

COMMITTEE ON COMPENSATION TO MEET SOON

SALEM, Aug. 23. (AP)—A study of the Oregon workmen's compensation act with a view to possible amendments will be the function of a committee of 15 members appointed today by Governor Patterson, under instructions given him by the 1929 legislature through senate joint resolution No. 10. While the resolution provided only for a committee of nine members, the governor at this own initiative increased the number to 15. Explaining in a letter to interested persons that the larger committee would more fairly represent the employers, the employees and the public and that the expense of its deliberations would be no greater.

The appointees are: Henry L. Corbett, Portland, state senator; George C. Guild, Portland, president of Columbia Paper Box company; Gust Anderson, Portland, member of house of representatives and organized labor official; George Palmer, Hood River, master of state grange; A. J. Vore, Klamath Falls, Big Lakes Box company; M. C. Woodward, Silverton, lumber manufacturer; James R. Kerr, Portland, attorney and one of the authors of compensation act; C. M. Ryerson, Portland, editor Portland Labor press; J. R. Reed, Portland, member of General Contractors' association; J. H. Maglady, Eugene, lumberman; Ben T. Osborne, Portland, organized labor official; Dr. A. H. Starbuck, Dallas, representing public at large; Charles H. Minnaugh, Portland, engaged in logging on Columbia river; W. C. Ruegnitz, Portland, editor of Four-L Bulletin; J. S. Norvell, Helix, member of house of representatives.

The senate joint resolution points out that the compensation act has been in operation since January 1, 1914, and has never been amended, although economic changes have taken place since that time. The committee, in possible preparation of recommended amendments, will compare the act with the compensation laws of other states. It will make its report to the governor. If the governor approves the recommendations he will embody them in his message to the 1931 legislature.

Governor Patterson said that he would call the committee together for organization in Portland some time in October.

rived and was seated in front of the store with a shotgun on his lap when Brown came up, also carrying a shotgun. Both guns were loaded with buckshot.

Brown walked past Huddleston, and the latter followed him into the store. Brown stopped in the store and Huddleston went out through the back way and around to the front where he reoccupied his seat.

Brown walked out, turning as if to pass down the street, but suddenly wheeled, firing the load of one barrel into Huddleston's stomach. Huddleston, fatally wounded, fired from his lap, the charge taking effect in Brown's chest and causing instant death. The gun's recoil knocked Huddleston to the sidewalk. He died a few hours later.

Officials said Brown previously had served three months on a chain gang for an elopement with Huddleston's daughter. The father had been informed Brown had returned yesterday from a second elopement with the daughter, and it was then he sent the message. Huddleston was the father of five children. The daughter involved was 25 and divorced.

WRIGLEY SWIM EVENT STARTS

TORONTO, Aug. 23. (AP)—Martha Norellus, former world amateur champion, glided swiftly into the lead as 45 women distance swimmers dove from the starting line at 12:15 p. m. today in the annual ten mile Wrigley Marathon in Lake Ontario. Ethel Hertle, defending champion, followed her by a few yards in the chase for the \$15,000 prize money.

At the crack of the starting gun, the 45 contestants flashed away from the float in one line but Miss Norellus, Olympic champion and holder of a dozen world records, quickly pulled into a lead of several yards over Miss Hertle at 1:00 yards.

Most of the contestants paraded to the float in light bathing suits and heavy coats of grease. Several discarded the suits just before the start.

Miss Norellus held a lead of ten yards over Ruth C. Tower, of Toronto at the end of the first mile. Mrs. Evelyn Armstrong of Detroit was third and Miss Hertle fourth, 75 to 100 yards behind the leader. Leah Riley, of Ennsburg, N. J., was fifth. The two pace setters were stroking 55 and 45 strokes to the minute respectively.

Officials announced at the start that the temperature of the water was 64 degrees. The weather was warm with a light breeze from the southwest and a slight haze over the three mile course.

