## STARS CROWD MISSION REDS FROM SECOND

### Hollywood Now Only Three Full Games From Top.

The San Francisco Seals were stronger than ever today, in their lead of the Pacific Coast League for second half title honors, as a result of their third successive victory yesterday over the hard fighting Mission Reds at Recreation park. With the defeat suffered by the Reds came more hard luck in the form of the Hollywood stars who displaced the Killifer crew in second place by defeating the Los Angeles club.

The Seals won by 11 to 3, obtaining at least one hit in each of the nine hard fought innings. They thus lengthened their lead to three full games.

Hollywood's victory over Los Angeles came after the stars had dropped three straight to their southern rivals. The score was 6 to 4, and the win enabled them to turn the tables on the Mission Reds, who several days ago displaced the stars in second place. A home run drive by Clem Carlyle, star outfielder, who Heath was on first, broke a 3 to 2 tie and gave Hollywood the winning punch.

Oakland defeated the Seattle Indians in a closely fought battle on the Emeryville lot, with a 6 to 5 score. Both teams used seven more men than the regular line-up called for. Ernie Lombardi hit one of Rudy Kallio's offerings over the left field fence for one Oakland tally, and Johnny Vargas belted one of Tony Governor's out for a homer.

Sacramento evened the series with Portland in the California capital by winning a farcical battle 7 to 2. It was a real game until Cascarella suddenly went wild in the fourth inning and was hit for six runs. Walters, infielder, finished on the mound, and Tomlin, a pitcher, played the role of catcher.

## FISH "PULLMAN" MOVES ON NORTH

Having completed for the time being, at least, the planting of fish in the lakes and streams of Klamath county, the state fish "Pullman" of the state game commission has been moved to Lane county where it will be busy for some time making distributions from the McKenzie river hatchery.

En route to Lane county, planting of 3,500 eastern brook trout and 8,000 rainbow eggs in Big lake and Patjens lake in Linu county will be taken care of.

Fishing is one of the most popular sports at the lake this season. Every day finds hopeful fishermen, both on the narrow shore and far out on the lake, hook and line ready for the strike.

So far, the largest trout caught measured 28 inches, a rainbow. The average length is between 16 and 18 inches.

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Travel records to Crater Lake national park (time to fall each day as hundreds of cars bearing thousands of tourists each week travel to see the mountain gem.

Last year's record-breaking figures are being dimmed with the weekly reports compiled by the national park service.

The number of persons visiting the beautiful spot so far this year have reached a total of 73,592, as compared against 58,504 in the year of 1928.

In the number of cars making the trip, the records are also being eclipsed, this year's figures standing at 19,017, compared to 17,807 last year.

An average of 451 cars carrying 1,447 people have visited the rim during the past two weeks. This number has been doubled on the week-ends by visitors from all sections.

Crater Lake can well be termed the Mecca of Sunday vacationists, as proven by the record run of cars to the rim last Sunday, when 952 cars were checked at the entrance stations.

Because of the swamp soil, the filling of the approach road to the south entrance of Crater Lake National park, via Fort Klamath, completed early this spring, was one of the most difficult projects ever undertaken by the state highway commission of Oregon.

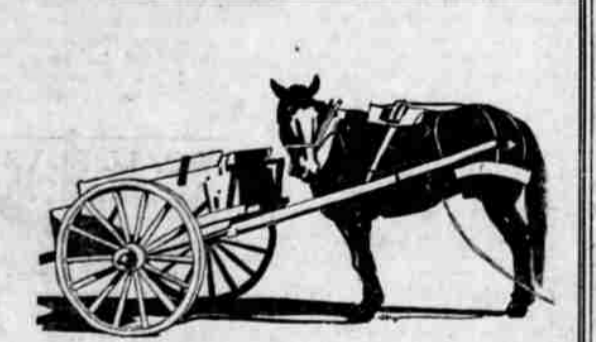

## Pirates Puzzled Over Winning Streak of Cubs

Just how to overtake a ball team which piles up an impressive lead then refuses to lose more than the minimum number of games is a problem which the greatest minds of baseball have never been able to solve. And that is the question which is puzzling the guiding spirits of the Pittsburgh Pirates and the New York Giants.

The pennant hopes of the second and third place teams in the National League must perforce remain slim while the Cubs are winning four out of five games, as they are doing now.

The Pirates slipped just as Chicago reached the peak of its winning stride, and now, instead of being in first place, the boys from the smoky city languish 6 1-2 games behind the top. They returned to winning ways a few days ago, clipping off three victories in a row, but before that they had dropped six out of seven while the Cubs were going right along at the rate that has brought them 21 victories in their last 25 games.

The current series between the eastern and western teams brings little prospect of improvement. The Pirates did beat the St. Louis Cardinals, 7 to 6, but the Cubs stopped off in Philadelphia long enough to smack the Phillies by a 12 to 6 count then returned on for a series against the Boston Braves.

Meanwhile the Giants, trailing along a bad third in the standings, gained the slim consolation of the complete supremacy Fred Fitzsimon holds over Cincinnati. The brisky New York hurler, who shut out the Reds four times in a row, gained revenge for his four hit defeat in his last appearance against Cincinnati by holding the Reds to the same number of blows while his mates pounded out a 7 to 1 victory. Every man in the Giant lineup contributed to the 15 hit attack on May and Kelp.

The American League went through a day of almost complete inaction as most of the teams were on the way to new scenes of activity. The St. Louis Browns and Chicago White Sox staged the only battle of the day in the younger league and it was not much in the way of a scrap after the first few innings, the Browns coasting in to a 9 to 4 victory.
