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AT THE THEATRES

AT THE PELICAN

A dramatic phase of Hollywood's critical attention to talking pictures was uncovered shortly after the completion of George Bancroft's new all-talking picture, "Thunderbolt," at the Pelican theater, when that star announced the dissolution of a national body of investigators, formed by himself, to report on opinions reflecting on his first appearance in dialog films, "The Wolf of Wall Street."

Bancroft's first talking picture was of vital interest to the star but the acclaim with which it was received removed any doubts he may have had about his ability to perform in dialog pictures.

Paramount officials were never in any doubt about the splendid tonal qualities of Bancroft's voice. Bancroft, however, sought a more comprehensive verdict and, accordingly, framed his "national jury," composed of friends in every section of the country, acquaintances among leading showmen and 300 persons who had written him intelligent "fan" letters.
