

NOT GUILTY TO BE PANTAGES' CLAIM AT BAR

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 22. (AP)—Alexander Pantages, 54, multi-millionaire theater operator, was to appear in superior court at 2 p. m. today and plead to the charges of attacking Eunice Pringle, 17-year-old school girl dancer at his private offices August 9.

Defense attorneys have indicated that the theater magnate will enter a plea of not guilty to the two assault charges filed against him. They said they would ask a reasonable time to prepare their case.

Buron Pitts, district attorney, announced that the state will ask the trial be set for Sept. 17. Two other cases in superior court have priority. Coincidence is the fact that one of these is the second degree murder charge filed against Mrs. Pantages.

The theater operator's wife must go to trial Sept. 3 for the death of Joe Rokumoto who was killed when the machine which he was driving, collided with the automobile driven by Mrs. Pantages. Witnesses at her preliminary hearing said she was driving while intoxicated.

Pantages was bound over to superior court last Friday following a preliminary hearing. Judge Leonard Wilson held that the evidence submitted left "sufficient cause for belief that the defendant is guilty." The theater owner is at liberty on \$25,000 bond.

But while I work, I want to stay here. I found myself slipping, losing contact with my public. As an artist I must comment on modern times, and by that I mean things to America. I can only do that

If I live here, much as I love Europe."

Mr. Barton was asked what he thought of Frank Ward O'Malley, equally famed Broadwayite, who declared in articles and interviews a few days ago that he, O'Malley, could no longer stand America and that he, O'Malley, was closing up the little place in New Jersey to reside in Europe until his bones dropped apart or his brain was ready for vivisectionists.

Mr. Barton gave a sort of sad snort.

"He'll be back," said Mr. Barton. "I should say within three years, especially if he keeps on working. I know just how he feels. I once felt the same way myself. But now I know the answer. I have lived three years in Paris and I know. One is neither fish nor fowl. I have decided it is better to be a canny New Yorker than a savant or the triumph of the boulevard."

Mr. Barton, whose drawings of professional reformers with warts on their noses have brought cheer to countless firesides, then went out to search for subjects among the new crop of fanatics. He narrowly missed being run down by a party of middle-western school teachers in a sightseeing bus, but he smiled sweetly at them, they reminded him of Paris.

Among the Russian units in the far east are 7,000 infantry on garrison duty at Tawail, 7,000 infantry near Manchull, 1,200 Mongolian cavalry in the Lake Baikal region and a detachment of Mongolian cavalry and infantry totalling 1,700 stationed at Biagoveshtinsk. This last named unit is equipped with field guns and 25 armored trains.

PEIPING, China, Aug. 22. (AP)—The fireworks of war preparation along the Manchurian border now have their counterpart on the far eastern ether.

Since the beginning of the dispute between Russia and China, the Russian radio station at Khabarovsk has daily broadcast news and propaganda about the Chinese Eastern railway situation.

Mukden has taken the hint and is using its radio station for similar purposes.

Adherence to the facts of the dispute does not appear to be the guiding principle of these rival stations.

It was an officially broadcast announcement from Mukden which reported the mythical invasion of Manchuria by 10,000 Russian troops Aug. 17, while Khabarovsk's latest effort is a denunciation of the American department of state for plotting with the French government to set up an international control commission for the Chinese Eastern railway in order to have a finger in the pie.

The Russian station added that "the stubborn and crafty Japan is standing by to protect and improve her Manchurian interests."

CHINESE ALERT

SHANGHAI, Aug. 22. (AP)—The Tachung, semi-official news agency of the Chinese nationalist government, continued today to circulate dispatches under Manchurian date lines stating Chinese authorities continued extensive military preparations in anticipation of renewed Russian activities along the frontiers.

A dispatch from Kirin, provincial capital of the northeastern province of Manchuria, stated that Chinese military intelligence officers reported that the soviet army is preparing to launch a major attack near the eastern terminus of the Chinese Eastern railway.

This is to be followed by additional attacks throughout the railway zone with Harbin as the objective. The Kirin dispatch adds that heavy concentration of troops continues along the frontier.

A Tachung dispatch from Harbin stated that a Russian raiding party appeared near Chalanor Tuesday night, firing on Chinese troops with two deaths and four casualties. It is reported that Chinese anti-aircraft units brought down a Russian bombing plane near Manchull on Monday night while the plane was bombing the city.

Two hundred soviet cavalry men appeared at Yuyunhsien Tuesday, set fire to a number of houses and kidnapped three rich Chinese business men.

STRIKERS USE EXPLOSIVE TO HURT SERVICE

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 22. (AP)—Explosion of dynamite, under the wheels of a street car here last night blew an 18-inch piece of steel through the floor and roof of the car, injuring one passenger and stunning ten others.

The explosion was characterized by police as the most serious affair of the kind since the beginning of the carmen's strike nearly two months ago.

M'NARY URGES SENATE REVISE ACT ON TARIFF

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 22. (AP)—Resenting action of the senate finance committee at Washington in reducing the tariff provided by the house bill on cherries and filberts, and also in failing to stand for an adequate protection on timber, Senator Charles L. McNary today sent a pointed telegram to Senator James E. Watson, chairman of the sub-committee on agricultural products of the senate finance committee.

Before he left Washington Senator McNary was given to understand by Watson that ample opportunity would be given the agricultural interests for hearing in the senate committee deliberations.

"As a result of conversation with you," said Senator McNary's telegram to Watson, "I assumed there would be no molestation of agricultural schedules in the house bill unless opportunity was given to the producers to be heard. In any event this is a rule of simple justice. The cherry and filbert industries have invited large investments along the coast and in the northwest, and are in need of adequate protection, which was afforded in the house bill.

Importers Object

"Testimony discloses that one or two importers or processors from the city dropped in and changed the situation. The growers feel outraged. With patience and diligence they presented their case at length to the house committee and without warning their interests have been sacrificed.

"The great resource and most important industry in the great northwest and some of the intermountain states is conversion of timber into various products. Again the committee heeded not the cry for adequate protection."

"I favor adequate protection to steel and sugar and shoes, but I do not want to stop there. I hope these subject matters have not gone beyond the control of the committee and that further reflection will develop the virtue of my protest."

Senator McNary prepared the telegram after receiving and reading copies of committee deliberations in which it was shown that certain confectioners, by their testimony, had influenced the committee to alter the schedules.
