

THREE THOUGHT DROWNED WHEN BOATS COLLIDE

ALEXANDRIA, N. Y., Aug. 17. (AP)—W. Charles Lipe, Syracuse millionaire manufacturer, his wife and Ford Dodge, his pilot, are believed to have drowned when their speed boat crashed into a pleasure boat in mid-channel of the St. Lawrence river last night.

The Lipe craft, the "Giggle" smashed at full speed into the excursion boat "Thousand Islander" and sank almost immediately. The Thousand Islander, her hull damaged, raced with its 50 passengers shoreward and was beached on a ledge six feet under the river surface.

The excursion boat, commanded by Captain Devilla Rogers, was returning from a trip to beauty spots of the immediate vicinity and was brightly lighted, its searchlight was playing about the lake. Lipe's speeding craft rounded an island point and plowed into the bow of the pleasure boat.

"I didn't see the other boat approaching," said Captain Rogers, "the first thing I knew our bow was struck. Then I saw bodies from the other boat thrown high into the air."

The Thousand Island passengers were ordered to don life preservers as a precaution.

Lipe and his party were bound for the Thousand Island Yacht club from their summer home on Nemahia Island. They were identified from the name plate on his boat which was found imbedded in the steamer.

Many boats were on the scene today seeking the bodies of the missing and Alexandria Bay authorities sent to Ogdensburg for divers.

The Thousand Islander Bay, is a 60-footer, one of a fleet employed in carrying sightseers.

NEW TYPE CARS FOR RAILROAD

"Like water from a duck's back," that's how the sun's heat rays will roll from the latest type railroad lounge cars. By the use of the aluminum paint and anti-acidic window glass, the Southern Pacific has effectively solved the problem of protecting passengers from summer heat on cross country trips.

This announcement was made today by A. S. Rosenbaum, district freight and passenger agent here for the company, who added "travelers have no quarrel with the thermometer on the Pacific coast for we have temperatures for all temperatures. It is only while making the trip to and from the west that protection from the sun is needed and now we have found a way to provide the utmost travel comfort."

The heat-absorbing quality of aluminum paint is not a new discovery. But until recently it had not been tried successfully on railroad equipment.

Its use on Southern Pacific new lounge cars is expected to set a noteworthy precedent.

"The special window glass which admits light but excludes heat has not been used heretofore in the cars of any American railway but has been employed successfully on trains in tropical India and Africa." Manufactured under the trade name of "Calorex" by an English factory, the glass cuts off about 80 per cent of the heat from the sun while transmitting about 65 per cent of the light it has a slight green tinge but after the first impression the color is not noticeable and only the restful character remains.

Recent tests have proved that aluminum paint reduces materially the temperature of car interiors by keeping out from 20 to 25 per cent of the sun's heat—according to reports.

"Southern Pacific new lounge cars will have three coats of the paint one inside and another outside the inner metal sheet and one coat for the exterior finish, something distinctive in paint jobs for railway equipment."

"Ten of the latest type lounge cars are nearing completion for the Southern Pacific Co., F. S. McGinnis, passenger traffic manager announced. They were ordered some months ago at a cost of \$600,000. The arrangement and fitting of the cars will introduce many novel features, especially designed by the company's motive power department, to meet all requirements of the most exacting travellers."

Lakeview road completed. It has been done—all but eight miles from Datto to the Lorenz mill, and that contract will be let soon. They wanted the road to Merrill re-surfaced. I remember that I was taken out by a gentleman here who drove a car bearing a California license to be shown what improvement Oregon should make on the Merrill road. I agreed to the improvement, and the Merrill road has been completed, except for the distance from Klamath Falls to the Junction and that is in the process of being paved.

"I promised the road to Keno would be re-surfaced. That has been done. The people wanted an oiled road from Fort Klamath Junction to Crater lake. I told them more surface would have to be added to that road and then it would be oiled. That has been done.

"We are going to build a new bridge at Keno. We have just let a contract amounting to \$152,000 on the Green Springs road which provides for widening the road from Keno creek to Jenny creek and includes widening of the Keno creek bridge.

ing of the Keno creek bridge. It also provides for cutting off sharp points and widening the Green Springs highway over the mountains.

Realizes Its Importance
"I am convinced of the importance of the Green Springs road. It is the artery of commerce into Klamath Falls and bears very heavy traffic. But, we are after it with all the energy we possess and we will make a great highway out of it. Eventually it probably will have to be paved, but the contracts we have let will put it in good shape."

"With this work under way with the paving to the Junction going on, with only eight miles of the Lakeview-Klamath highway to complete, with the Crater lake-Fort Klamath road completed, with the road to Merrill completed, I feel that I have been delivering the goods as I promised I would to Klamath county."

Gates Gives Figures
Commissioner Gates then pulled from his portfolio a tabulated statement to show how much money had been spent on the roads of Klamath county and those of Jackson county, his home. He said that \$152,000 of the amount showed for Jackson county's portion was in fact to benefit Klamath because it is being spent on the Green Springs mountains between Keno and Jenny creeks.

RADIO VALVE LIKE HEART

A striking comparison of the function of the radio vacuum tube with the human heart is made by engineers of E. T. Cunningham, Inc., radio tube company, who explained that the radio valve is the closest mechanical approach to the human machine.

They point out that the heart of the human being is controlled through an intricate nervous system. As an individual performs work, certain parts of the body transmit a signal to the nerve center that more energy is required. A signal is received from the brain by a nerve which controls the valves and muscles of the heart. These valves allow more or less blood to pass into the desired parts of the body, as it is needed.

The grid of a vacuum tube corresponds to this heart valve. Signals are received by the grid, which controls the flow of electrons from the filament to the plate. As more or less voltage is placed on the grid, the electron flow to the plate is changed to a greater or less degree. The energy of this electronic flow from the vacuum tube is sufficient to produce an audible signal in the receiver unit.

COOLING OIL EXPLODES

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 17. (AP)—Foster W. Cook, 33, mechanic, was burned severely today when he plunged a red-hot iron into a can of lubricating oil to cool it off. The oil contained some gasoline and exploded, showering the mechanic with flames. He was taken to a hospital where physicians said he probably would live.

PLANES HAVE RADIOS NOW

Enjoying the music of your favorite jazz band or symphony orchestra while comfortably seated in the enclosed cabin of a passenger airplane, flying high above the ground, will be one of the coming developments to add to the comfort of air travel, according to C. R. King, vice president and assistant general manager, of E. T. Cunningham, Inc., radio tube company.

That this is not a remote possibility, he emphasizes by pointing out that present radio apparatus carried by pilots to receive weather and flight data, could be tuned into station programs if so desired.
