## SEALS POUND STARS OFF LOT TO HOLD LEAD

### Salem Slugger Starts Slaughter With a Circuit Clout.

The home team scored 14 to 7 against the visitors at Recreation park. The Seals made 22 hits off Shellenback and Hulvey, Loris Baker of Salem, Ore., started the Seals off on the right track in the first inning when he flogged out a homer to score with Crossett ahead of him. Sunr hit his thirty-fifth homer, Jolley, not to be outdone, knocked the ball silly over the right field fence.

Ed Haecht, prize pitcher of the Angels, fooled like Boon's, Fuzzy Hufft and the rest of the Mission sluggers, while his mates pounded the combined offerings of Herman Pillette and Caster for an easy 8 to 2 victory at Los Angeles, and put them back into a tie with the Reds for third place.

A wild throw by Elva, Oakland shortstop, paved the way for a 10 to 9 Sacramento victory over Oakland in the capital city. The Reds made it four straight over Seattle by winning from the Redskins, 11 to 2. Five runs in the first inning clinched the contest for Portland, but two more were added in the fourth, again in the fifth and sixth. Chesterfield pitched for the Ducks holding the home team on an 8-hit diet while his mates pounded Elvins, Lamanski and Sahlborg for 13.

### READY FOR GIANTS



**The Situation:**  
Suppose your ball splits apart or a section of it breaks off?

**The Rule Is:**  
Should your ball split into several pieces, you may drop another where any piece of your original ball lies. If a ball at any time becomes unfit for play, it may be changed if you tell your opponent. Mud on a ball does not render it unfit for play and it may not be cleaned under penalty of disqualification in medal play and loss of the hole in match play. These penalties, however, may be excepted by local rules.

## TEACHER ADMITS WHIPPING BOY

VISALIA, Cal., Aug. 17. (AP)—Mrs. Amanda M. Humphrey, negro school teacher at Allensworth, held in jail here in connection with the death of Marion Eaves, 9, nephew of her husband, admitted to Walter Haight, assistant district attorney of Tuolumne county that she had beaten the boy with a strap Wednesday when he had gone to a well against her orders. She is charged with repeating the whipping Thursday morning when he complained of being tired. On the second occasion she is charged with having beaten the child until he became unconscious. Later she took the boy, still unconscious to a physician at Delano, who said the child had been dead about an hour.

## Novelty Injected Into Major League Yesterday

Novelty was injected into the two Major league games yesterday when the Athletics failed to increase their lead and the Cubs actually lost ground. The Macks won a spirited game in Cleveland by 6 to 5, but the Yanks won with them—from Detroit by 12 to 2—leaving the Philadelphia margin stationary at fourteen games. In the National league, the Cubs were defeated in Brooklyn by 5 to 2 while the Pirates were scolding the Braves by 9 to 3 to reduce the Bruin advantage to seven and one-half engagements.

George Earnshaw held the Indians well in hand for eight innings in the brush at Cleveland while his mates prodded the Messrs. S'ute, Holloway and Shaffner with such vigor that the A's took the field in the home with a lead of 6 to 3. At this point, the home forces launched a series of blows at Earnshaw and your Bill Shores was called upon to stop the trouble, which he did.

The Yankee victory at Detroit was notable for Babe Ruth's thirty-second home run. The champions drove Uble from the box in three innings. Eddie Wells was right all the way.

Al Thomas pitched well enough to bring the White Sox home ahead of the Senators 7 to 6, and Charlie Ruffing tossed the Red Sox to a 3 to 2 decision over Alvin Crowder and the Browns at St. Louis.

Ray Moss, young Brooklyn right-hander, set the Cubs down without a run until the ninth at Ebbets field. The Robins themselves had no little trouble with Charley Root, being held to two hits in the first six rounds, but they finally broke through for three runs in the seventh. Johnny Frelick placed the decision definitely beyond the Bruns by slapping Root for a

homer in the next round after Moss had singled.

The Pirates had one of their famous hitting afternoons at Braves field, pounding Messrs. Selbold and Perry, the providence recruit, for fifteen hits and nine runs. With such a margin to work on, Ervin Brame breezed home with not the slightest

difficulty. Frank O'Donohue, rated with his twenty-fourth homer at Philadelphia, but Cincinnati pounded Lou Koupal and others to trim the Phillies by 7 to 3. Ray Kulp was the winning pitcher but had to have the aid of Rube Ehrhardt at the finish.

The Giants and the Cardinals had an open date in their schedule, but are due to mix in a double-header today.

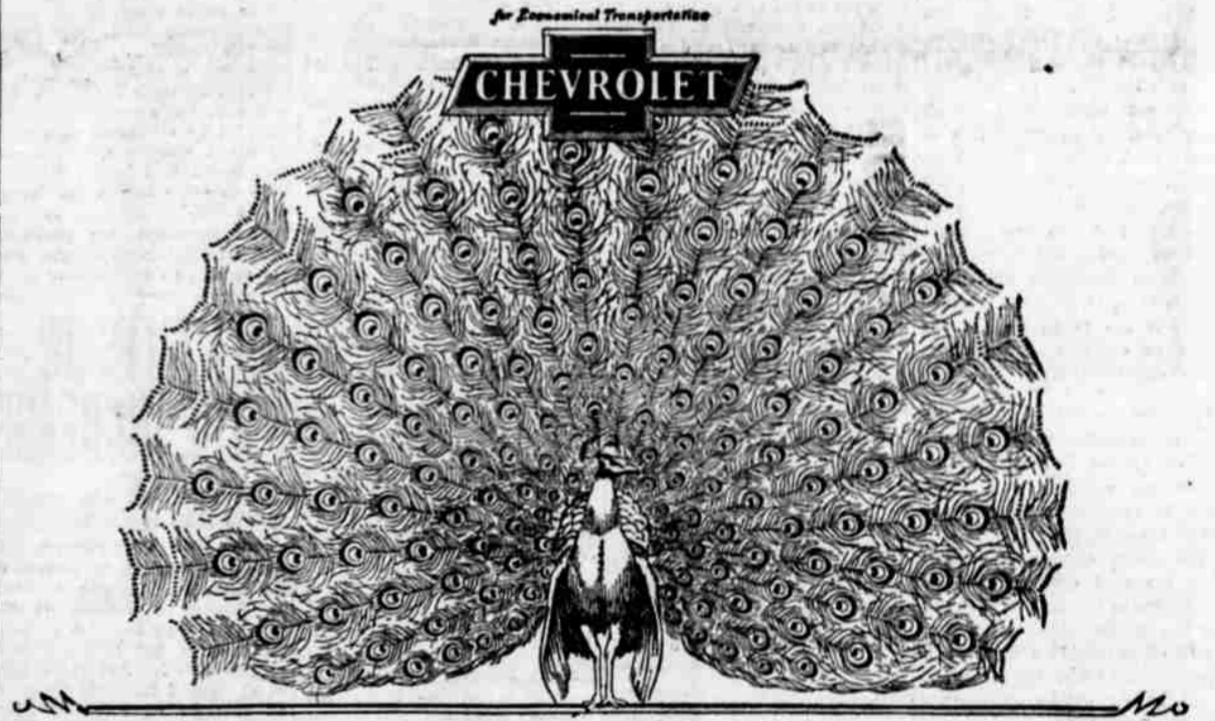
At the former heavyweights request, Schmeling and his manager, Joe Jacobs, had an appointment here to discuss with Dempsey the course of their furthering activities in America.
