

CAMPAIGN IS OPENED FOR PAVED WALKS

The first step in a campaign for the construction of paved sidewalks along improved streets where board sidewalks now exist was taken last night by the city council when a resolution of intention was passed ordering certain property holders to construct and repair their sidewalks.

This action terminated a survey of property made by each councilman in his ward. The list of sidewalks to be installed does not include unimproved streets.

Two bids were received on the \$150,000 city sewer bonds, which is half the amount voted by citizens for the new sewer system. One was from the treasury department of the state of Oregon and the other a joint bid, was American National bank. Both from the First National bank and bids designated 5 per cent interest, payable semi-annually.

Since there were no objections on the assessment roll of unit 22, the city attorney was instructed to draw up an ordinance levying assessments. August 26 was the date set for hearing of objections on the proposed assessment rolls of units 72, 73 and 81.

A report from Lee Craft, dairy inspector, stated that all Klamath dairies were inspected in July by the state dairy inspector, who pronounced them all good. The report also stated that the city water is good, and that quarantines were far below the average for cities of this size.

The report from the police department showed 196 arrests made during July, with \$2,647 collected in fines. Twenty-seven arrests were answered by the fire department in July; there was \$189,390 insurance at risk and \$4,015 insurance paid. Keith Ambrose, fire chief, requested the installation of four fire hydrants in Hot Springs addition, which was granted by the council.

The matter of installing a heating plant in the city hall was referred to the finance committee. It is believed by members of the council that if the city follows the example of the county court house by installing a private heating system, a great deal of money will be saved by the city.

Upon recommendation of Keith Ambrose, chief of police, Kenneth I. Douglas was appointed city patrolman by Mayor T. B. Walters.

The 26 building permits allowed totaled \$235,825.

PRICE CUT WAR IN WATERMELONS

ENTERPRISE, Aug. 6. (UP)—The watermelon market here suffered a bearish attack recently when a boy's prank caused a stampede in the trade. Stocks were closed out at 1 cent a pound a couple of hours after the market had opened at 3 1/2 cents.

The 3 1/2 cent mark looked high to a group of boys and one erased the half cent from the huge sign in one grocery store.

SALE OF TIMBER TO PELICAN BAY

Sale of one hundred million feet of pine timber by the Weyerhaeuser timber company to the Pelican Bay lumber company was announced last night by H. D. Mortenson, president of the Pelican Bay lumber company. Purchase price was not revealed.

The tract lying southeast of Bly comprises approximately 600,000 acres of fine timber and gives the Pelican Bay company between seven and eight hundred million feet of fine timber in the Bly section.

Mr. Mortenson estimates that the Pelican Bay Lumber company now owns sufficient timber to allow them to cut at their present rate of 320,000 feet a day, for the next 15 years.

Mr. Mortenson also announced last night that in the very near future the Pelican Bay Lumber company will start logging in the Bly section. Logging camps are

already being established in that district.

To Open Operations

The new 15-mile logging line from Bly, connecting with the Oregon, California and Eastern railroad and extending into the Pelican Bay tract southeast of Bly is nearly completed. In a few days it will be ready for heavy travel.

The tract purchased yesterday is on Horroby mountain in township 33, range 2, and adjoins timber already owned by the company.

The purchase of the new timber and the completion of the logging line, Mr. Mortenson stated, indicates that the company will soon be logging in the Bly section.

Logs will be brought to the mill north of Klamath Falls over the O. C. & E., and Southern Pacific, will be manufactured into lumber and then shipped at the rate of about 85 million feet a year.

BURNED AREA BEING CRUISED

ALTURAS, Cal., Aug. 6.—Assistant District Forester T. D. Woodbury of San Francisco, in charge of forest management for the California district of the United States forest service, with his assistant John R. Berry, is heading a crew of local forest officers in a cruise of the area burned over by the recent Sugar hill fire on the Modoc national forest. Following Woodbury's check of the burned area every effort will be made by the forest service to salvage as much of the timber as possible before deterioration takes place.

The Sugar hill fire, which was the most disastrous forest fire in the history of Modoc county, ate its way into the heart of the Pandego Logging unit in which the Crane Lumber company are operating and which constitutes one of the most valuable stands of timber in Modoc county. Although all of the Crane Creek company employees were rendered homeless, the main building was saved by the heroic efforts of a handful of employees and the mill continued operations while the stumps were still smoldering within 50 yards of the plant.

