HEAVY BATTING ALTERS COAST LEAGUE STANDS

Seals Take First Place Again When Stars Tumble.

(By the Associated Press) Heavy bombardment of pitchers in yesterday's Pacific coast league warfare resulted in a large total of home runs, and gave the San Francisco Seals the league lead by half a game.

The Seals, displaced at the top by the Hollywood Stars the day before, downed the southern crew in the 13th inning by a score of 5 to 4. In the final inning, Smedley Jolley won for the San Francisco Seals by cracking out his second homer of the game over the right field fence at Recreation park.

Oakland did its utmost to beat the Senators at Sacramento, but the home boys nosed out the bay team, to 3. Sariye, Verger, and Lombardi drove the ball out of the lot. But fortunately for the home owners, the bases were empty each time. McLaughlin contributed a homer for the Senators.

Los Angeles pulled the Mission club down to equal footing in the standings by making it two straight over the Reds with a 6 to 5 victory in the southern town. A two-run rally in the final half of the ninth enabled the Angels to win. Fuzzy Hult having cracked out a homer in the Mission half to break a 4 to 4 tie. Earl Webb, Angel outfielder, helped toward victory by clouting a brace of homers in the early innings.

In the Portland-Seaside contest of the Indians' lot, Walters had a slight advantage in a pitchers' battle with Cox. The Ducks defeated the tribesmen 2 to 1. The Seaside club used four pinch hitters in the eighth and ninth innings in a vain attempt to trap the visitors.

OREGON LOGGER CRUSHED WHEN TRAINS COLLIDE

ST. HELENS, Aug. 15. (AP) A. G. Taylor of Portland, fireman on a logging train on the Clark-Wilson Lumber company, was instantly killed near here yesterday when two logging trains collided. Taylor and the engineer, M. P. Tompkins saw an empty train backing up the grade as their heavily laden loaded train was moving down and, unable to check the progress of their train, both jumped. Taylor struck the side of a cut and rolled back toward the track just as the two trains came together. The impact broke the fastenings of the load and he was crushed under the falling logs. Tompkins escaped with minor cuts and bruises.

AUTO CRASHES BUS AND KILLS ST. HELENS BOY

ST. HELENS, Aug. 15. (AP)—Billy Storis, 14, was killed and Dr. J. H. Flynn, Mrs. Martha Hammer and daughter, Lucia, were severely hurt late yesterday when an automobile in which they were riding, collided with a Spokane, Portland and Seattle bus south of here. Dr. Flynn, driver of the car, was said to have attempted to pass the bus and cut in too quickly. Young Storis was the son of John A. Storis, an attorney of St. Helens.

ELECTRIC BOLT CAUSES DEATH

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 15. (AP)—Four persons were killed by lightning and three were drowned as a result of severe electrical storms that descended yesterday upon Philadelphia and the surrounding country.

Two persons were killed, a young woman paralyzed and her mother burned when lightning struck the peach-packing plant of Salvatore Merlino at Hammonton, N. J. Three others working in the plant were knocked down by the bolt.

Several persons throughout the storm area were injured or struck by lightning and a number of homes and farm buildings were burned.

While at work on a new school building in Philadelphia, Arthur Verville, a roofer, was killed by lightning.

James Thompson, a gardener, of Bryn Mawr, Pa., was killed by another bolt which stunned his assistant, John Nash.

