MRS. HERMANN PASSES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 23, (A P)—Mrs. Flora Hermann, widow of Binger Hermann, congressman from Oregon for 16 years and for six years commissioner of the United States General Land office, died here last night after a lengthy illness.

Mrs. Hermann was born at Lawrenceburg, Ind., October 23, 1847, crossing to planes by wagon train when she was four years old. They reached Portland in 1852.

She is survived by Schiller B. Hermann, Portland; Mrs. H. P. Gattley, Washington D. C., who will arrive tonight, and Elbert B. Hermann, Roseburg.

MAKES SOLO FLIGHT

HICKSVILLE, N. Y., Aug. 23, (AP)—Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh made her first solo flight today as her famous husband stood on the ground and watched with no apparent nervousness.

The flight was made in a light open cockpit plane from the field of the Aviation Country club, where the Lindberghs have been staying and where the flying colonel has been giving his wife lessons in piloting. Nine hours instructions in the air preceded the solo hop.

MISSING RADIO OPERATOR SEEN IN NORTHWEST?

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 23, (A P)—Police departments in Oregon and Washington were seeking a man today said to be a "dead ringer" for William L. Tallman, missing radio operator, wanted for the murder of Mrs. Virginia Patty in Los Angeles several months ago, who was said to have spent Wednesday night at La Center, Wash.

Frank M. Ellis, head of the Portland bureau of the Pinkerton Detective Agency and Inspector Leonard of the Portland police department, were notified by La Center officials that the man registered at Matt Woodward's hotel as from Anaheim, Cal. The name under which he registered was withheld.

Police said the suspect was wearing an aviator's cap with goggles and was riding a motorcycle when he left La Center for Portland.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 23, (A P)—A man who registered at the Woodward hotel, La Center, Wash., last night under the name of James Skinner, Anaheim, Cal., was being sought by Pacific northwest police as a suspect of being William L. Tallman, missing radio operator, indicted for the slaying of Mrs. Virginia Patty in Los Angeles.

Frank W. Ellis, Portland Pinkerton detective agency chief, and Inspector Leonard of the Portland police department, said that Matt Woodward, proprietor of the La Center hotel, believed it was Tallman because of a similarity in handwriting and

RUSS AVIATOR STARS SECOND AMERICAN TRIP

MOSCOW, Aug. 23, (AP)—Semyon Shestakov, Russian aviator who crashed near Siberia on an attempted Moscow to New York flight, left here at 3 a. m. (8 p. m. E. S. T. Thursday) on a new attempt to reach America by the same route. He planned several stops, the first possibly at Krasnoyarsk, 2,000 miles away.

His new plane, like that he cracked up at Chita after crossing most of Asia, was called the "Land of the Soviets". It has two engines of 1,200 horsepower similar to the engines of the former plane.

The aviator said if his flight was successful it was proposed to establish in 1931 an airline between Russia and the American west coast as a continuation of the trans-Siberian service.

The first Land of the Soviets crashed in the wilds of Siberia near Chita on August 8, the plane being considerably damaged but its crew escaping injury.
