VESSEL SINKS OFF CALIFORNIA

In small boats. Thick fog hampered their efforts, however.

Dodd Slightly Injured
The Dodd at first was reported to have been in a sinking condition but later wireless reports said she was not damaged enough to be in danger and that members of her crew had taken to life boats to do rescue work instead of to abandon the oil tanker, as was originally thought.

The Dodd is a vessel of about 7,000 tons.

Captain Asplund, who was reported in radio messages to have gone down with the San Juan, was acting master of the stricken ship during a leave of absence granted to its regular master, Captain George Winkel, it was learned from the marine department of the chamber of commerce.

Ralph Hillsman, second radio operator of the San Juan, who was picked up by the Dodd, reported that the collision occurred while he was asleep. He sprang from his berth and ran to the main deck. The deck was sinking beneath the surface and he was hurled into the sea.

Hillsman said no lifeboats had been launched from the San Juan.

Cutters Nearby
Two coast guard cutters, the Shawnee and the Tahoe, went to the scene of the wreck from San Francisco, while preparations got under way here to receive the injured from the tanker. Ambulances were sent to the pier at which the Dodd was expected to dock at 8 a. m.
