ALLUSION TO BISHOP BRINGS SPEAKER JEERS

UNIVERSITY, Va., Aug. 15. (AP) — A defense of Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, against attacks by the "wets" met with cries of disapproval last night during an address by Stanley High editor of the Christian Herald, before the institute of public affairs here.

"A great deal of unjust criticism of Bishop Cannon," Mr. High said, "has been coming from the wets in order to divert the issue."

A jeery cry from the audience interrupted him. In a moment the cry was taken up until a large part of the audience participated in the clamor. Mr. High turned to other matters in his address when he started speaking again.

Mr. High was defending prohibition, engaging in a debate with Governor Albert C. Ritchie of Maryland, who attacked the 18th Amendment. Both speakers were applauded generously and except for the reference to Bishop Cannon, the address by Mr. High was uninterrupted and followed attentively.

"There are doubtless those who believe the 18th Amendment can be enforced," declared Governor Ritchie in his address, "but surely there is no one who thinks it is best enforced."

The Maryland executive asserted that congress never will make an adequate effort to enforce the law.