Matching stroke for stroke with the Olympic champion, Miss Tower, formerly of Denver, cut the lead of Miss Norellus to 65 yards at the five mile mark, half way to the finish. The pace slowed considerably and both leaders were averaging 50 strokes to the minute. Miss Tower started to whistle away Miss Norellus 100 yard advantage at the three mile mark and gained steadily, if slowly, as the race wore on. Both had lapped many of the stragglers.

Mrs. Evelyn Armstrong swam easily in third place, 200 yards behind the leaders but 100 yards ahead of Miss Riley, who despite her youth held up remarkably under the fast pace. Ethel Hertle was 65 yards farther back. The remainder of the field straggled far behind the 1929 champion.

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STATE CHIEF APPOINTS MEN FOR CONGRESS

SALEM, Aug. 23. (AP)—While Governor Patterson has named only Ronald G. Calvert, editor of the Oregonian, as his official representative at the conference of western governors that meets in Salt Lake City next Monday, he has appointed 17 other Oregon men to attend if possible. The appointments are made at the request of the governors' association and on the basis of the appointees' activities in reclamation, forestry, taxation and chamber of commerce activities. Those going to the convention will go at their own expense and not at state expense.

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CRAMBLETT'S TO CELEBRATE 8TH BUSINESS YEAR

Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Cramblett of the Public Market, will celebrate their 8th anniversary in Klamath Falls on tomorrow. It is with pride that the Cramblett each succeeding year mark another mile stone of their residence in Klamath by some fitting recognition at their place of business on South Sixth street.

Eight years ago, August 24, 1921, Mr. and Mrs. Cramblett arrived in Klamath Falls with \$15, a 5x7 tent, one baby, and a lot of ambition. Today they still have the child, who is fast growing into an attractive young lady; a lovely home on Lake Shore Drive; one of the largest grocery stores in southern Oregon; and increased ambition to do even farther in the next 8 years.

Further proof of just what they are doing to improve their business here and the success with which they are meeting, appeared in three grocery trade journals last month when pictures of the store were printed along with ratings and The Public Market was listed as one of the 3 most modern individually owned stores in America.

The Public Market was first started as a farmers co-operative market place with booths after the fashion of such things. From this stage Mr. and Mrs. Cramblett took full charge and sold the farmers produce in a space 20x20 feet until enough capital was amassed to move the Public Market into larger quarters on North Sixth street where the business really began to prosper and it was at last possible to move into the present new location on South Sixth street. This happened two years ago.

It is a long cry from packing boxes and rough stalls to electric refrigeration, steel and hardwood counters and glass show cases, but the Cramblett's have made the grade and their eighth anniversary is real testimony of this fact. In the old days Mr. Cramblett delivered his produce from house to house in a little red cart; today a motor truck is doing this duty as a further service to patrons of the Market.

U. O. Man Honored



UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene.—One of the highest honors which can be given musical students, was awarded to Malcolm Medlar, Salem, blind pianist and organist of the University of Oregon, when he received the Juillard scholarship for this district from New York.

To be awarded the scholarship, which means a year's study under Mrs. Jane Thacher, professor of music at the University of Oregon, is a signal honor and came as the result of a tryout held on the campus early in May, when a large number of students of voice, cello and piano competed for the award. The selection of Mr. Medlar was made by Mrs. Olga Samaroff, famous musician.

Medlar has been studying for the past two years under Mrs. Thacher, and has attracted a great deal of attention for his unusual ability.

DEMOCRATS TO FIGHT TARIFF

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23. (AP)—The democratic members of the senate finance committee today agreed upon a program of vigorous opposition to the tariff bill as revised by the republican membership.

Particular attention will be given by the minority to the flexible provisions of the measure, the proposed enlargement of the powers of the tariff commission. As well as all proposed changes in rates.

Senator Simmons of North Carolina, ranking on the committee, after a meeting with his minority colleagues, declared the consensus of the democrats was that the revised measure was a "monstrously bad bill," and that

they should do all in their power to amend it.

"We did not go into a discussion of particular rates," Simmons said, "but we just had a general discussion of the bill and thought it was a very bad one and ought to be defeated."
