ROYAL COUPLE GO TO COUNTRY

LONDON, Aug. 24. (AP)—King George and Queen Mary left Buckingham Palace shortly after 12:30 today for the country palace at Sandringham. They traveled in a closed motor car to the railway station where a special train awaited them for the journey north.

The King's train pulled out shortly before one o'clock for Wolferton. It is about five miles from Sandringham whence His Majesty was to take a motor car to the palace.

Departure of the royal party from Buckingham Palace was witnessed by a crowd estimated to number 5,000 all eager to catch the first glimpse of the King since July 2nd, when he made his last public appearance attending the Thanksgiving service in Westminster.

DOCTORS ARE URGED TO AID HEALTH WORK

The State Board of Health has requested 1,000 doctors to become health officers to examine children of six years and under and immunize them against smallpox and diphtheria in the pre-school campaign now being launched, according to information received here today.

A large percentage of the physicians of the state of Oregon have volunteered their services for this "Getting Ready for School" campaign. County health associations, Parent-Teacher organizations and Women's clubs have been invited to assist.

Physicians having examined more than 100 children will be awarded certificates of merit by the State Board of Health.

verely beaten up in the old city. Communists Active. Communists in Palestine exploited the events of recent days with a proclamation calling upon "all Palestine to break down British imperialism". The Moslem committee for defense of the walling wall issued an appeal to the Moslems alleging responsibility rested upon the Jews. The appeal asserted the Jews sought to extend their rights at the wall and contended: "This is dangerous and inadmissible."

The Zionist executive and the National council of Palestine Jews issued a "call to National discipline," deploring events and criticizing the action of police as having proceeded "without pity."

The statement said that at the funeral of Abraham Mirzachi, occasion for a violent outbreak, scores of persons were injured, including aged persons and others who had submitted to the order of the police.

It was said the organizations would meet the government representatives and demand that those guilty for the action be punished.

Troops Dispatched

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, Aug. 24. (AP)—It was understood here today a battalion of troops was being dispatched immediately to Palestine in connection with the rioting about the walling wall at Jerusalem.

JERUSALEM, Aug. 24. (AP)

A delegation of Americans now in Jerusalem tonight asked the United States consul to request the sending of an American warship to Palestine when rioting between Arabs and Jews over the right of worship at the walling wall brought nine more deaths in and around the Holy City this afternoon.

stay a few days to get the Klamath Basin spirit thoroughly in his blood, to which he replied: "I already have it, and if I stayed too long I am afraid New York would not look good to me any longer. When I saw the tremendous farming resources in that Tule lake country I settled down to a decision that the Southern Pacific has made no mistake in spending its money on this new line of railroad. The timber resource is great and it will furnish a good tonnage while it lasts, but that farming area is ever present and each year will give to society great crops. It will feed people for hundreds of years to come."

When it was suggested that the Tule lake area was destined to be the outstanding livestock feeding grounds of the future in the west, Mr. Holden heartily agreed. To Be Main Line Standard. Those who have considered the Klamath Falls-Alton cut-off as a more feeder line for the Southern Pacific have guessed it wrong. According to Mr. Holden this line of road will be given main line finish at once. Instead of letting it set for years as is the custom when branch lines are built, it will be ballasted immediately and prepared for the heaviest traffic.

"It is the most logical thing in the world," said Mr. Holden, "to consider this new line as the outlet to the east for this north-west country. We will begin running heavy freight trains on it soon. The Willamette valley products, the fruit of the Southern Oregon country, the lumber, both fir and pine, will go over this line for we save several hundred miles to the east and we avoid many mountain hauls."

When asked if it was possible that passenger trains for the east would use the new line, Mr. Holden said: "Yes, it is not only possible, but it will be done. I can see good passenger traffic to the west. Oh, you can be assured

that the Klamath Falls-Alton railroad is to be a mighty important part of the Southern Pacific system."

Viewed the City.

The special train pulled in about 11 o'clock Saturday morning. While the officials had but little time, due to other appointments north, they did take time to view the city. A hurried trip was made by automobiles over the Southern Pacific property. Inspection was made of the new extensions to the yards here, they were taken over the Hot Springs residence addition, out around lake Ewauna and to the Weather-houser property. The short time prevented any interviews with prominent local people and prevented the officials which would have been a distinct pleasure to Klamath Falls as a community.

Charles E. Perkins was unable to get in touch with his old friend, Jack Kimball, although he tried to do so. All of the party wanted to stay longer. They liked the looks of things here. The traffic on Main street at 11 o'clock in the morning interested them very much, and the new buildings, the plan for development which was briefly told them, impressed every member of the party.

Returning to their private train at noon they embarked for points north where appointments had already been made.

had progressed almost 100 miles in an hour.

As flying conditions gradually changed for the better the mistress of the air began to veer to the north in order to follow the inviolable but easily located path of the trans-Pacific steamships.

