

# NEWS IN BRIEF

## Condition Improved—

"Blinkus" Harvey is steadily improving after what seems an almost miraculous escape from the jaws of death. Tetanus serum by the thousands of units have been given to him since the first signs of lock jaw set in and today his chances for life are much more favorable.

Last night the last injection of the serum which was thought necessary was given.

For each 5,000 units of the serum the cost is \$6 and about 20,000 units have been given at each dose with about four doses to "Blinkus" during the past week. Four hundred dollars worth of a supply is now here at the Public hospital but it is thought that it will not be necessary to keep it. All expenses for the case will have to be undergone by the county.

The serum has been obtained from Portland after several attempts were made to get it from Klamath Falls and Alturas. Small doses were got from these places and a little was obtained here in Lakeview but put all together these supplies were not a fraction of the amount needed.—Lakeview Tribune.

## Cray Man Sets Fire—

Telling the world that he was a "wobbly" and owned a red card which he thought entitled him to rule the world Roy Reese, about 40, started a fire a little east of the highway in front of the Frank Duke house.

The fire was discovered by "Shorty" Longfellow and some neighbors who were unable to stop the incendiary motives of the man at first. Word was sent in to the authorities in town and Sam Rounds and Evan Martin arrived on the scene, arrested the man and helped put out the fire.

Reese was thought to be crazy from drink. On his arrival at the jail he told the officers that he was going to burn up the world and burn the jail up too.

Twenty-four hours passed before the effects of the drink wore off and the man returned to his normal state. He was released from the jail today to help fight fire. Date of his trial has not been set.—Lakeview Tribune.

## Youth Recovering—

Charles Santo, whose neck was broken a month ago when he struck another person while he was diving in a swimming tank is reported to be recovering slowly from the paralysis which has gripped him since the accident. Word was received yesterday by a local doctor from the Portland hospital where Santo is confined that an operation has not been performed on his neck as yet.

A different method of curing him is being resorted to, that of "pulling" his neck back into its normal shape. Santo lay paralyzed in his bed in Medford for several weeks before it was discovered he was suffering from a broken neck. He has been in the Portland hospital two weeks.—Medford News.

## INVESTIGATION IS ASKED FOR CROOKED RACE

CHICAGO, Aug. 22, (AP)—The state's attorney's office today inquired into the circumstances surrounding a race at the Hawthorne track yesterday in which Chick, the favorite, finished seventh in a field of eight. Officers were told that the three year old's chances of winning the race were ruined by a sponge "uffed in the thoroughbred's left nostril.

The sponge so obstructed the animal's breathing that he slowed down perceptibly in the stretch, despite every effort of his jockey.

The sponge was found by Dr. J. M. Kaiser, track veterinarian. He said a button was attached to the sponge, indicating that some one was attempting to remove the sponge at the time Dr. Kaiser appeared.

Chick was a 2 to 1 favorite. The race was won by Crofton, which paid \$15.52 for \$1. There was only a mild play on Crofton at the track, but officers were told that large sums were wagered on Crofton in other cities, especially St. Louis. Crofton is owned by A. A. Barroni, of Reno, Nev.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22, (AP)—A bottle of cognac is worth four baboons and three mountain monkeys to an Abyssinian chieftain.

Miss Gertrude Sanford, New York society girl, who just returned from a four months hunting expedition for rare museum specimens, said she was presented the small menagerie by a grateful native chief to whom she had given a bottle of brandy.

Upon arrival of the party here the engagement of Miss Sanford to Sidney Legendre, a member of the expedition, was announced. Morris Legendre and Donald Carter, assistant curator of the mammal division of the American museum of natural history, were the other members of the party.

## INDIANS REBEL AGAINST WAGES

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 22, (AP)—A dispatch to El Universal today from Vera Cruz said the warship Anahuac had sailed for the territory of Quintana Roo with troops to quell an uprising among the Maya Indians.

Reports of uprisings among the Mayas on the Yucatan peninsula have cropped up here from time to time recently but have not been regarded as alarming. Quintana Roo is the chicole producing center and it was understood here the Indians were dissatisfied with their wages as chicole gatherers.

PORTLAND, Aug. 22, (AP)—An eagle-eyed policeman's "hunch" that an early call to a private garage on the outskirts of Portland today would reveal violations of the liquor law proved fruitful and alleged booze valued at \$3,000 was confiscated.

Harold Wertz, 22, was arrested and lodged in jail in connection with the find.

Patrolman Chauvin laid in wait at the garage early today and said he caught Wertz driving into the garage with an automobile loaded down with 90 gallons of illicit liquor. In the garage, Chauvin said, he found the bulk of the liquor.

## DR. BELKNAP WINS CONTEST

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 22, (AP)—Dr. Wilford H. Belknap of Portland was adjudged winner of the Kiwanis speaking contest which was a feature Tuesday of the northwest district Kiwanis convention. Six other speakers participated in the oratorical competition, each speaking on a Kiwanis topic. The speakers were allowed five minutes each. The contest was held in the forenoon, and at a banquet in the armory last night Dr. Belknap was called to the speakers table by District Governor

T. Harry Gowman of Seattle and informed of his victory. The trophy will be awarded Dr. Belknap at a later meeting of the Portland club. He received an ovation when the award was announced.

## "BUY A BRICK" CAMPAIGN ON

PORTLAND, Aug. 21, (AP)—The "buy a brick" campaign inaugurated by the Oregon mothers' society to raise \$50,000 to match a similar appropriation by the state legislature with which to construct a new infirmary on the University of Oregon campus, is proceeding throughout the state, officials said today.

Seventy co-eds of the university are campaigning in Portland until Thursday night and in other cities, officials said, returns are coming in rapidly. Plans for the infirmary are incomplete and construction will begin immediately after the campaign is finished.

## MR. KAY IMPROVING

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 22, (AP)—State Treasurer T. B. Kay, who underwent a minor operation for relief from an illness contracted while on a trip to Europe, was removed from the hospital to his home yesterday. Mr. Kay was considerably weakened by the trip from the hospital, but his progress towards recovery is said to be satisfactory.

## FLIER WILL TRY TO PASS ZEP ON PACIFIC VOYAGE

LeBOURGNET, France, Aug. 22, (AP)—Dieudonne Coste, French air ace, announced this afternoon he would take off at 5 a. m. tomorrow on a flight around the world in pursuit of the German dirigible Graf Zeppelin which he hoped to overtake and pass before she could reach Lakehurst and New York.

The French aviator, who has already made a flight around the world since he crossed the South Atlantic ocean in 1927, told an intimate friend today that he would attempt to break the world's non-stop distance record for airplanes on the first stage of his flight.

Coste, flying in the machine with which he recently attempted to cross the Atlantic from east to west, will attempt to make the distance from LeBourget to Vladivostok, Siberia, in a single flight tomorrow.

He says he intends to refuel at Vladivostok and Tokyo, which he expects to reach by 9 p. m. Saturday.

## HUSBAND KILLER TO HANG

MONTREAL, Aug. 22, (AP)—Mrs. Mary Vian, 42-year-old mother of eight children, today was in jail at Hull, Que., where she will be hanged tomorrow for the murder of her husband. She collapsed yesterday, when she

was removed to Hull from the Fullum street jail for women where she had been confined for three months awaiting execution. Philibert Lefebvre, convicted with Mrs. Vian as her partner in the crime, was in the same jail, also sentenced to death.
