SURVIVORS DID HEROIC DEEDS

Immediately assisted in marshalling a lifeboat off the davit, and entered the water with a woman, a child and two men. We rode ten yards from the sinking ship when it suddenly plunged. The whirlpool threw the lifeboat in the air, and we all fell in the ocean. I started swimming, and looked for the woman and child, but could find no trace of them. "One person floated close to me and I made a grab for the body, but it sank. Swimming around there, I could hear the last screams of the terror-stricken people as they were pulled down in the vortex of the whirlpool created by the sinking ship." Wade was finally picked up by a lifeboat, and arriving at the emergency hospital here, was found to have several cracked ribs and possible internal injuries.

Gives Life For Sister
A story of an heroic sacrifice, of a brother's life for his sister, was told by Miss Rose Rulfo, a practicing attorney of Mexico City. Her brother, she told officers, shortly after the crash, clasped his life-belt around her. Miss Rulfo, with injuries which physicians say may possibly prove fatal, today mourned the loss of her brother, who went down with the ship.

Lost False Teeth
Alex Cowie, a survivor brought to port by the cutter Shawnee, said he had lost his false teeth in the excitement. He paid \$120 for them just before sailing, he told officers. As the doomed San Juan dove, it carried Cowie with it. He was pulled down, and when blown high in the air as the boilers burst. And with the sudden rise which probably saved his life, away went his prized teeth.

Clifford T. Paulson, 22, chief radio operator of the San Juan, told how he stuck to his transmitter, sending distress calls, until the water swirled up about him.

"A second later the water was over my head," he said. "Then I tried to fight my way to the door. The radio room was completely flooded, and I was trapped. Finally I pulled myself to the door and grabbed the top. In this manner I was able to pull myself out. Once I was free from the cork I rose to the surface like a cork."

Golden grain from Langell valley, as well as many other products grown in this farming district, were arrayed against a black and gold setting.

Honley, the prize winner, had its display amid colors of blue and gold. It included many lovely flowers, canned vegetables and preserved fruits, as well as fresh vegetables. This booth had a fine exhibit of potatoes, Klamath Netted Gems.

Golden slab cheeses spelled out the word Malin in the booth representing that community. Among the notable exhibits in this display were several fine heads of cauliflower and flour manufactured by the Malin Milling company.

Beneath a ceiling of pastel-shaded streamers the display from Merrill was laid out, including many good-looking vegetables, Mayflower Creamery butter, and honey.

Many Fine Exhibits
From Tule Lake comes the mammoth sugar beet and the large onions and it was these two vegetables which attracted much attention in this booth.

Williamson River grange, located on the Klamath Indian reservation, appropriately chose the Indian theme for its booth, which was spread out beneath a canopy of purple and gold. Produce from this district was very fine.

Keno, which had its first exhibit at a Klamath County fair, probably surprised many by the variety of garden products, the flowers and grains which it displayed. This community took second place.

Among the community booths might be mentioned the display of pasture crops and wool clips which were exhibited by the Lower Klamath Lake Grazing association.

Have "Covered Wagon"
Besides these numerous booths there were especially fine displays of pastry, canned vegetables and preserves, fancy work, including quilts, braided or crocheted rugs, and clothing, gorgeous flowers from gardens throughout the Klamath basin, and examples of boys' and girls' 4-H club work.

Leading the array of booths in the exhibit building which represented Klamath Falls business houses, was the Klamath county chamber of commerce "covered wagon," where Miss Dorothy Stevens handed out literature and answered questions.