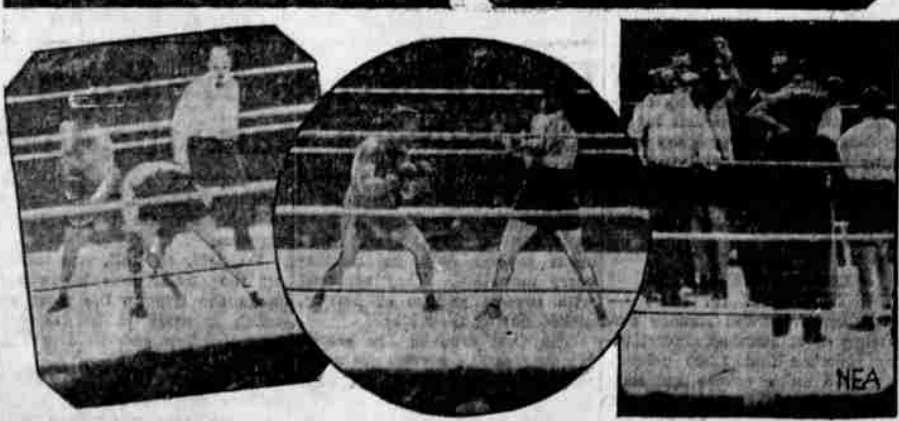
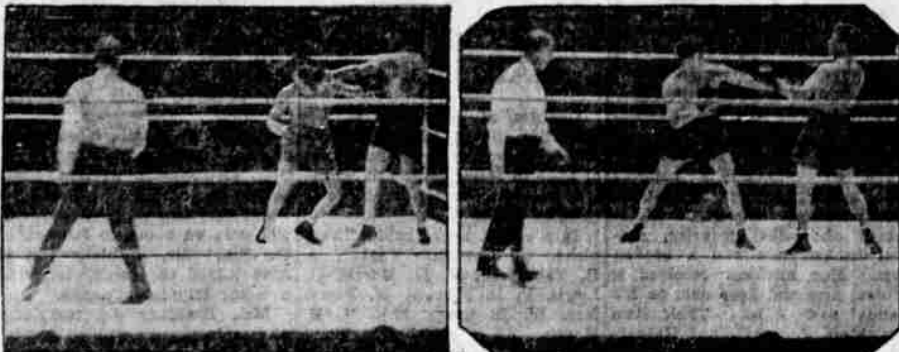
Two negro men and a negro woman were drowned when the driver of an automobile was blinded by the heavy rain and drove through a guard rail into the Delaware river. Two of the dead were Maggie Scott and Samuel Campbell. The name of the third victim, who was driving, has not been learned.

THIEF TAKES STORE SAFE PORTLAND, Aug. 15. (AP)—R. W. O'Beir, 18, was in jail here today being held for United States postal authorities under bond of \$2,500 following his arrest on a charge of robbing a pharmacy housing a postal sub-station.

Surprised by a patrolman as he was ransacking the store at 3:30 a. m. O'Beir ran from the store to a waiting automobile. The officer reached him before he could start the car. In the automobile police say they found three cameras and a small safe, said to have been taken from the drug store. The manager of the store said a quantity of government funds was in the safe.

Athletics Seize on Damp Weather to Tighten Lead

A moist afternoon along the Major league trail, where three of the nine scheduled skirmishes were postponed, was hardly enough for the Yankees but just about right for the Athletics. The leaders turned the day to account by wrestling a 5 to 3 decision from the Indians in seven innings behind Mose Grove as the Tigers outpunched the Yankees by 17 to 14, and the Philadelphia lead increased to thirteen and one half games.

This margin is the greatest the A's have had at any time this season and is the exact distance by which the Yankees led for two days or so when the 1928 race was at its loosest stage around the fourth of July.

Jimmy Fox's twenty-eighth homer, which gave him second place in the American league, decided the long battle in favor of the Athletics, but the leaders cashed in another run of Willis Hudlin before the end of the inning just to remove the last doubt.

The less said about the lacing of the Yankees in Detroit, the kinder it will be to both teams. Between them the teams scored sixteen runs in the first three innings. From that point to the finish Owen Carroll held the Yanks to the comparatively safe quota of nine hits and six runs while the various Yankee tossers continued their queer capers with the result that the Bengals won rather handsomely.

After the failure of George Pipgras, Waite Hoyt made his first appearance on the mound since the recent attack of blood poisoning. It was brief and disastrous, three hits and one pass helping the Tigers to seven runs. The Bengals broke a 12 to 12 tie with Kiley Moore by lacing out five runs in the eighth.

The Red Sox defeated St. Louis by 4 to 1 and the Senators slammed the White Sox by 11 to 3 in remaining American league games.

In the New York metropolitan district National league proceedings were limited to Boston and Philadelphia. Jess Petty turned in a five-hit game at Braves' field to defeat the home team by 1 to 0, and the Pirates reduced the
