PRISON TERMS GIVEN FIVE MEN

Five men were sentenced to terms of one to three years at the penitentiary in the circuit court this afternoon.

Judge O. Corkins, circuit judge of Lake county at Lakeview, presided during the absence of Judge Duncan.

Caasimer Kintner pleaded guilty to the charge of burglary of a store located on South Sixth street, just outside the city limits, on July 28. Kintner has the reputation of being a vagrant and has not been known to work since he has been here. He was sentenced to the penitentiary for two years. Leniency may be granted pending word of his behavior.

Ivan E. Stout, who has been in Klamath Falls under the name of J. E. Morgan, was arrested on the same charge. Stout waived preliminary hearing and was given the minimum sentence of two years.

One year sentence was given Paul Anderson on the charge of grand larceny in a store. Anderson entered Magill's drug store recently, caused considerable suspicion by his actions and was caught with an alarm clock hidden under his arm.

Joe Eftman received a sentence of three years in the state penal institution. Eftman has been forging checks in southern Oregon and northern California on the Chiquito bank and Dorris state bank. He is a reservation Indian and has been in trouble before this time.

Judge Corkins stated that reports of his behavior would be received regularly and leniency may be granted.

Under the recommendation of the State Cattleman's Association William Clement received a penitentiary sentence of two years. Clement pleaded guilty

and waived preliminary hearing to the charge of larceny of a horse.

This is not his first offense, as he has served sentences in the county jail on similar charges before. At the present time he is on parole from the Yreka jail.

One woman, Freda Carter, was brought before the court and was paroled to the office of the district attorney with orders to report once a month. Freda Carter, 20-year-old girl of Chiloquin, was arrested for larceny in a dwelling. She had taken numerous household articles from a house where she worked, valued at \$150. She was arrested on March 16, but as this is her first offense she was given parole.

Joe Aguerre, Mexican, changed his mind at the last moment, and through his interpreter asked to be temporarily released. His trial will be held at a later date. Aguerre was arrested a week ago in Alameda by Officer MacNab and Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

Harry D. Bolvin, deputy prosecutor, represented the state in all cases. The five men will be taken to the penitentiary at 9:30 tomorrow morning under the direction of Robinson and a Burns Detective Agency representative.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 3. (AP)—The Reading company announced today that its high frequency receiving set was in touch with the Graf Zeppelin at 2:45 a. m. E. D. T., when the ship was positioned at 39.30 west and 36.29 north.

The Reading's station picked up a message saying "light tail winds. All well. Men still playing bridge."

The Reading statement also said that it picked up the following:

"Wing motors not working so well at times. The reserve motor is O. K."

The Reading's receiving set is on the ninth floor of its railroad terminal in this city.

STOWAWAY NOT POPULAR GIBRALTAR, Aug. 3. (AP)—The stowaway who jumped aboard the Graf Zeppelin as she was leaving her hangar Thursday morning is anything but a hero to Dr. Hugo Eckener, the ship's commander and will find himself in the hands of the authorities as soon as the air liner reaches port.

The wireless message picked up here from the Zeppelin said that the stowaway was being held a prisoner in the crew quarters and would be turned over to the Lakehurst port authorities. Dr. Eckener's position was that he had endangered the lives of the passengers and the ship's safety by jumping on the Zeppelin's envelope in getting aboard.

ABOARD THE GRAF ZEPPELIN, Aug. 3.—By Wireless to the Associated Press.—The position of the Graf Zeppelin at 8 a. m. G. M. T. (3 a. m. E. S. T.) today was about 500 miles west and slightly south of the Azores. The airship was making up time again and had pushed up the motors to a speed of 115 kilometers an hour.

This marked an increase in speed from 45 miles an hour to about 70 miles an hour. The airship's exact position was 36.16 latitude north and 35.01 longitude west.

REACH NEW YORK SUNDAY BERLIN, Aug. 3. (AP)—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin does not expect to reach New York before Sunday afternoon, declared a special dispatch received here this morning from the Ullstein News agency correspondent aboard the dirigible.

PENDELTON, Ore., Aug. 3. (AP)—Pendleton enjoyed slightly cooler weather yesterday when the thermometer registered 102 degrees. It had reached the 106-degree mark the day before. A sharp shower and a steady wind from the west helped to bring relief. The minimum last night was 55 degrees.

Montana-Idaho Hit SPOKANE, Aug. 3. (AP)—Thor hurled his thunderbolts into Montana and Idaho last night, starting 100 forest fires.

While the villain of the northwestern timber drama was brandishing his fiery sword against the forests, his henchman, the wind, rose screaming into the clouds, fanning the fires. The rain, cast as an ally of the fire fighters, dampened fires in eastern Washington but had no effect in Idaho.

Reports today to the United Press forest service at Missoula, Mont., said there were 25 fires in the Pend Oreille forest; five on the Coeur d'Alene forest; seven in the Lolo forest and several on the Missoula.

This morning five fires in north Idaho had been reported at Sand Point, Idaho. Federal foresters and Pend Oreille timber protective association men said fire fighters were covering each blaze. The number of Idaho fires was expected to increase as the day grew warmer.

Damage estimated at several thousand dollars was done in the Palouse area of eastern Washington by the wind last night, as it swept away peas in the shock. Peas which had been cut and standing wheat were not damaged. Light rains cleared the skies of smoke near Marcus, Wash., where large fires have raged. No reports of lightning fires in this region were received.

the room. She related that later she identified "Mrs. Snook" as Miss Hix from a photograph.

Cross examination of Mrs. Smalley was taken over by Defense Attorney Max Seyfert.

Seyfert, following out the claim that Miss Hix secretly fed Dr. Snook narcotics in sandwiches, asked Mrs. Smalley if she ever saw any sandwiches about the room which the couple occupied.

"No, I never did," replied Mrs. Smalley.

Dr. Oscar W. Brumley, a veterinary professor at Ohio state, followed Mrs. Smalley. He said he knew Dr. Snook and had been acquainted with Theora Hix since she had come to the veterinary department as a stenographer in June, 1926.

"Once or twice," he said, he had seen Miss Hix getting into Dr. Snook's automobile.

Dr. Brumley identified two excitants which the state alleges Dr. Snook gave the girl shortly before the killing. A glass jar containing a dry concoction of this kind was, he said, in Dr. Snook's office when detectives came there after the killing.

A bottle of liquid preparation was identified as belonging in the drug room at the veterinary department.

Dr. Charles F. Long, city chemist, who analyzed the blood spots on personal belongings of Dr. Snook and made an examination of the contents of Miss Hix's stomach, was the next state's witness.

Prosecutor Chester first qualified Long as an expert. Offering the coat to Dr. Snook's suit, Chester asked Long if he examined that, Long replied that he had, the spots were human blood.

The state offered as evidence a portion of the coat lining showing the stain and Long identified the spot as human blood.

"Did you examine a blue Ford coupe belonging to the defendant and did you find stains?" Chester asked.

Long said he found stains which were human blood.

The prosecutor gave Long the knife which Dr. Snook is alleged to have cut Miss Hix's throat with.

Long said the knife showed stains but there was not enough to determine whether it was human blood.

Next came the hammer with which the state says Dr. Snook beat the girl into unconsciousness before he slit her jugular vein. Long said the stains on it were human blood.

Next Long identified spots on Dr. Snook's gloves as being human blood. Long said he found a hair on one of the gloves.

"Do you know whose hair it was?" Chester asked.

Could tell it was the same as a sample of hair from Miss Hix's head," Long replied.
