CHURCH UNION DISCUSSED AT DISCIPLES MEET

SATTLE, Wash., Aug. 14. (AP)—Tuesday early sessions of the disciples of Christ in their international convention here, will be devoted to foreign missions with Dr. Stephen J. Corey, Indianapolis, making the principal address.

Reports will be made by missionaries from South America, Africa, Japan, China, India and the Philippine Islands. Electing officers two days ahead of schedule, the disciples last night named Robert A. Long, Longview millionaire lumberman, president of the 1926 convention. The movement to unite disciples of Christ with northern Baptists was given favorable action and the committee on church unity recommended that immediate steps be taken to combine educational, evangelistic and missionary work with those of the northern Baptists.

DAMAGED RAIL CAUSES WRECK ON SANTA FE

PUEBLO, Colo., Aug. 14. (AP)—One woman was slightly injured and 60 passengers were badly shaken when several coaches of a Santa Fe train, Chicago bound, left the rails 20 miles east of here Tuesday.

The chief dispatcher's office here reported today that the derailment was caused by what is known as a transverse interior fissure. This is explained as a crack on the inside of a rail and is said to be difficult to locate. The engine, two baggage cars, and a mail car passed safely over the rail but the first Pullman was derailed, causing nearly upright but the other two sleepers were overturned.

Sixty persons were riding in the three Pullman cars. Officials said all passengers escaped injury with the exception of one woman, who was reported to have suffered a scalp laceration and a bruised leg.

Wreckers were sent to the scene and officials announced the road would be cleared tonight.

Miss Beauregard, a telephone operator and Mrs. Walsh, a widow, were returning from a vacation trip when they were halted by the two young men near Limon, Colo., they said. The youths about 20 years old, were well mannered and asked for a ride saying they were returning to their home in Kansas City. The attack, the women said, came without warning.

Overpowering them the youths slashed the women with a razor, bound them with rope and cast them into the pasture. Stripping them of their clothing and money the youths drove off in Mrs. Walsh's car. They have not been captured.

GUNMAN DOODY TAKEN WITHOUT OFFERING SHOT

CHICAGO, Aug. 14. (AP)—"Willie" (Baby Face) Doody, veteran of half a dozen recent gun fights and wanted in connection with two killings and several mail robberies, was arrested Tuesday.

He was caught in a third floor apartment on the west side without a struggle, although he was armed.

Among the things police wish to question Doody about was the holdup last Friday of the Illinois Central train when a guard was shot and killed and \$400 taken.

Doody was found in the company of a divorcee, known as Mrs. Taylor, and her 6-year-old daughter.

Donald H. Holt, a clerk in the city water department, also was arrested today in connection with the Illinois Central robbery. The Sunday following the robbery he reported to police the license plates of his automobile had been stolen. Police said they believed they were the plates used on the automobile used by the landis in their escape.

Holt's arrest today was not explained, although it was alleged he aroused the suspicion of the police when they questioned him Sunday.

ENGINES MAKE ENDURANCE RUN

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 14. (AP)—St. Louis and San Francisco locomotive No. 4113, world's endurance record holder, Tuesday ended a 25-day, 7350 mile run here with the engine still reported in good condition. The old record was 3,500 miles.

Engine No. 4113 was fired in the local yards July 19, and that evening left on a regular freight run for Birmingham, Ala. The fire never was drawn, the boilers washed, or repairs made during the 25 days the locomotive pulled freight cars between Kansas City and Birmingham.

Engine No. 4113 is a standard Baldwin Mikado type steam locomotive weighing 550,000 pounds. During the endurance run the engine consumed 1,500,000 gallons of water and 975 tons of coal. It pulled 13,780,749 gross tons of freight.

DEALERS MUST HAVE LICENSES

The new law passed by the state legislature which governs meat dealers and stock raisers and which went into effect August 4 is causing considerable difficulty due to the fact that many do not understand the points covered by law, it was stated Tuesday by Sheriff Lloyd L. Low.

Following is an article printed in the Portland Oregonian which will probably aid in making this law more understood among Klamath meat handlers:

"Attention of dealers handling fresh meats has been called to the fact that as a result of a law passed by the last legislature they must all take out licenses immediately.

"The new law went into effect on August 4, a statement issued by W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, pointed out.

"Meat dealers must have either a class A license costing \$25 or a class B license costing \$5, depending on the nature of their business.

"If the meat handler kills or buys farm-killed, unstamped carcasses, either hogs, sheep, goats, cattle or veal calves he must take out a class A license," Mr. Lytle's statement explained. "He must also have a class A license if he has animals slaughtered by a class A dealer and sells the carcasses.

"If the meat handler wishes to sell or dispense stamped meat purchased from a class A dealer he needs only a class B license, which costs \$5.

"Hides must accompany the carcass. Sheep and goat pelts will not be required to accompany the carcass."

"Farmers and stock raisers under the terms of the law must have a tag, which must be secured from the sheriff's office for each carcass moved on the highway or shipped by common carrier.

"The new law, known as the stock and poultry theft prevention law, was passed by the legislature to put a stop to thefts of livestock by thieves riding in automobiles.

"Application for a meat dealer's license must be forwarded to the office of the state veterinarian at Salem. Blank forms for such application may be secured from that office."

Sheriff Will Act

"I wish to make this clear to

everyone interested, as all shops and slaughter houses will be inspected by this office at various times and all violations of this act will be prosecuted," stated Mr. Low this morning.

"All farmers and stockraisers must secure tags from the sheriff before butchering, and they can sell only to a dealer with a class A license. The class A license permits the holder thereof to slaughter wholesale and to retail.

"No butcher having only a class B license can buy from any other than a class A dealer."

PLANE SANK IN LAKE ERIE
CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 14. (AP)—A Cleveland-Detroit amphibian passenger plane sank in Lake Erie after being forced down in a dense fog yesterday and the co-pilot was missing to day, the Thompson Aeronautical corporation reported. The pilot and two passengers, one of them a woman, were rescued after battling to keep afloat in the water two hours.
