

GLOSSY BEEVES ARE ALL READY

Some of Finest Herds in Entire State Are Here.

Beef cattle will have a prominent place in the cattle barns this year. In Klamath county many of the breeders are bringing in some of their best animals to vie with one another for prizes and championships.

Yesterday O. E. Alexander, breeder of the fine DEA Aberdeen Angus strain of beef cattle, brought in several entries. Each year Alexander displays his fine cattle not only at the Klamath county fair but also at other northwest and Pacific coast shows. He always wins his share of the blue ribbons.

Frank Gross will bring in some fine Shorthorns to enter in the beef cattle class.

E. M. and W. E. Hammond and Son will show their famous herd of Shorthorn cattle at the Klamath County fair, which opens today for four big days and nights. This herd is one of the best in the state and is one of the few purebred herds of Shorthorns in the state.

Two youngsters appeared in the fair board office, saying they each had a Holstein calf to enter at the fair. The children were Dorothy and Donald Jacob of Malin. Each will exhibit a heifer calf, purebred, in the club and open classes. There will be numerous other calves entered, and the children will give some of the adults a "run for the money" in the junior classes of both Holstein and Jersey.

F. W. Freund of Powell Butte, who exhibited his Brown Swiss herd at the Klamath County fair last year, has written to the secretary saying that he will be here this year with a herd of young animals.

U. E. Reeder of the Pine Grove district is planning to show his herd of purebred Jerseys, and he will have some competition from other herds in the county.

The dairy division is in charge of Ray Lookey and S. M. Streeter. The judge for dairy classes will be W. B. Tucker, county agent of Crook county.
