SEALS LEADING REDS WITH TWO GAME MARGIN

Angels Oust Hollywood Out of Third Position.

The San Francisco Seals led the Pacific coast league two full games ahead of the second place Mission Reds, today, as a result of yesterday's battle at Recreation park, which the Seals won 4 to 2. The Los Angeles Angels forged into third place by defeating the Hollywood Stars in the southern metropolis.

Hollis Thurston returned to his old form in the Seals-Missions affair, holding the Reds to six bingles and allowing no walks.

Oakland defeated Seattle in two games of a double header on the Emeryville lot. In the first battle the score was 9 to 6, and in the second 4 to 1. Roy Carlyle hammered the Oaks to victory in the first game by hitting three doubles and a triple. Lou McEvoy let the Indians down with only six hits in the second game.

The game Hollywood lost to the Angels was the third setback in a row. The score was 14 to 1. Behind the hurling of Augie Walsh, who held the Stars to six hits.

At Stockton the Portland Ducks won from the Sacramento Senators 7 to 2. The Senators used three pitchers trying to halt the Portland batters, who scored 14 hits. The Ducks now have two and the Senators one in the series. The Senators could get only six hits.

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Yankees on Way West For the Final Invasion

The Yankees are on their way west for their final invasion, after having taken two out of three from the leaders while themselves languishing almost a dozen games to the rear.

The six to four victory of the champions in Philadelphia yesterday carried with it the edge in the three-game series and reduced the margin of the Mackmen to a mere ten and one-half games.

The one faint gleam of real Yankee hope seems to be in the fact that Connie Mack's first line pitchers do show signs of fatigue; but what of Huggins' tossers? Hoyt, out of the game with blood poisoning; Penneck, uncertain; Pipgras, unable to pitch two strong games in succession.

Pitted against George Walbert in the get-away game at Philadelphia yesterday, Herb Penneck so toyed with what at one time was a six to nothing lead that Willy Moore was called from the bullpen with none out in the fifth. Willy, pitching five official innings, allowed just one hit.

A ninth inning rally for four runs enabled Detroit to nose out Cleveland 9 to 6 and prevented Peckinpaugh's ambitious boys stepping into third place. The Browns obligingly lost two games to the White Sox at Chicago 5 to 4 and 6 to 2, and fell back into a tie with Cleveland for

third even in the face of the Indian defeat.
Washington again nosed out the Red Sox at Fenway park, 4 to 3.

The only action along the National League front again took place at Pittsburgh. The Pirates won over the Cardinals 5 to 1 behind Ervin Brame's three-hit pitching. The game was notable chiefly for the failure of Grover Cleveland Alexander to register his 373 rd National League victory which would have bettered the league record now shared by Old Pete and the late Christy Mithowson. A poor throw by Gelbert in the fourth paved the way for four Pirate runs which wrecked old Alex.

ROCHE SCORES KNOCKOUT

PREHN SAYS HE REFUSED BRIBE TO FIX REFEREE

CHICAGO, Aug. 9. (AP)—The smoldering controversy over the refereeing of the Dempsey-Tunney world heavyweight championship fight here in September 1927 today had burst into flame, with the assertion of Paul Prehn, president of the National Boxing association, that he was offered \$10,000 to urge a particular individual as referee of the bout.

Prehn, recently ousted as chairman of the Illinois state athletic commission, said he was approached by a gambler, whose name he refused to divulge, who made the proffer saying he wished to assure himself that the third man in the ring would not be pro-Tunney. The man was selected, Prehn said.

Prehn hastened to say that he was certain Dempsey had nothing to do with the affair.

"Dempsey probably never heard of the offer, and I am certain no member of his camp was involved," Prehn said.

Prehn also declined to name the man whom the gambler wished to serve as referee of the fight.

Prehn said he immediately rejected the offer and ordered the man from his office. He then told the other members of the

commission what had occurred he said. He averred that the proffer was made by gamblers who wished to protect their Dempsey wagers, fearing some of the fighters might lean to Tunney if the fight were close.

Prehn also insisted that Dave Barry who became famous for the long count while Tunney was on the canvas, had no previous knowledge that he was to referee. The assignment was made, Prehn said, after the principals entered the ring.

Prehn related the incident yesterday in telling of the troubles encountered by the Illinois state athletic commission.

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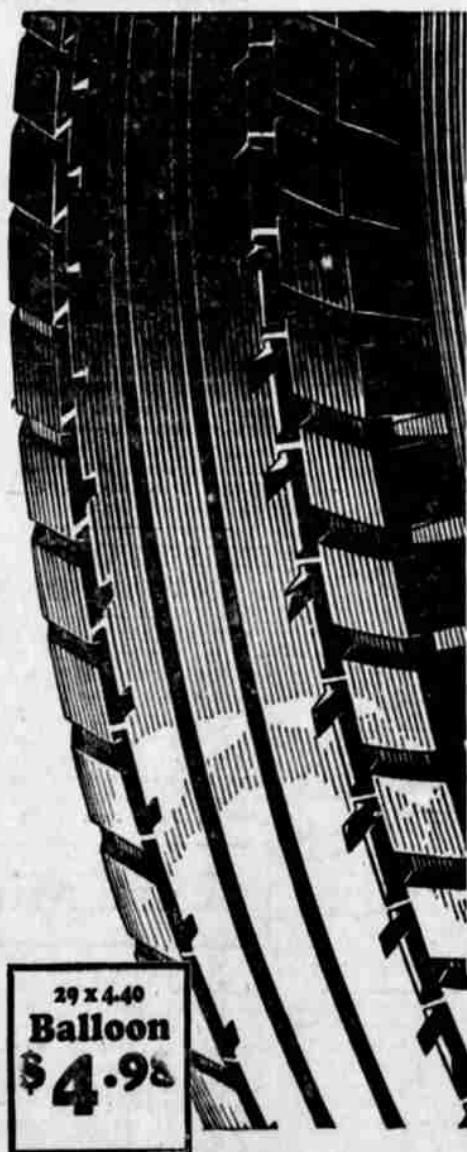
