**WHAT'S IT MEAN?**

**"NOSINESS"**  
Besides, this whole tendency to subject teachers, both men and women, to more personal investigation than workers in any other profession must undergo, can not help but reflect unfortunately to that profession. The man or woman with the most upright character but with a little dash of pride may stop and look and listen a long time before he or she will enter a profession which makes so many inroads upon the decent inalienable right to a little privacy.

**WOMEN ONLY!**  
It probably explains right now why teaching has never been considered a man's job, and why so few men are in it. Women have been forced by tradition to accept "nosiness" into their personal affairs without too much protest. Men never have learned, and probably never will. But teaching needs the right sort of men, too. It is preposterous to place all growing boys in the hands of women teachers, but that's just what it's coming to, if it hasn't already come.

## SURPRISE LOAF

- 2 or 3 tomatoes
- 1 cup diced carrots
- 1 small loaf bread
- 1 cup cooked veal, diced
- 1 onion thinly sliced
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- 2 hard cooked eggs, cut in slices

Salt and paprika  
Peel and slice tomatoes. Cook carrots in water to which a bouillon cube has been added. Cut top from loaf of bread, scoop out the soft part and save for bread crumbs. Brush inside of loaf with salad oil or melted butter. Place in oven and heat until brown and somewhat crisp. In the loaf put a layer of sliced tomatoes; sprinkle with salt. Cover with carrots, veal, onion and some of the parsley. Cover with sliced eggs, add remainder of tomatoes, sprinkle with salt, paprika and dash of paprika. Sprinkle lightly with buttered crumbs. (Add a layer of grated cheese, if desired.) Place in shallow baking dish and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 20 minutes or until tomatoes are tender. Serve in dish in which it was baked, in order not to break the loaf in removing it. Garnish with sprigs of parsley and sections of tomato.—By Day Monroe and Mary I. ## Cheese and Nut Salad

- One-half pound dry cottage cheese, 3-4 cup sweet cream, 1 cup chopped nut meats, 1 sweet green pepper, 1 teaspoon paprika, 1 head lettuce, French dressing.
- Dip pepper into boiling water. Let stand five minutes and plunge into cold water. Rub off this outer covering. Open and remove seeds and white ribs. Mince flesh. Add cream, salt and paprika to cheese and work well with a fork. Add nuts and pepper.

## PLANNING THE SUMMER SALAD LUNCHEON

A substantial salad often forms the main part of a summer luncheon. When this is the case, the rest of the meal should be chosen with much care and thought.

A cup of hot bouillon is excellent to use as a beginning for the salad luncheon. While the bouillon is hot in itself, it does not produce heat in the body and does prepare the stomach for the foods to come.

A hot creamed vegetable on toast combines well with a hearty salad. The salad calories are boosted and additional protein and mineral salts are provided. The toast helps to satisfy the appetite without introducing a new flavor to detract from the vegetable or salad.

The dessert for this sort of meal may take the form of a fruit pudding. This adds bulk and also satisfies the appetite. The sugar supplies "quick energy" to a meal which is lacking in this essential.

Since chicken and fish salads come naturally to mind when a substantial salad is mentioned, the recipe for a less ordinary salad is given here.

## VEGETABLE COMBINATIONS TAKE CAREFUL PLANNING

Flavors, Colors Should Contrast

When a vegetable dinner is planned the cook must keep in mind several important factors—the choice of vegetables, the method of cooking and serving, and food values.

A contrast in flavor and color should influence the choice as well as the method of cooking and serving vegetables. If one vegetable is creamed, let another be served plain with butter, another broiled or browned, and a third served in a croquette, timbale or fritter.

While all vegetables contain at least a trace of protein, it is not enough to keep up the balance in the body between the giving out and the intake of energy and is of less value than that found in some other sources. Nuts, eggs, cheese and milk can be introduced into vegetable plates in such a way that the proper balance is maintained.

**A Tasty Sandwich**  
Toasted cheese sandwiches are good served with a combination of vegetables and furnish the protein in an easily digested form along with the bread stuff.

Cheese also can be added to the white sauce served with potatoes or cauliflower. A cheese sauce does not combine well with all vegetables, so the choice is limited.

Poached or hard-cooked eggs add interest to almost all vegetable combinations.

**Stuffed Baked Tomatoes**  
Four tomatoes, 1 cup cooking rice, 1-3 cup chopped peanut meats, 2 tablespoons butter, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper.

Wash tomatoes and cut off tops. Scoop out centers to form cups. Drain the pulp and use with rice and nuts. Melt butter and combine with rice, nuts, tomato juice, salt and pepper. Fill tomatoes with mixture, cover with buttered crumbs and bake about 25 minutes in a moderately hot oven.

Stuffed vegetables such as tomatoes and peppers can be the means of taking care of the protein calories if the stuffing is chosen with care. Peanuts are cheap but rich in protein and combine well with nearly all vegetables. Tomatoes or peppers stuffed with a combination of rice and peanuts finely chopped are particularly good for an August dinner.

The following vegetable plate will supply other combinations to you:  
Stuffed baked tomatoes, buttered green beans, creamed carrots, corn on the cob.

A simple dessert of fresh fruit as always acceptable with a vegetable dinner when the required balance has been maintained.

