Investors Prefer Stocks to Mortgages. Remember You Are a Stockholder in Crater Lake. Tipping of Officers' Hats to Bootleggers May Be Thought Going Too Far. Temperance Board Heat Says "Call Out the Marines." Missouri, Last State to Go in for Good Roads, Is Going in Right.

THOSE who have money to invest have come to ask for first mortgage bonds. They want stocks so that they can engage in the earnings of the corporation in which they buy.

In twelve months prior to June 30, common stock issues averaged \$600,000,000 a year in the preceding year.

This great increase in this type of financing is largely due to the recent policy of raising funds by offering the investor a share in the earnings rather than in a mortgage represented by a bond issue.

EVERY time you visit Crater Lake park just remember you are one of the stockholders in that park if you are an American citizen. No one in this country can think himself poor when he remembers that he is one of the owners of such places as Crater Lake national park, for it belongs to the people of the United States of America.

THE California prohibition officer who has commanded all of his staff to be polite, even to the point of tipping their hats to the person about to be arrested, including known bootleggers as well as suspects, may be thought to be going too far.

But, it would be a lot better for a prohibition officer to be polite than to continue shooting suspects in the back which some of them have been guilty of doing. There is nothing in the suggestion of the California prohibition officer to prevent an officer from covering a man with a gun while he lifts his hat with his other hand in order to be polite to him.

One of the objections to police authority is that it is too rough. Of course, at times it has to be and occasionally it has to be almost brutal. But, in a great many cases police authority can be shown with a degree of politeness that is admirable in any walk of life.

CLARENCE WILSON, head of the board of temperance, says in a recent article: "Call out the marines," and then he says, "We must be ready for the last resort when necessary in prohibition enforcement."

Following these strong remarks he says, "We already have a standing army ready and able to enforce all laws in every foot of the land and the man at the helm, commander in chief of the army and navy, who is under a solemn oath to protect and enforce the constitution." Dr. Wilson in his article draws analogies between the present situation and that of the civil war. He believes that drastic military action on the part of the government would silence all opposition to the Eighteenth amendment. Objectors to prohibition invincible in peace would become invincible in war. "But," remarked one who differed a little from the doctor, "He does not know very much about political sociology. We have yet to see coercion dispel firmly rooted convictions and emotions and conditional attitudes."

"We do not say that a modicum of coercion is not necessary for the maintenance of public order. But, when men begin to speak about using military force to bring states and groups under the control of the purpose of the nation they are either facing the situation too desperate to belong in the category of political problems or they have become too hysterical to be of any service in the solution of a vexatious political problem."

"It is of course conceivable that a majority can use military force to coerce a minority, pro-

FLYING ACE ARRIVED IN CITY TODAY

Nick Mamer Comes In
Ford Transport
"West Wind."

FIRST AIRPLANE TO CIRCLE MT. RAINIER

Pilot Finished Unequaled Cross-Country Refueling Endurance Flight Within Fortnight. Is Head of Mamer Air Transport Company of Spokane.

Flying his \$50,000 Ford Tri-Motor 12 passenger airplane, Lieutenant Nick Mamer, nationally known aviator landed on the local field early this afternoon, coming direct from Spokane, headquarters for the Mamer Air Transport company of which he is president.

The beautiful silver "West Wind" type plane, purchased by Mamer in early April has carried more than 12,000 passengers.

One of the finest and best built planes, the ship was the first to fly over Mt. Rainier some time ago. Coast wide publicity was carried on the flight at that time.

Honors of having successfully made the first non-stop coast to coast refueling flight goes to Lieutenant Mamer. This flight was accomplished a fortnight ago, one of the outstanding feats in aviation.

Refueling of his ship was made at an altitude of 10,000 feet.

Art Walker, co-pilot accompanied Lieutenant Mamer today. On several occasions Mamer has visited Bend and made trips.

Klamath-Lakeview Road Has Promise of Surfacing

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29. (AP)—The state highway commission today approved the proposed boundaries of the Nottucca highway improvement district besides handling a great amount of road building business. The Nottucca super road district was formed to build a new road from Beaver to a point near Carlton. Farmers and dairymen petitioned for the district.

Heavy surfacing contracts will be let by the commission tonight, some of the work having been delayed for more than a year. Bids were opened this morning.

The heaviest work is the grading of 14.33 miles of the Klamath-Hilgard section of the Old Oregon Trail in Union county. This grading has been needed a long time. It was said, but was considered too expensive.

