A squadron of airplanes from local fields went out to meet the Graf Zeppelin and escorted it over the city.

These fixed the dead and wounded in the last five days fighting between Jews and Moslem Arabs at 143, and 426, divided as follows: Killed, 46 Moslems, four Christians and 269 Jews. It was added an accurate check of casualties was impossible. Upheaval among the Transjordanian Arabs growing out of the Palestine fighting has become so violent the government has found it necessary to close the eastern Jordan frontier against possible invasion by sympathetic Nomads, but armed Bedouins crossed the Jordan despite guards placed on the bridges. Other Tribes Arising. The Beersheba tribes were said here to be arming and gathering by the thousands for the northward march which gave rise to fear of a clash with British soldiery at Hebron, scene Saturday of a massacre in which Jews literally cut to pieces Jewish men, women, and children. Refugees arriving from Transjordan said the situation there was becoming worse. Although the Jews thus far have been made the object of the Arab attacks the situation has become such that a few fanatical "Holy men" might easily turn the fellahs—Moslem peasants—against the Christians and British rulers. Some idea of the widespread Moslem sympathy with the Palestine Arabs could be gleaned from the demonstration yesterday of 20,000 Moslems in the Jewish quarter of Damascus. Troops finally dispersed the tribesmen. Consul Asks Help. Halfa seems to have suffered from considerable fighting, with many deaths in the Sephardic quarter near the railway station. The American consul here asked the British authorities for immediate help to prevent any trouble in the children's village there where many refugee children from the Ukraine are being cared for by the near east relief. Shipping continued in Jerusalem, but it was expected the arrival today of Sir John Chancellor, high commissioner, and consular arrival of British troops by air from Egypt should result in restoration of complete order here. Foreign consuls have been in frequent conference regarding the seriousness of the situation.

ADVANCE PRINT OF BLUE BOOK IS OFF PRESS

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 28. (AP)—An advance print of the Oregon Blue Book, biennial Oregon compendium of official information about the state, is off the press today. Secretary of State Hoss, publisher of the volume, announces that a subsequent edition is to come in which any errors found in the first will be corrected. Some new features appear in the new Blue Book. Most noticeable is the coverage in colors, showing the state capital in the background and the Proctor statue of the Circuit Rider in the foreground. The cover page was prepared by Andrew Vincent, Oregon artist. Other new features are the words and music of the official Oregon song, a state highway map in colors and a tabulation of the 1928 primary election vote. A considerable change has been made in the typographical appearance of the volume. The text matter was edited by Elbert Bede of Cottage Grove.

PRICE LOWERED AT NATATORIUM

A Botti, proprietor of the New Klamath Natatorium, announces a reduction in swimming price as affecting adults. The summer price has been 50 cents and to encourage use of the nat for the next several weeks, Mr. Botti has lowered it to 40 cents. The price for children remains the same, 25 cents. Mr. Botti is planning to lay a dance floor in the natatorium soon and will conduct a dance hall during the winter. He has followed that business before and believes the location of his building is favorable to a successful conduct of such a hall.

BOY HELD FOR KILLING FATHER

PENDLETON, Aug. 28. (AP)—Glenn Moore, 14, was held in the city jail here today pending an investigation of the death of his father, Helstead Moore, prominent Oregon rancher, who authorities said was shot and wounded fatally by Glenn when the youth's mother called for help. The shooting is said to have occurred on the Moore-Jordan ranch south of Hermiston late last night. Moore died in a Pendleton hospital from gunshot wounds in his arm and side. Authorities said Glenn confessed shooting his father when the elder Moore, said to have been intoxicated, beat Mrs. Moore severely.

TOWNSEND PUTS CARTER ON MAT

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 28. (AP)—Leslie "Wildcat" Carter, Seattle negro boxer, was knocked out in the second round of a scheduled 6-round battle with Billy Townsend, Vancouver, B. C., here last night, reeling before a hail of well-aimed punches. The one-time scourge of the west in his division wilted, offering little defense for the storm of blows Townsend drove his way. He went down twice in the first round and twice in the second, but failed to take a count, gamely pulling himself to his feet. A right cross to the chin floored Carter in the second. Another right sent him down again. Coming back for more, Townsend met him with a two-fisted attack, and Carter fell to the ropes. T. 4,000 fans went into an uproar.

