BORAH ASKS ENGLAND TO SINK SHIPS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2, (AP)—Great Britain was called upon in a statement issued Thursday by Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee, to sink some of her ships as a means of reaching a parity with the American navy.

Borah said England has 59 modern cruisers, while America has 18 built or building.

"If Great Britain will follow our example at the Washington conference," he said, "and sink some of her ships, and thus come to parity, it will not only save the taxpayer, but reduce the incentive to war—for huge armaments are always an incentive to war. But if we have to build up to parity, it vastly increases the burdens of the taxpayer and augments the incentive to war." The Idaho senator was a lunch-room guest yesterday of President Hoover, and it is presumed the impending naval limitations conference between Great Britain and the United States was discussed.

HI SAY, OLD DEAR! PHILADELPHIA, — A member of the firm of Selfridge & Co., Ltd., has returned to dear old London quite impressed with America and its hotels. It is said that "his astonishment knew no bounds" when by pressing a button in his hotel room he saw a bad gently depositing itself in the "sitting room." He found time to compliment American girls, however: "There aren't any flopping girls in America. All are so well-tailored—dressed much better than English girls."

AT THE PELICAN Although a New Yorker by birth, James Murray, appearing with Barbara Kent in Universal's "The Shakedown," at the Pelican theatre now, may well call himself a citizen of the world. Before entering pictures Murray spent several years as a wandering actor.

His first theatrical experience was gained in 1922 with a bit played in the New York stage production, "The World We Live In," produced by William A. Brady. The taste of theatrical life enjoyed by Murray while appearing in the play started him on the career that eventually brought him to the screen.

Murray played small parts in pictures in the east and once interpreted the role of John Adden in the picture, "The Courtship of Miles Standish," produced by the Yale University Press. He came to Hollywood three years ago after a trip around the world during which he partially worked his way as a member of various ships' crews.

AT THE LIBERTY Art Goebel, one-time holder of the world's record for upside-down flying, plays an important role opposite Al Wilson who stars in "The Air Patrol," the Universal Western aerial melodrama now showing here at the Liberty theatre. A bit of the sensation derived from this thrilling sport may be gained from his descriptive version.

"There is very little danger in flying upside-down if the airplane is taken to a high altitude before the feat is attempted," said Goebel. "Turning the plane over as

commonly done in the 'loop' is the first step, but after the ship is upside-down the wings are brought to the horizontal position and the plane runs along exactly as when right side up. It descends very rapidly, however, and it is quite impossible to hold it in that position any great length of time. The record has been smashed a number of times unofficially but the latest official record is held by a French air ace. It is 4 1/2 minutes."

AT THE PINE TREE In "Alias Jimmy Valentine," now playing at the Pine Tree theatre, William Haines plays the part of Jimmy Valentine, a crook who reforms, and does it in his customary playful manner. Lionel Barrymore, Lella Hyams, Karl Dane and Tully Marshall are included in the cast.

On the same program are the planes of the 51st Observation Squadron. There are several scenes of Crater lake taken from very unusual scenes in this newsreel.

AT THE ORPHEUS Waltz music has long been considered one of the most charming forms of musical expression. In spite of the spread of American jazz throughout the world, waltz music still haunts the memory.
