Hogue Takes Serum to Patient—

No hope is being extended in regard to the condition of "Blinkus" Harvey, although his condition is much improved today, even a little better this afternoon than this morning.

Symptoms of tetanus set in for Blinkus a few days ago and the serum was immediately sent for to Klamath Falls, as there was not a fresh supply here.

It is thought some foreign matter, such as clothing or dirt, was carried into the body by the soft-nosed bullet when it struck him and thus caused the infection.

The tightening of the muscles gave the first warning a few days ago while the boy was eating, and his condition grew steadily worse until the serum was obtained. Since then it has shown a slight improvement, although his chances for life are said to be about one in five.

Rivalling even Lindbergh's great flight with the serum to save the life of one of his brother fliers was the journey made by Pat Hogue yesterday from Klamath Falls to Bly in order to get the serum here on time. With his red flag flying in his brown Ford he broke all speed records and landed in Bly after an hour and 20 minutes of hard driving, where he was met by Francis Martin, who brought the serum on to Lakeview.—Lake County Tribune.

Better Addresses Needed—

John A. McCall, postmaster, issued a plea to the merchants of the city this morning for better addresses. Mr. McCall stated that one of the principal reasons for letters being mailed without complete addresses is the failure of the merchants to get the full address of customers when making charge accounts. When this is done the mail is turned over to the directory clerk and then a great deal of it is placed in general delivery.

"Another thing that has come to my attention is how few business houses have their full mailing address printed on letter heads or bills. This should be done in order to secure better mailing service," Mr. McCall continued.