GRAPE GROWERS NOT TO SUFFER

FRESNO, Calif., Aug. 28. (AP)—Grape growers and shippers of California today had assurances from Dr. James M. Doran, federal commissioner of prohibition, that the government would "do nothing injurious" to their industry in its investigation to determine the extent to which grape juice is being illegally put. Dr. Doran, here in connection with the investigation, addressed a group of growers and civic leaders yesterday. Declaring the grape growing industry to be one of the state's greatest, he informed the growers that the government "would administer the law with intelligence." He urged the shippers and growers to cooperate with the government.

ARMY REJECTED IDEA USED AS SHOW THRILLER

Hugo Zaccchini, swarthy son of Italy, born in the Argentine, who circus fans will see shot from the muzzle of a monster 22-foot siege gun when the Ringling and Barnum & Bailey circus comes to town, Saturday, Aug. 31, for the first time, is a modest, unassuming



chap who saw service with the Italian army during the World war attached as first lieutenant to a bombing squad. It was while on this service scanning the parabola of an unusually large grenade that the idea of hurling a living person from the muzzle of a cannon came to his mind.

He made a suggestion to his superior officer that soldiers be shot over the enemy lines equipped with quick-opening parachutes. Shortly after the armistice was signed and naught came of his suggestion.

Hugo's brother, Edmonde, was an engineer with the Fiat company and enlisting his aid and interest they went to work on plans for a man-shooting cannon.

After they had evolved a cannon from which a man could be shot they submitted the matter to the Italian government to be utilized in future warfare, but it was rejected as impracticable for the soldiers coming to earth with

parachutes would prove easy picking for snipers. A third brother, Bruno, suggested the cannon act as a spectacle and from the start it proved a success. John Ringling while in Rome last summer saw the act and immediately engaged it for this country. Practically the entire Zaccchini family (there are seven boys and two girls) are involved in the business. Hugo's brother, Bruno, a sister and his wife, are in this country traveling with him with the Ringling-Barnum circus. Bruno it is who shoots Hugo from the gun while his wife and sister stand proudly by. Edmonde, the actual designer of the gun, and another brother, Victor, are now in South Am-



erica with a circus doing an exactly similar act.

Hugo Zaccchini is secretive as to the workings and whys and wherefores of his sensational act and his contract with the Ringling show calls for a watchman to guard the gun day and night. He has been doing the act for several years and during that time has neither lost or gained a pound in weight despite the fact that two performances each day must prove a severe shock. The cannon weighs six tons and while Zaccchini was exhibiting in Rome the gun was blessed at Notre Dame, as well as at the Cologne cathedral. He has been buried over 200 feet and prefers the longer to a shorter distance as it gives him time to collect himself before landing in the net. There is a loud detonation when the gun is fired, a flash of flame, and almost before the onlooker realizes it Zaccchini's body has flashed through the air and he has alighted safely in the net.

COMING OF BIG CIRCUS

Brings Memories of 1908 Event in South
SAID HISTORIC EVENT

The coming of the Ringling-Barnum circus to Klamath Falls is an event of special interest to old-time Klamath residents, for to them it recalls an epic event in bringing the Klamath basin to attention of California and the outside world. In September, 1908, the national irrigation congress met at Sacramento, the dates synchronizing with the California state fair.

The Klamath chamber of commerce, then a struggling but alert organization—of which E. H. Harriman was a member—decided that there should be a showing of Klamath products at the irrigation congress exhibit. It was necessary to make it a collection of fresh products, because the season of the year was too early for mature products of the soil. Alfalfa, timothy, red top, soybean, corn, cantaloupes, squash, pumpkins, the various root crops and apples, pears and some other fruits were among the products selected for the exhibit.

J. Frank Adams personally collected a general exhibit from his home ranch and made a private farm exhibit individually, but in the Klamath booth. The late Nathan S. Merrill made an exhibit from his private garden at Merrill, and these two exhibits each took first prizes in their classes. The Adams prize being the sweepstakes of the irrigation congress exhibit.

Ringling's circus also had dated Sacramento for that week, and on the day of the show some members of the Klamath delegation had a hunch that scored a unique bit of community advertising. Frank Ira White and Jim Baldwin took up stations along the route of the street parade. Before it had reached the each of the performers and most more congested business section they pinned a Klamath badge on the clowns in the parade and tossed badges to those on top of chariots who were out of reach. Having failed to put the idea into effect at the head of the procession, they then hastened to the circus grounds and completed the self-appointed task as the head of the parade line returned to the grounds.
