless they are revoked.

The price for one lot for a year's time is now \$10. When buildings are placed on the lot taxes must be paid.

Some lots are still vacant but portions of the other lots have all been spoken for. People are urged to make arrangements at once for leasing them if they wish to have summer homes on the lake.

RED MEN MEET IN RAPID CITY

RAPID CITY, S. D., Aug. 1. (AP)—The best of the tom-tom, the mournful chant of the war dance and the feathered brilliance of hundreds of Red men furnished a spectacle that took Rapid City back to the 70's when Indian and White fought for the gold of the Black Hills. From as far away as the Hopi and Zuni reservations of the southwest, they had trekked, most of them in covered wagons, Sioux, Utes, Cheyennes, Arapahoes, Kiawas and Crows—tribes that once were bitter enemies.

In strange contrast with the missions that once brought them to the Black Hills, the scene of the many tribal conflicts as well as the wars with the Whites, the occasion for today's gathering was a meeting of the council of American Indians. It was called to discuss the pending suit against the government for several hundred million dollars, claimed by the Indians for their loss of the Black Hills; and to talk over other problems of concern to the race.