## HEEL PREPAREDNESS

If your silk stockings wear out just above the heel of your shoe, thread a fine needle with matching single strands of yarn and darn the inside of new stockings at that spot, before putting them on. They will wear twice as long without coming through as the darn takes the wear rather than the hosiery.

## COOLING DRINKS MADE OF COFFEE

Many delightful summer drinks can be made of coffee. Its appeal is universal. In hot weather as well as cold, it is always on hand, and it is easily and quickly prepared.

Coffee for cold drinks may be made in the usual way, but since it will be diluted with ice, it should be somewhat stronger than if it were to be served hot. Here are several recipes that have been tested:

**Iced Spiced Coffee**  
6 cups strained coffee  
24 whole cloves  
1 five-inch stick cinnamon  
3-4 cup heavy cream, whipped and sweetened.

Add spices to coffee, boil five minutes, strain, add sugar and chill. Serve in glasses containing crushed ice and top with cream dusted with powdered cinnamon.

**Frosted Coffee**  
6 cups cold, strained coffee  
3-4 pint vanilla ice cream  
Serve on tray with coffee in a pitcher, glasses and shaker. Ice cream in bowl. Put two heaping teaspoons of ice cream into the shaker and add cup of coffee. Shake till cream is dissolved. Pour and serve. Each guest should be served separately.

**Iced Russian Coffee**  
3 cups ice cold coffee  
1 cup cocoa made with milk  
2 tablespoons cream  
4 tablespoons sugar  
Combine ingredients in order given in pitcher. Stir well or shake and serve with crushed ice.

**Coffee Maple Ice Cream**  
1 cup very strong coffee  
2 cups light cream  
1-3 cups maple syrup  
Salt  
Eg. yolk  
1-2 teaspoons vanilla  
Freeze in an ice cream freezer.

**Turkish Iced Coffee**  
1 cup cold coffee  
1-3 cups powdered sugar  
1-3 teaspoon rose extract  
Stir until dissolved. Pour into glasses, each of which should contain a little crushed ice, and top with stiffly whipped cream, which has been sweetened or add a little plain cream to each serving.

**Honey Flavored Iced Coffee**  
3-4 cup cold, clear coffee  
4-2 teaspoons honey  
Whipped cream  
Stir a third of the coffee into the honey and when dissolved add remainder of coffee. Pour into a tall glass, which has been filled with ice.

## BOXES—AS USEFUL AS THEY ARE GAY IN INTERIOR DECORATION

The clever home decorator is never content with things being merely useful—a box, for instance, must never be just a box—it should be as pretty as a vase. Among the many delightful decorative things suggested in the current issue of McCall Needlework and Decorative Arts magazine are the following boxes quickly and easily made to look different:

**"A tin cigarette box (110 cigarette size) painted with two coats of pale green is decorated with two small Godey prints. Varnish or shellac entire surface of box. Antique if desired.**

**"An undecorated wooden make-up box (about 10x12 inches) may be purchased, sandpapered with No. 00 sandpaper and painted cream enamel inside and green enamel outside. (2 coats each). Then a Botany print is pasted to the top and outlined with gold passe partout. Shellac entire box with at least one of shellac and antique if desired.**

**"A tin cracker box may be transformed by two coats of Chinese red lacquer or enamel and a ship medallion pasted on. Varnish entire surface of can and antique if desired."**

## OLDISH VEGETABLES

When cooking peas, corn, tomatoes or other vegetables that are not young try putting sugar in the water. This flavors them perceptibly.

## FASHION HINTS

### BIAS FLOUNCES

A black flat crepe for autumn, with pink georgette touches at neck and cuffs, has a new effect by introducing bias flounces around the hips girdle flaring below.

### "RATHER FISHY"

Norman Hartnell introduces a fall Paris evening gown of black tulle of sophisticated line and feel which has narrow folds and finely pleated flounces swinging to floor length on sides and back.

### BLACK LACE

A coarse mesh black lace fashions a stunning evening gown that is princess in line, with flounces below the hips, a deep square décolletage and short sleeves that reach to the elbows.

### EMBROIDERY APPEARS

Several informal and very feminine frocks for fall use embroidery effectively. One cuts its edge in fancy effect, making leaves of embroidery around the bottom of the skirt.

### ELBOW TRIM

An egg-shell white satin blouse, for dressy wear, has its round-neckline flanked by narrow triple circular collars and its long, tight sleeve decorated with narrow triple flounces.

### FOUR-PIECE SUIT

A blue and white flecked tweed suit, with tuck-in white blouse, makes itself into a four-piece suit by the addition of a white slip-on sweater with blue modernistic design with crew neck that tucks in, like the waist.

### SQUARE NECKLINES

Some new afternoon and evening gowns sponsor the square

### FALL SHOES

## VEGETABLE MARROW JAM

Three pounds marrow (weight after dicing), 3 lemons, sugar, 3 ounces ginger root.

The marrow should be not more than half grown. Pare and remove seeds. Cut in thin slices and then in match-like strips. Weigh. Make a syrup of two pounds sugar and 4 cups water. When boiling, add marrow and simmer 19 minutes. Remove from fire, cover with soft cloth and let stand two days. Drain off syrup. Weigh again and allow pound for pound of sugar, grated rind and juice of lemons and ginger root bruised and tied in a muslin bag into preserving kettle. Boil slowly until clear. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.
