FIRE MENACES PARK TOWN IN NORTH MONTANA

COLUMBIA FALLS, Mont., Aug. 22. (AP)—Every available man of the Great Northern railway and the United States forestry service were battling desperately early today to save the town of Belton, 20 miles north-east of here on the border of Glacier national park, which is threatened by a forest fire.
Park administration buildings are located in the town and are in the immediate path of the fire.
All residents of the town, except those who stayed to fight the fire, were evacuated from the town last night on a special Great Northern train and equipment of the park buildings loaded on freight cars, to be moved if the fire advanced into the town.
Regular traffic over the Great Northern branch to Belton was suspended because the fire was raging on both sides of the track at Coram, between here and Belton.

BREAK IN DYKE RUINS CROP IN WEST SHANTUNG

PEIPING, Aug. 22. (AP)—As a result of a 1000 foot break in the dyke on the Hwang Ho or Yellow river in west Shantung through which a torrent of water is pouring, an area fifty miles long and five to ten miles wide has been inundated.
Crops have been ruined and the extreme misery of the population increased just at a time when they were preparing for the harvest season which would mitigate their sufferings through a prolonged famine.
The news of the situation came from the Roman Catholic Mission at Tsaochow.

CORN STEALING BRINGS DEATH TO JERSEY BOY

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Aug. 22. (AP)—A 12-year-old boy was shot to death, another boy probably fatally wounded and a young girl shot in both legs on the Blue Ribbon farm last night. They were said to have been stealing corn.
Grover and Craig Hoffman, owners of the farm were held by state police today, but no specific charge had been placed against them.
The dead boy, John Kolesar, was killed instantly. Helen Klemmentovich, 14, and her younger brother Joseph were in a hospital where it was said there was no hope of the boy recovering.
