## Civil War Veteran Milled First Valley Wheat

Chas. High of Dorris, Imparts Some Intelligence to Herald's Wandering Scribe Anent War and Early Settlement of Klamath County.

DORRIS, Calif., Aug. 10. (Special)—Charles High, pioneer of this city and 83 years old yesterday, can look upon a picture of himself taken at a time when he wore the natty blue uniform of a soldier of the Civil war.

THEY AT the age of 19, just a high school boy, he was a veteran of three years of that awful strife and also a seasoned Indian campaigner, as he also helped subdue Chief Geronimo's band of blood-thirsty Apaches down in Arizona and New Mexico at the close of the rebellion.

AT THE age of 16, just when he should have been helping his mother wash dishes, Mr. High was with General Grant at the terrible battle of Belmont, where Union soldiers fell like flies while driving the southerners from their stronghold, back toward Island No. 19 in the Mississippi river.

THIS WAS IN 1862, while the northern generals were busy on part of their war plan of "allowing the Far er of Waters to flow untroubled to the sea."

THOUSANDS of other high school boys were also at the front along with Mr. High. Leaving peaceful homes, where the slightest scratch was viewed with alarm by anxious mothers and the window was closed for fear a beloved son might take cold, these same lads were now at the front marching in torrential rains, sleeping in creeks and charging on belching cannons with the fury of demons, all for one purpose:

"THAT A nation conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal, might not perish from the earth."

IN THE Indian campaign, Mr. High said the system of the army was pitted against the cunning whims of the savage, much to the advantage of the latter.

BOTH THE whites and reds fought on foot. The regulars in their blue uniforms made distinct objects which could be seen on the plains for miles.

THE APACHES, said Mr. High, would break into small attacking groups and the various bands kept in constant communication with each other by smoke signals.

GIANT CACTUS grew in that country and the Indians shot arrows into these growths in such a manner as to give information to any war party that chanced that way.

WHITE SCOUTS living in the country could read the codes as well as the reds, Mr. High continued, and this ability helped the officers materially in pursuing their quarry. Organized persistence finally resulted in

GETTING THE Apaches corralled.

THE DORRIS man has the distinction of threshing the first wheat ever prepared for commercial use in Klamath valley.

HE OWNED an old tread power machine where horses walked on an inclined, rolling platform in order to keep the wheels turning. A pleasant feature of that day remembered by Mr. High are the "wedding dinners" which ranchers' wives set out for the hungry threshing crew.