For the first 24 hours of her trip the Zeppelin held generally to an eastward course, giving the great circle route a wide berth in order to feel its way through more favorable weather. About 24 hours after it had left Kasumigaura it was almost on a straight line between Tokyo and San Francisco.

Early this morning, however, the position reports, coming almost with clocklike regularity, showed Dr. Hugo Eckener had decided that he could sail nearer to the Great Circle route, his originally planned course, with safety. The air liner after feeling its way through fog, clouds and darkness, located itself along the sailing route from San Francisco to Yokohama, which is somewhat south of the Great Circle.

In spite of the apparently fair sailing conditions, one message reaching here showed that the Zeppelin's crew had been kept busy. A radio message from the liner Stanley D.Dollar said Dr. Eckener and Captain Robert Dollar, shipping magnate who was aboard the surface vessel, had exchanged wireless greetings and quoted the master of the dirigible as saying his crew was "busy with the ship."

The Stanley Dollar was several hundred miles south of the Zeppelin.

CHICAGO PLANS BROADER ROADS

CHICAGO, Aug. 24. (AP)—An "Express" highway building program entailing expenditure of \$11,567,108, has been prepared by the west side committee of the Chicago plan commission to bring the western city limits within a few minutes by automobile of downtown Chicago.

The plan embraces almost everything that speeders, safety experts and highway planners have dreamed of for years. The program calls for the double decking or depressing of three streets to provide unobstructed roadways for "express" automobile traffic.

WOMAN'S POOR AIM WAS LUCKY THING FOR COP

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 24. (AP)—With Mrs. Anna Schrader, private detective, held on a charge of assault with intent to kill preferred by Police Lieutenant William Breuning, the man she is alleged to have attempted to shoot, police today were attempting to unravel what they described as "one of the most unusual cases in local history."

Both Mrs. Schrader and the police admitted they have known each other for more than eight years. The woman told detectives that she and Breuning were "more than friends."

"He has never missed seeing me a single night in the last eight years," she told her questioners. Mrs. Schrader, who is said to be the wife of a railroad man, declared she had no intention of shooting the police officer. Breuning, however, told his superiors that she attacked him as he drove up in front of his home. He said she fired once through the window of the automobile and again when he reached the sidewalk after he had knocked the weapon from her hand.

Explaining to detectives her presence near the Breuning home and possession of the revolver Mrs. Schrader said, "some time ago he (Breuning) went to Chief of Police Jenkins and told him the story of our relations. His wife was with him and he merely wanted to save himself and damage my character."

"I decided to have a 'settlement' so last night I waited for him. I took my gun because I was afraid of him. He hurt me once when he twisted my arm."

Detectives said Mrs. Schrader was somewhat vague as to what occurred after Breuning's arrival in front of his home.

They quoted her as having said that the "gun just went off while we were struggling on the sidewalk."

Chief of Police Jenkins verified Mrs. Schrader's statement relative to Breuning's conversation regarding her. "Lieutenant and Mrs. Breuning came to me," the chief said, "and advised me that Mrs. Schrader was infatuated with the officer. Breuning told me that she insisted on his keeping appointments with her."

NAVAL AVIATOR LOSES LIFE AT EUGENE TODAY

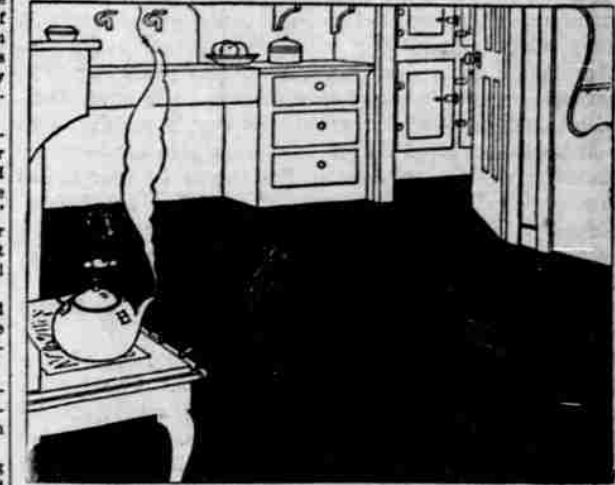
EUGENE, Aug. 24. (AP)—J. J. Demashock, naval chief aviator pilot, stationed at San Diego, Cal., was killed instantly here this morning when his Boeing plane went into a tailspin at a 300 foot altitude and crashed on the Eugene airport.

Demashock, with six other naval fliers in individual planes, took off for San Diego, making a perfect run down the field. His plane gained altitude swiftly, but Lieut. T. G. Richards commander of the flight said Demashock pulled his plane up too sharply and a heavy load of gasoline blew it into the tailspin.

Richards said Demashock had been a naval flier many years, but did not know from where he came. He was 33 years old. The plane was wrecked.
