AT THE PINE TREE

All the lazy charm of a little village in the tropics is shown in "From Headquarters," Monte Blue's latest production for Warner Bros., with its scenes laid in and around the little town of San Marcalo. The picture is at the Pine Tree theater now.

SOLDIER DEAD BROUGHT BACK

CT. PAUL, Minn., Aug. 26. (A P)—Recovery of the bodies of 28 American soldiers killed and buried in Russia more than ten years ago, was announced today in a report to the National Council of administration of the veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States.

The council meeting was preliminary to the opening of the national convention of the organization Sunday.

The recovery of the bodies was effected by a special commission of the veterans, headed by Edwin S. Bittelheim of Washington, D. C. Search is being made for bodies of 100 other American soldiers known to have been killed while serving as members of the "Polar Bear" division on duty in Russia during the world war.

BODIES RECOVERED
