YANKEES TURN ABOUT AND TAG ATHLETICS 2-0

Champions Turn After Losing Five Straight.

The Cubs of 1929 are not going to win 116 ball games, but they nevertheless retain a chance to equal or improve upon another feat performed by their illustrious predecessors of 23 years ago. The Cubs of the late Frank Leroy Chance in 1906 not only won 116 victories, but rested 20 games ahead of the runner-up Glants at the finish. This mark, second only to Pittsburgh's 27 1/2 game victory over Brooklyn in 1902, remains in danger before the rush of Joe McCarthy's fast-flying team.

After cutting the Reds again yesterday by 4 to 1 as the Pirates curbed humbly before the Phillies by 7 to 4, the Cubs rested 14 1/2 games to the good, eager to increase the edge in the five-game series which opens at Pittsburgh today with a doubleheader. No other team in the National league has enjoyed such a situation at this stage of the race since those earlier Cubs of Chance ran wild in 1906; no other team in the league has had such an edge at any point along the trail since John McGraw's 1912 champions piled up a large early margin only to see it wither.

A continuation through the stretch of the results of the last five weeks could give the Cubs an ultimate lead of 20 games or more, and most likely would land them in the .700 class, achieved by no National league winner since the Pirates of 1903 reached .734 with 110 victories. The Cubs need 28 out of 35 to gain 105 triumphs and .701.

Despite cool breezes blowing in from the lake 25,000 fans visited Wrigley field yesterday to see the Bruins make it three out of four from the Reds. Sheriff Fred Blake found the chill wind no handicap, limiting the visitors to six safe blows. Curtis Walker's homer in the fourth gave the Red's their only run.

The triumph of the Phillies was the second major league victory of young Harry Smythe, the Asheville, N. C., southpaw, who made his first start. His earlier winning effort also was at the expense of the Pirates on their recent and longer visit to Baker bowl. The Phils crowded all of their seven runs into one inning, the seventh.

George William Pippas entertained 20,000 Yankee clients and gave Cornelius McGillicuddy an uncomfortable afternoon by holding the Athletics to three hits yesterday as the champions nosed out the leaders by 2 to 0.

Babe Ruth retired after striking out in the first inning. He was suffering from a heavy cold in his back muscles, but expected to take another fling today.

Washington and Boston, star eastern performers in the recent western invasion by the seaboard clubs of the American league, hooked at each other for 14 innings, with the Senators finally winning by 5 to 4.

Only four games were played in the major leagues yesterday, and only the same number, two in the Pittsburgh doubleheader, were on the schedule today.

OLD FAVORITE NOW UNDERDOG

NEW YORK, Aug. 27. (AP)—For perhaps the first time in his American career, Kid Chocolate, dusky Cuban featherweight, will enter the ring for his 12-round bout with Al Singer at the Polo grounds tomorrow night an underdog in the betting.

Quotations of 8 and 9 to 5 and some of them as high as 2 to 1 on Singer have been offered freely in the past week. Indications were that these odds would hold good at ring time.

Chocolate and his handlers apparently are doing little or no worrying over the fact that the Cuban will be on the short end of the betting odds. Few opponents have hit Chocolate with a right hand and that's Singer's most potent weapon. And as for comparative records, the Cuban "Kid" has all the best of it.

Jack "Kid" Berg, English lightweight, and Spug Meyers of Chicago are booked in the 10-round semi-final. Harry Ebbs of Freeport and Izzy Grove, New York middleweight, meet in the first ten.

AMERICA GETS SPEED RECORD

After winning two records early last spring, only to have them exceeded later in the season, America has regained the 200-kilometer and the 200-mile international records from France, through the performance of an eight-cylinder Graham-Paige on England's famous track at Brooklands.

Covering 200 kilometers at an average speed of 93.88 miles per hour, then continuing to complete 200 miles at an average of 92.52 miles per hour, the four-speed Graham-Paige again took title to the international records for these two distances in the class of cars from 200 to 400 cubic inches piston displacement.

The record-breaking run was made by D. M. K. Marendax, driving a standard Graham-Paige model conforming to the regulations of the governing body that officially observes all attempts to break existing records.

The Graham-Paige achievement at Brooklands is the climax of an interesting rivalry between

NASH MODELS ARE POPULAR

On this occasion the run was made with a five-passenger sedan carrying full equipment, the first time a closed car had ever gained a speed record at Brooklands.

Spurred on by the victory of the American car, a Delage equipped with a sports body set out to retrieve the record for France, and exceeded the Graham-Paige sedan's figures by a wide margin, averaging 93.04 miles per hour and 88.87 miles per hour respectively for the 200 kilometers and 200 miles.

Ducks Top League with Two Full Games Margin

The Portland club of the Pacific coast league strengthened its position at the head of the circuit yesterday by defeating the Los Angeles Angels in the first encounter of those clubs for the week's series. The Ducks thus advanced to a lead of two full games ahead of the Angels who stood in second place.

A ninth inning rally by the Portlanders saved the day by giving the northerners the long and a 9 to 8 score. It was their 16 consecutive victory, a record for any club in the coast league for this season, if not for all time. Wallace Walters, who held the mound for Portland, won his own game when he laced out a single, scoring Harris with the winning run after the Ducks had rolled up four runs in that last frame. The angels took a six-run lead early in the game, but Manager Rodgers refused to remove Walters from the box.

The San Francisco Seals celebrated after a strenuous week against the Ducks in which the latter won seven times in a row, by defeating the Seattle Indians, last club in the standings, by a score of 5 to 4 in the Seattle ball park. 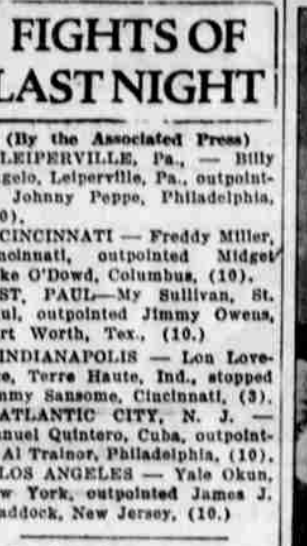