EXPLOSION UNEARTH'S SKELETON

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Aug. 29. (AP)—The skeleton of a trapper that had lain undisturbed for years—perhaps for half a century, was uncovered by a forest fire in the Lewis and Clark forest, when the bullets in the dead man's gun exploded from the heat of the flames.

Fire fighting crews heard the explosion, but were unable at the time to investigate because of the intense heat. Yesterday the fire was placed under control and the curious men returned to the spot where they heard the explosion.

They found the skeleton of the man who apparently had been killed by an animal, lying in the spot where he had made his camp.

Beside him was a rifle, with the date 1873 on it, and an old heavy iron skillet, a type long since off the market.

A salt shaker, rusted to shreds and two bottles of poison, of a type used by trappers, were the only other things found.

BRITONS QUIET JEW AND ARAB

LONDON, Aug. 29. (AP)—Government reports from Jerusalem today showed all quiet in Palestine where British troops were stationed. Marauding bands were observed where British troops were stationed. Marauding bands were observed in outlying villages, but some of these were induced to disperse by Palestine police or by Arab leaders.

The British forces were stated to have carried out their role of restoring public order with little opposition anywhere.

There has been no attempt by Arabs or Jews to interfere with the functioning of such essential services as railway, telegraphs and telephones. Communication between Jerusalem and Cairo was opened by all these means.

Reports that a British detachment had been disbanded by Arabs in the neighborhood of Jaffa was declared definitely without foundation.

At present there are British troops at Jerusalem, Gaza and Hebron, with naval detachments at Haifa and Jaffa. Other troops are on patrol in the Ludd area and in the plain of Esdraelon.

"BOMB TRUST" BROKE TODAY

CHICAGO, Aug. 29. (AP)—A grand jury bomb fused with six indictments sputtered in criminal court today, the state's attorney's answer to the Chicago "bomb trust."

State's Attorney John A. Swanson, himself the victim of a bomb attack just prior to his election, ordered the arrest yesterday of six men, whom he charges are leaders of the trust, and whom he holds responsible for many of the acts of violence against persons and property in recent months.

Rescue Follows Long Fight With Gale



After three days of fighting a mid-Atlantic gale in a lifeboat, their ship having sunk under them, members of the crew of the German steamer Quimistan were rescued today after a long and desperate struggle. The commander collapsed as he was taken aboard the liner. All of the crew were saved. The Quimistan, a 58-year-old bulk, on its last voyage—a junk yard in Genoa, began to sink in a furious gale 1000 miles off Norfolk, Va. After the crew had deserted her the vessel caught fire.

LADY HEATH IS HURT IN CRASH

CLEVELAND, Aug. 29. (AP)—Lady Mary Heath, famous British aviator, was injured critically here today in the crash of an airplane through the roof of a factory.

Rushed to Emergency Clinic hospital, Lady Heath was found to have probably a fractured skull, a long cut in her scalp, other cuts on many parts of her body and probably numerous broken bones and internal injuries, doctors said.

Lady Heath and Kirk had been riding high above Cleveland when for some unexplained reason, the plane nosedived into the roof of the Mills company on Cleveland's east side, a two-story factory building. The plane burst through the roof and came to a stop inside the building, a twisted piece of wreckage.

Kirk, with a broken ankle and other injuries, was able to extricate himself from the plane, but Lady Heath was dragged out by workers, an inert form.

Lady Heath was one of the distinguished visitors at the national air races here, and had participated in one of the closed course race events for women.

ACTUAL FLYING TIME LESS THAN 12 DAYS

Giant Air Liner Lessens Time
Made by American Army Flyers in 1924 by More Than Three Days. Passengers Not Fatigued by Long Journey.

NAVAL AIR STATION, Lakehurst, N. J., Aug. 29.

(AP)—Looping the loop around the world in one of the greatest exploits of flying history, the German dirigible Graf Zeppelin settled to earth at 7:13 o'clock e.s.t. this morning just 21 days, seven hours and 33 minutes after leaving on her 20,000 mile journey.

Actual flying time, deducting the time spent on the ground at Friedrichshafen, Tokyo and Los Angeles, the only three stops that were made, was 11 days, 23 hours and 14 minutes, both flying and elapsed time breaking all previous records.

The last leg of the flight from Los Angeles, was completed in 51 hours and 59 minutes.

The previous record for elapsed time around the world was made last year by John Henry Mear and C. B. Collyer, who used planes over land and ships across the Atlantic and Pacific. Their time was 33 days, 15 hours and 21 minutes.
