Klamath County Stock.—The annual tuberculosis test of Klamath county cattle reveals the fact that the stock of this county are practically free of the disease.

In conjunction with the county agriculturalist's office, a federal inspector has just completed the examination of 2248 head of cattle in the county and of this number not one was found to be a reactor.

This is a fine record and the outgrowth of the inspection system inaugurated seven years ago.

In 1922 the test showed 5 percent of those examined were reactors. That year 260 head of stock were destroyed. This average has decreased each succeeding year until in 1927 only one half of one per cent of the cattle examined were reactors, and in 1928 the number decreased to one fourth of one per cent.

The tuberculin test is not compulsory but is conducted at the request of stockraisers. This particular inspection was made choice stock for exhibit at the county fair. Another inspection may be conducted later in the fall this year and future inspections will come at a time when other affairs are not pressing the officers and stockmen.

Speeder Pay Fines.—Three traffic law violators paid fines in Justice Barnes' court Monday morning. All were for "excess" committed on the Dallas-California highway. Burley Gough and J. F. FALLING WALLS CAUSE DEATH AND INJURIES

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 5. (AP)—Three firemen were killed and ten persons injured here early today by falling walls of a burning drug store.

The firemen were killed when an explosion occurred as a hose was being dragged into the structure. Phil Hahn, who discovered the fire, said the floor of the store appeared saturated with oil.

The dead firemen were Frank Loncar, Roy Rutherford and John Moore. Captain Emmett Fitzgerald was dragged to safety after he was imprisoned by falling timbers.

Those injured, none believed seriously, were firemen and persons who were watching the blaze, at sixty-ninth street and Prospect Avenue, in the south side district.

An explosion was believed to have started the fire. Hahn said he first noticed flaming papers in the rear of the store room. The building was destroyed.

SHIP CONCERN WILL PROMOTE AIR TRANSPORT

LAKEHURST, N. J., Aug. 5. (AP)—Dr. Lester Kelp, manager of the Hamburg American line, one of the passengers on the Graf Zeppelin, today announced that the Hamburg American line "has decided to put its whole organization behind the project of building airships."

Dr. Kelp said the performance of the Graf Zeppelin "proves that other ships could be built with stronger engines so that transatlantic trips could be made with great regularity and speed."

"We are convinced that a new means of travel will make for more travel and we believe that any shortening of the distance between the United States and Europe means a step forward toward the peace and progress of the world," he said.