The final area of the burn is estimated by local forest officers at 9,300 acres of which 4,300 acres were timbered. A very large percentage of the stand of timber is entirely killed, the fire being so hot that in places large rocks were split open by the heat. The entire area burned over in a very few hours following the start of the fire on the Nevada, California and Oregon right of way outside the national forest being held from further spread by the forest rangers with hundreds of local firefighters. The timber loss is placed at \$4 million feet of western yellow pine and \$2 million feet of white fir and incense cedar.

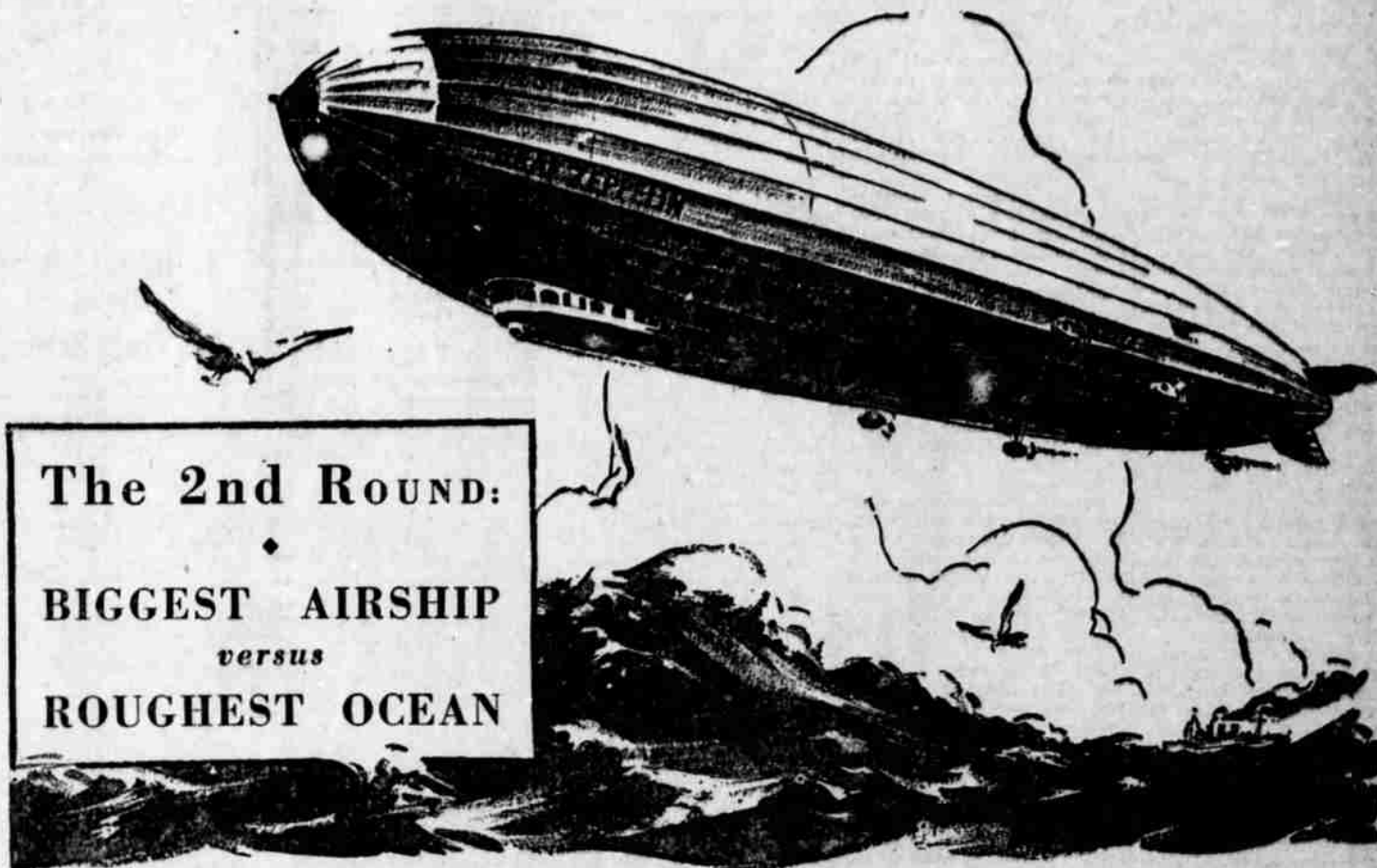
VALUATION OF ALTURAS GROWS
